

TIMMINS WON 8-6 AFTER 30 MINUTES OVERTIME

Friday's Game Did Not Start Until 1:15 a.m. Saturday, but It Was Sure well Worth Waiting for.

At Iroquois Falls last Friday (or rather on Saturday morning early) Timmins won another game in the N.O.H.A. series, the final score being 8 to 6. Thirty minutes overtime was required to decide the issue, the overtime starting at after half-past three in the morning. The victory is all the more creditable to Timmins on account of the difficulties that followed each other. In the first place the special train from Timmins did not leave here until two hours after its schedule time. This was due to a wreck on the main line, and the fact that the referee could not get up to the Falls for the game as a consequence. Then the special was held at Porquis Junction until nearly twelve, awaiting the arrival of the train from the South bearing the referee. Thus the boys were on the road in wearying way for six hours. It was 1:15 a.m. Saturday when the game commenced at the Iroquois Falls Rink. To further handicap the Timmins team, Carlin was injured in the first

period and Timmins had to play the rest of the game and overtime with only one substitute, thus playing seven men against eight. There was a record crowd on the special, and there was about as much trouble getting back as going down, the return voyage being a cold one and taking five full freezing hours. There has been much complaint about the coldness of the coaches on the return trip. All round the trip was a hard one, but the big crowd did not mind so much, in view of the great victory.

All taking in the trip were delighted with the game and especially proud of the playing of the Timmins boys. "It was great hockey," is the general verdict. Another general verdict is that each and all of the boys played so good a game that it would hardly be fair to single out any one for special mention. Not a member of the team but gave his best and that best was mighty good. Of course, to make the game as good as it was, it was necessary for the Falls to play good hockey also, and that team did put up a nice exhibition. At the same time it is quite correct to say that Timmins had the edge on the play throughout and showed superior class. Playing hockey of this type Timmins can go to Toronto and show the South a brand of hockey that will take a lot of beating.

Mr. Andy Kyle, of Toronto, was re-

feree and handled the game in a way that give satisfaction to fair-minded hockey fans. He made one mistake that cost Timmins a goal, but mistakes occur in the best circles occasionally, and the referee's fairness and knowledge of the game were evident throughout.

Immediately after the face off, Cameron passed the puck to Behan, who shot, Brydge blocking, and passing to Lafrance, who passed back to Brydge, the big defence man coming to grief against Fournier, who tried a lone salvo into the Falls territory, but was checked by Fahay, losing to Campbell immediately after, Brydge checking and with Fluker tried a two-man combination, which passed the Timmins defence. Scully saved what looked like a sure goal. Cameron attempted a lone rush, but the back checking of the Falls was of such a standard that he

lost the puck in mid ice to Fahey, who lost to Behan. The Brydge-Boucher defence proving too much for Doe, he shot from out side, Corbould saving easily. Fluker was offside taking a pass, and from the face off, Campbell tried a long shot on the Falls net, but Corbould saved. At this stage of the game it looked like a no-score period, the back checking on both teams being so insistant that no combination could get going, and both goaltenders had nothing to do but stop occasional long shots. Campbell and Behan tried to break away, but Brydge checked, passing the puck to Fluker, the two Falls wings trying to get in for a close one, but lost to Cameron. Lafrance broke away from a melee, but lost the puck in Timmins territory. Brydge was playing a great game at this period, stopping all close-in shots, and several times with Boucher attempting to fool the close checking Timmins forwards. The puck was tossed between the opposing forwards, until Brydge broke away for a long shot on Scully, which rolled off the Timmins goalie like water off a duck's back. Cameron and McGuire came down the ice in a nice piece of combination, McGuire shooting from outside the defence, the puck going in behind the net, where Boucher went after it and came down passing to Lafrance, who passed to Brydge, the latter shooting, Scully saved, McGuire and Behan came down in a two-man combination coming to grief on the Falls defence, Brydge passing to Fahay, who tried a shot at Scully which went wild, and Campbell came down with the puck, Boucher checking him and falling on the puck. From the face-off Shorty broke away and tried a shot, Joe Chiroeski getting the rebound and slamming one past Scully. Falls 1. From the face-off the play was near the Timmins end, until Reis broke away trying a long shot at Corbould, the latter saving, Lafrance taking the puck, and losing to McGuire who slammed another one at Corbould, which the guardian of the nets stopped with the aid of the most uncanny luck. The Falls combination was broken by Reis who passed to Don who shot from outside, Corbould saving. Shorty broke away, and missing a shot on the Timmins net, redeemed himself later when he blocked Fournier, saving what was almost a sure goal. Chiroeski lost to Campbell, who shot, Corbould saving. Reis rushes, loses to Fahay who passes to Chiroeski, the latter trying one in close which Scully could not stop. Falls 2. From the face-off Cameron worked hard trying to get one past Corbould. Fluker tried a high shot, going over Scully's head, Quesnel, Chiroeski and Fahay coming down in a three-man combination right after, Fahay hitting one in. Falls 3. Timmins were desperate, and worked like lions to score, McGuire finally driving one past Corbould. Cameron tried a long shot, Boucher blocking and passing to Brydge who shot Scully saving. McGuire took the puck and shot a hot one at Corbould, the red, white and black goalie catching it in his pads. Lafrance tried a lone rush, but was easily checked by Don, who passed to Cameron for one close in, Corbould saving. Boucher drew the first penalty of the game at this time, the referee ringing his bell in time to prevent Timmins from counting a second tally, when Fournier sent a not one past Corbould. Lone rushes were then in order, Timmins trying hard to score with Boucher off, four men trying hard near the Falls net when the gong rang. Falls 3. Timmins 1.

The second period started with close checking on both teams, until McGuire broke away, passing to Behan who passed back, and Frank counted the second tally for Timmins in the evening. Fahay took the puck at face-off and went down, Fournier checking and passing to McGuire who shot from outside, Corbould saving. Brydge drew the second penalty of the game for tripping Behan, Reis going down right after, but shooting wild. Don tried one close in, Corbould again proving that he is sure some goaltender. Fahay started up, but lost to McGuire who sent a hot one in on Art Throp's only hockey player, who saved. Behan
