**COMMENTS ON LAST FRIDAY'S GAME AT IROQUOIS FALLS**

Writing in The Broke Hustler this week "The Fiend" says:—

For the first time this year Iroquois Falls team threw all its old fighting spirit into the game, used their bodies back checked like fiends, played combination and defeated Timmins 9-1 in a very fast game Friday night.

The Falls team was shunted around, which improved its aggressive game, but the chief feature was the peppy spirit of every player on the ice. Another big feature was that they went on the ice with a definite plan of attack. The game in Timmins when Timmins had them down 8-1 at the end of the second period, had its effect, and in a heart-to-heart talk in the dressing room on Wednesday, a definite plan of action was decided on, and put into effect on Friday night, with results that were extremely unsatisfactory to Timmins.

**A Switch on the Line**

The new Lineup of the team worked out very satisfactorily. Lin Fluker was dropped back on the defence where his work is always good, with this added advantage, that he breaks so fast that he got off down the ice a dozen times in Friday's game with the Timmins people strung along behind him and no chance to get in the money.

Boucher at right wing was a decided advantage and played a far better game forward than he ever played on defence. He gave a lot of weight to the forward line where it was needed. With Fahey in center and Leo Lafrance on the left wing, there was more weight and a steadier line all the way through.

**Not a Case of Luck**

The difference between the team that won 9-1 on Friday night, and the team which let Timmins put it 8-1 over them in the first two periods the Tuesday night previous, although they pulled up in the third period, was tremendous. They did not look like the same team. And that is not just a piece of luck. The Timmins game gave the boys a bit of a shock and when they talked things over with Art Throop and Wes Turk in the dressing room next day they drew up a plan of including a fair but vigorous use of the body, absolutely insistent back checking, and no hogging of the puck in front of the nets. This with the spirit that they threw into the game made them absolutely unbeatable, and what is more they are unbeatable in Timmins or on home ice if they just do the same thing over again. They outskated and outplayed the Timmins team at every point of hockey through the whole game.

**All Played Star Games**

To name a star in the game is impossible.—There were eight of them. Ted Corbould in goal played a simply magnificent game. Timmins sent in a

lot of corking hot shots and only one trickled through and that was more or less of an accident. Capt. Bill Brydger played the game of his life. There were times when the Timmins team, in their desperate efforts to put the puck through by main force if by no other way, had their whole line crowded in front of our goal. Close to a dozen times the rebound was lying in a dangerous position, when Bill with that long sweep of his cleared it from the nets. His defensive work was as good as he ever showed and his attack was wonderful.

Lin Fluker beside him made a mighty satisfactory partner. Lin is a mighty hard man to get past any time, but was pretty nearly impossible on Friday night, and his quick break down the ice and passes to the forwards were all the time dangerous and two of them successful.

**Brilliant Forwards Game**

On the forward line Boucher played a whale of a game, not only stopping up the Timmins forwards by good fair body checking, but showing better speed and stick handling than he has done this year. He scored two goals, one unassisted and one on a pass from Bill Brydger, both of them dandy shots.

Fahey had as hard a row to hoe as he has had for some games. Timmins seemed to realize the danger of that wicked shot of his from the center of the ice, and he was closely checked all night, but he played a great game and McGuire could not hold him down. Leo Lafrance in the early part of the game was a little off in front of the nets, but settled down in the second period to play a dandy effective game. Chirooski and Shorty both showed up in splendid style especially in back checking. Joe played a better net game than usual, getting two of the nine goals on passes from Fluker and Quesnell. Shorty netted one and assisted in two others. But Shorty's greatest game was on the ice when Timmins began to get tired, when he simply ran rings round them.

The feature of the whole forward line was that they back checked every second of the game, and not one of them hogged the puck in front of the nets. As soon as the team took the ice they showed they had a plan and they were out to carry it through. Every man on the team used his body, Boucher and Brydger stopping up the Timmins forwards in a way that surprised them, and what is more took a lot of the fight out of them. The game showed that when they follow a definite system they are as hard a team to beat as there is in this north country.

**Timmins Played Hard**

That the score was so big does not mean that Timmins didn't put up a good hard fight. They did. But they were practically smothered by the back checking. Only once or twice during the games did they get in any combination work, the checking by our boys was so close.

Neither Cameron nor McGuire were up to anything like their usual game. The bodying game was too much for them and they never really started, except in flashes in the latter part of the game. Reis was by all odds the hardest worker on the Timmins team. He lost his temper a few times and drew some penalties but he certainly turned in a good game for his side. Fournier who the last game or two was able to go through the Falls team for a score, while our men stood around watching him, was stopped, before he got started on Friday night, although he is always dangerous.

Scully played the first two periods in goal and Jack Marshall then pulled him out to put in the Westmount youngster, Baridon. Baridon certainly stopped an awful lot of shots in that third period. In two or three of the scrimmages he was mighty lucky in being in the road of the puck, but that is not to say that he did not play a corking fine game. He made some real magnificent stops when everything seemed against him.

Taking into consideration the hard checking of the game and the desire of the referee to keep things well in control, the penalties were not great, and none of them on either side were very serious.

**First Period**

The Falls started the attack the minute the puck touched the ice and kept Scully busy. Lindsay Fluker distinguished himself in the early part of the period by his terrific speed in leading attack, the Timmins forwards being unable to catch him once he got away. The first tally came quickly. Bill Brydger slipped down the ice passing everybody till he came to the defence, snapped the puck to Boucher, who sent in a very speedy shot from the wing for a tally.

The heavy checking game was just beginning. Boucher, Brydger and Fluker were using their bodies very effectively and before long had the Timmins forward line respecting them a whole lot. Brydger ran into hard luck, being laid out by Fournier and a couple of minutes later, Reis got him again. While Bill was off for bodying Campbell to the boards Timmins made a frantic effort to tie, but this simply gave Ted Corbould the chance he needed to show his metal. With ten mi-

Twice in this period Scully was on his knees well out beyond the crease, which he has no right to be under the rules. The last game in the Falls he did the same thing quite frequently.

**A Pretty Goal**

Shorty and Joe came on for Lafrance and Fahey and after a few minutes of play figured in a very pretty goal. Shorty took the puck down the ice and shot, but Scully stopped. Joe passed across to Fluker who passed to Shorty, who passed to Joe, and Joe netted. It was as pretty a piece of passing play as there was in the game.

A couple of minutes later Brydger scored the final tally of the period with a magnificent run all the way clean through Timmins forwards and defence and beat Scully.

Boucher and Brydger drew penalties leaving only Joe, Shorty and Lindsay on the ice for a couple of minutes. Shorty played a lone hand on the forward line and almost scored twice. Just before the period closed Reis in a frantic effort to get in close, slid right into the nets but the puck didn't for which Reis drew a penalty.

The Timmins forwards had for a few minutes of the second period managed to hog the puck pretty well and got in half a dozen shots, any one of which might easily have scored, but Ted was on the job. Then the Falls team settled down to the game they had been playing, each checking his man so hard that it took all the strength out of the Timmins attack. Boucher, who had been playing a splendid game all the way through and showing speed that he has not shown before, grabbed the puck in behind the Falls goal, worked his way clean up the ice to the Timmins defence, passed it as Fournier checked him and Lafrance found the twine, making the score 4-0.

Timmins realized that they were up against it and Coach Marshall moved Fournier up onto the line subbing Roach on defence. Reis also played from this time on a good part up forward.

There were one or two minor penalties at this stage of the game but while each team was a man short Percy Fahey steered the puck to the other end of the ice, and scored a pretty shot without assistance. 5-0.

Baridon wore the pads for Timmins in this period. He made a great stop of Fahey's shot, but Fluker beat him to it a minute later, unfortunately after the bell had rung for an offside.

Reis got a bad crack by crashing into the goal post as he tried to follow Boucher around the net. Reis was playing a tremendous game in this period. The pace set by the Falls was too fast for Timmins and the game had developed pretty much into one-man rushes. The period was half over when there was a pretty combination by Leo Lafrance and Shorty Quesnell, the latter scoring the Falls 8th goal.
