

IROQUOIS FALLS JUNIORS WINNERS OF THIS GROUP

Made Fifth Consecutive Win From Timmins Juniors Last Week.

Last Wednesday at Iroquois Falls, Timmins Juniors met their fifth consecutive defeat, the victory giving the Falls Juniors the championship of this Junior Group. The score was 10 to 2. The following is the report of the game as given by "The Fiend" in The Broke Hustler this week:—

On Wednesday night last, the cub papermakers cinched the Northern Junior Group when they emerged victorious for the fifth consecutive occasion over Jack Marshall's junior pupils to the tune of ten goals to two. But that is not the best part of it. Whilst it was nice to see the boys win, the manner in which they won tickled the fans to death; in the previous games the boys have shown a decided lack of attention to team work and in addition would not hold their places. But on Wednesday night that was all changed; they played more combination and team work in that one game than they have shown all the rest of the season put together. The only one who had any selfish tendencies at all was Bob Connors and at that he got a couple of goals.

Lin Fluker of the Senior team handled the bell and made a good job of it.

The first period was pretty fair ho-

key but the team work and shooting of the homesters landed four tallies behind Mickey Downey's erring son. The boys were playing nice combination and a clean game with few penalties. Five minutes from the opening Connors taking Jerry Lowry's pass landed one in the twine followed a minute after by young Gauthier who batted in a rebound.

Timmins were far from out of the picture however, but their shooting was weak and especially Gorman, who with men better placed than himself would rather shoot than pass it. Then on goes George Fahey who to the surprise of everybody concerned drove in two goals in two minutes. The first gong rang with the tally four nothing for the Falls.

Timmins Last Stand

In the second period Timmins played much better than in the initial frame and forced the issue consistently and for the first ten minutes had more of the play than the home gang. Seven minutes from the start Campbell, the big defence man took a long shot which Abbie Cox was set for when Gordon Dewar deflected it past the disgusted Cox. Three minutes later Don Cameron tallied with a pretty one when he stickhandled his way right through for the prettiest goal of the evening. The miners were trying hard but when Connors and Lowry ran in another two, that took the heart out of them. The second intermission arrived with the score 6-2 for the Abitibi-ites.

The third period livened up a little but there was only one team in it and

they ran in another four goals and the only fly in the ointment was a couple of loving matches by the participants whom Referee Fluker promptly banished and several penalties for needless offences to Bob Connors who finally retired. Gorman, Campbell and Connors seemed to pack a grouch all night.

Falls Play the Game—Now

In the home nets Abbie Cox performed what little he had to do with speed and dispatch. Roy Graham fitted in nicely on defence and checked rush after rush particularly in the second period. Bob Connors played brilliant hockey when he liked, but at other times he spoiled his exhibition by roaming all over the lot and the stuff for which he was rightly banished. Gauthier on the right got a lot of bumps but took it all in good part and as usual backchecked after the style of Dinny Dinsmore. Bobby Boucher in centre will cause anxiety to many a defence in the play offs. Jerry Lowry for some reason or another was not up to his game and was content to spend the best part of his time hanging back. When he did come to life he was all right. George Fahey surprised everyone by his goal getting abilities, whilst Gordon Dewar played a good game.

In the visitors citadel young Downey played a whale of a game and used good judgement in coming out of goal to block shots when his defence was beaten and saved many certain goals. Campbell excelled in rushing and shooting whilst sandy haired Gorman was in the thick of it all night. Don

Cameron's stickhandling won him applause and he was the best of the visitor's attack. Portelance, as usual had speed to burn, but rambled all over the ice. Desormeau evidently has a temper and showed it.

The feature of the game was the much improved combination and team work of the winners and if they show that work in the semi-final and finals they will take some beating. The question is however, will they show it?

MAN WHO SLASHED WIFE WITH AXE GETS TWO YEARS

Magistrate Atkinson has had both variety and number in the cases before him during the past couple of weeks. A. Furtis was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary for slashing his wife with an axe. N. Ukkelo paid \$200.00 and costs for having liquor in a public place. The case against Bill Romoanuk in connection with the alleged illegal possession of gold ore was remanded till called upon, which has much the same effect as a dismissal. The case against August Anson was dismissed. He was charged with illegally taking goods from his brother's farm but after the hearing of the case he was honorably acquitted. The case against N. McGovern was withdrawn. Paul Gagnon on a charge of having liquor in a public place was fined \$200.00 and costs. On a similar charge a fine of \$300.00 was levied on A. T. Pommier. John Grech was taxed \$5.00 and costs for disorderly conduct. For allowing gambling on his premises a fine of \$50.00 and costs was levied on A. Charette. J. Martip, Connanght, who failed to appear on a charge of breach of the O.T.A. a couple of weeks ago, was brought before the Magistrate last Thursday on a bench warrant and fined \$200 and costs or three months. His bail had been estreated, and he took the three month term. Officer Kenny of the Provincial Police arrested Martin after one of the hockey matches here. Officer Kenny was also active after last Friday's game at the Falls and has several who went from Timmins to the Falls on the special train to come up before Magistrate Atkinson tomorrow (Thursday) on the charge of being intoxicated otherwise than with victory or words to that effect. Tomorrow P. Dezenke will answer to a charge of being drunk and disorderly. A card game in progress at the Timmins Cafe on Sunday when the police arrived on the scene will result in several charges of gambling with perhaps other charges in connection with the running of the game. Jas. Chalut will come up for hearing tomorrow in connection with charges arising last year from thefts from the T. & N. O. here. One young man is serving a term at Burwash in connection with these thefts and he named Chalut as his partner. Chalut went to Montreal and was picked up here last week when he returned to this district.
