Forms of application may be obtained from the Crown Lands Agent, or the District Representative of the Department of Agriculture, or from the Northern Development Branch, Parliament Buildings, Toronto. Applications in regard to Patented lots will not be entertained unless accompanied by Certificate of Search from the Local Register or Local Master of Titles, showing that the Applicant is the Registered Owner.

Applications in respect of Unpatented lots will not be entertained if the Applicant is not registered as the locatee or Purchaser in the records of the Department.

The applications must be forwarded to the Local Crown Lands Agent not later than March 1st, next.
