

IROQUOIS FALLS WON FINAL GAME IN N.O.H.A.

Only Part of Regular Timmins Team Played. Play Better Than the Score Suggests.

The last game in the Northern Group of the N.O.H.A. senior series was played at the Falls last Friday evening. Owing to the fact that it had no bearing on the final result of the series, interest was not as keen as in past matches. Only a very small crowd went over by the special from here, and the Falls fans attending were not as numerous as on former games. Four of the regular Timmins line-up were out of the game for the evening, Messrs. Scully, Cameron, Campbell and Dr. Behan having the privilege for the first time this season of enjoying a N.O.H.A. game from a seat in the Arena. Gorman, the Juniors' left defence man, played his first Senior game and gave a good account of himself. Gordon Ross turned in a very good game, putting the cap on it by showing Boucher where he got off, or rather, where he went down, when he used the stick improperly. Barridon's work in goal was good and he had some brilliant saves to his credit, as well as playing a consistently good example of goal-tending in a hard type of match. Another feature of the match was Dixie Cox's good work. In the second period he went through the whole Falls team for a goal on his lonesome in his own old-time brilliant way. He also materially assisted in other scores. Roach, Fournier and McGuire also did their part well, as the score sheet indicates, each of them playing a nice game. Reiss also added to his growing reputation. The fact, however, that nothing depended on the game naturally had its effect. At the same time it must be admitted that the match was much better than the score indicated, and Iroquois fans played hard to win. Corbould played a fine game in the nets, and Brydge and Boucher on defence were at their best. Quesnell showed up well in the last part of the game, though his shooting was not so good as his speed and stick-handling. Lafrance, Fahey, Flucker and Chirooski were good on the forward line, combination work being featured.

The general opinion is that it was a pretty good game to watch, even if it had no bearing on the more interesting issue of the group championship.

HOW TO GET THE MOST HEAT FROM SUBSTITUTE FUELS

Many a householder who has experienced great difficulty in trying to burn the substitute fuels thrust upon him this winter will welcome a pamphlet just issued by authority of the Dominion Fuel Board telling him just how to proceed to get the best results. The Mines Branch at Ottawa has been experimenting for months with these auxiliary fuel in ordinary domestic furnaces, and the pamphlet now issued tells what they have found out. The fuel tried out were soft coal, pea-size anthracite, gas coke, 72-hour nut coke, Welsh anthracite and peat.

A feature of the experiments was that the use of two of these fuels together often gave better results than one used alone. Complete directions are given for building the fire, for replenishing it and for regulating the drafts. Chemical analyses are also published of each fuel, showing its comparative heating value, ash content and other constituents.

The pamphlet is written in clear non-technical language, and should be read carefully by every householder. It is being widely circulated and coal-dealers are being given a supply for free distribution to their customers. Copies can also be obtained on application to the Department of Mines,

FALLS JUNIORS WIN LAST GAME WITH 20 TO 5 SCORE

Timmins Juniors lost another game to the Falls Juniors at the Falls last Thursday, the score running up to the high figure of 20 to 5. Timmins was shy two of the team's best regulars, Gorman on defence and Portelance on the forward line, and this explains in part the high score. The Falls team won on merit and played snappy hockey, with combination play a decided feature. For the Falls team Arthur Gauthier was the star. With two men off, he made a clever lone rush in the third period and went through the whole Timmins team for a score. Fred Mills replaced Abbie Cox in goal at the second period, Abbie having his shoulder painfully hurt in practice before the game started. Mills played a wonderful game in the nets. For Timmins Cameron and Campbell were the stars and played a fine game of good hockey, their work being clever and effective. The game was a clean one, the penalties being few and practically all for minor offences. There was one little mix-up that brought a player on each team to the penalty box for five minutes each, but generally the game was smooth and lively. With the handicap of not having its regular line-up, and also being without the advantage of spares, Timmins had little chance. The boys, however, put-up a game battle and kept the Falls moving all the time.

The game scheduled for tomorrow (Thursday) night is not to be played, as the semi-finals begin to-night.

Iroquois Falls Juniors are the winners on merit of this group, and a first class Junior team. All here will wish them success in the battle now on for N.O.H.A. honours and higher trophies.

But that is not the whole story. The Falls Juniors have been practicing combination and whenever they used it as they did for about half the game, they scored practically at will.

The two features of the game were the work of Arthur Gauthier on the forward line and Fred Mills in the nets. Totsie was a regular gun man and shot up the Timmins net for nine tallies. At the end of the third period, with Bobby Connors and Tiek Graham both serving penalties of a minor nature, Totsie, the lone forward, dashed his way through the whole Timmins team and scored.

Abbie Cox got his shoulder bruised in the shooting practice immediately before the game and played the first period, but it became so painful that Fred Mills was put in. This is Fred's first appearance in a league game and he soon had the crowd yelling their heads off, for he stopped everything in sight. The two or three that did trickle through were no discredit to him.

The best part of the game to the Falls fans was that the forward line, except for spasms of individual play, played neat combination most of the time. All five of the forwards scored goals, and had several assists to their credit. That is the way a score ought to lead.

Improvement All Round

Jerry Lowry, in the third period showed greater speed and greater back checking than in any game yet. Gordie Dewar on defence played a steady and very effective game and did not draw a penalty. Bobby Boucher had trouble with his skates in the early part of the game, but towards the end was going great guns. Roy Graham played part of the time on defence and part up on the line and in both positions he showed his usual head work. George Fahey who has been sick for a few days, proved himself as usual, a bull's-eye shot in front of the nets. There were very few penalties during the game and most of these were of a minor nature, with the exception of one mix-up at the beginning of the second period when Connors and Desormeau drew a five-minute penalty.

Cameron and Campbell did most of the work for the Timmins sextette, playing a dangerous game all the way through.
