The Firemen had a call at 9.40 Sunday morning to the residence of Mr. Fowler, 37 Birch street. A fire had started in the partition from an overheated stovepipe. The Brigade put the blaze out by the use of the chemical tank. About \$25.00 damage was done by the fire, it being necessary to rip up the floor in a couple of places to get at the blaze.
