### MATACHEWAN POWER TO BE AVAILABLE IN MARCH

The Great Northern Power Company will be in a position to supply Hydro-Electric power to Porcupine and other camps by the end of March next, according to an official of the company. Twenty-seven miles of the transmission line from Indian Chutes to Porcupine have been completed and the company is progressing at the rate of two miles per day. The number of men employed on the work has been increased to 550.

### EX-CHIEF OF POLICE OF COBALT SUES FOR SALARY

In the issue of The Northern News of Cobalt last week there is the following interesting paragraph:—"An echo of the dismissal of former chief of police F. H. Bonneville was heard in Division Court here this morning, when Mr. Bonneville sued the Town of Cobalt for the balance of his salary for the month of May, 1922. The case was adjourned by Judge Hayward until next month's Court. The former chief alleges that he is entitled to payment for the entire month, while the town claims, in defence, that he was paid for all the services he rendered. According to a decision of the town council, Mr. Bonneville was to sever his connection with the town from May 8 last."

The next regular meeting of the Timmins Town Council is scheduled for Monday afternoon, March 12th, at 4 p.m.

## GOVERNMENT'S INACTION CRITICIZED BY MAC LANG

Member for this Riding Voices Protest Against Power Situation Here.

Last week in the Ontario Legislature, Mr. Mac Lang, M.P.P., Cochrane Riding, made vigorous protest against the attitude of the Government in regard to the power situation in this part of the North Land. He pointed out that the mining districts of the North are growing very restive as a result of the shortage of electrical power which is seriously handicapping the operation of the Mines. Mr. Lang criticized the Government for its apparent inaction in accepting such steps as would lead to a remedy.

Rising before the orders of the day were called, the member for Cochrane quoted at length from a Timmins despatch which detailed the seriousness of the existing conditions.

"Some action should be taken so as to provide power for the natural development that would take place in the Porcupine Camp," said Mr. Lang after pointing out that the difficulty of securing power for the mines had been brought to the attention of the Government repeatedly. "Conditions are serious now and they are going to be more so. Kirkland Lake and Cobalt are also affected. The Government should develop the power itself or allow somebody else who is willing to do so."

In reply Premier Drury stated that the Government was prepared to negotiate a lease for power concessions on the Abitibi river when the parties concerned would accept conditions which were essential to the general welfare of the district. The Hollinger Mine, he said, had been seeking a lease at Carrying Place but had not accepted terms which were satisfactory to the Government.

Further query by Mr. Lang brought another reply from Hon. Beniah Bowman, minister of lands and forests, who stated that the conditions which the Hollinger people had been asked to accept had been necessary for the safeguarding of the interests of other power users on the Abitibi, notably the pulp companies. "We hope we will be able to issue a lease to someone," he concluded.

Attorney-General Raney hazarded the opinion that the present shortage was due to the severity of the weather but was met with the retort from Mr. Lang that the weather was not something which was here today and gone tomorrow.

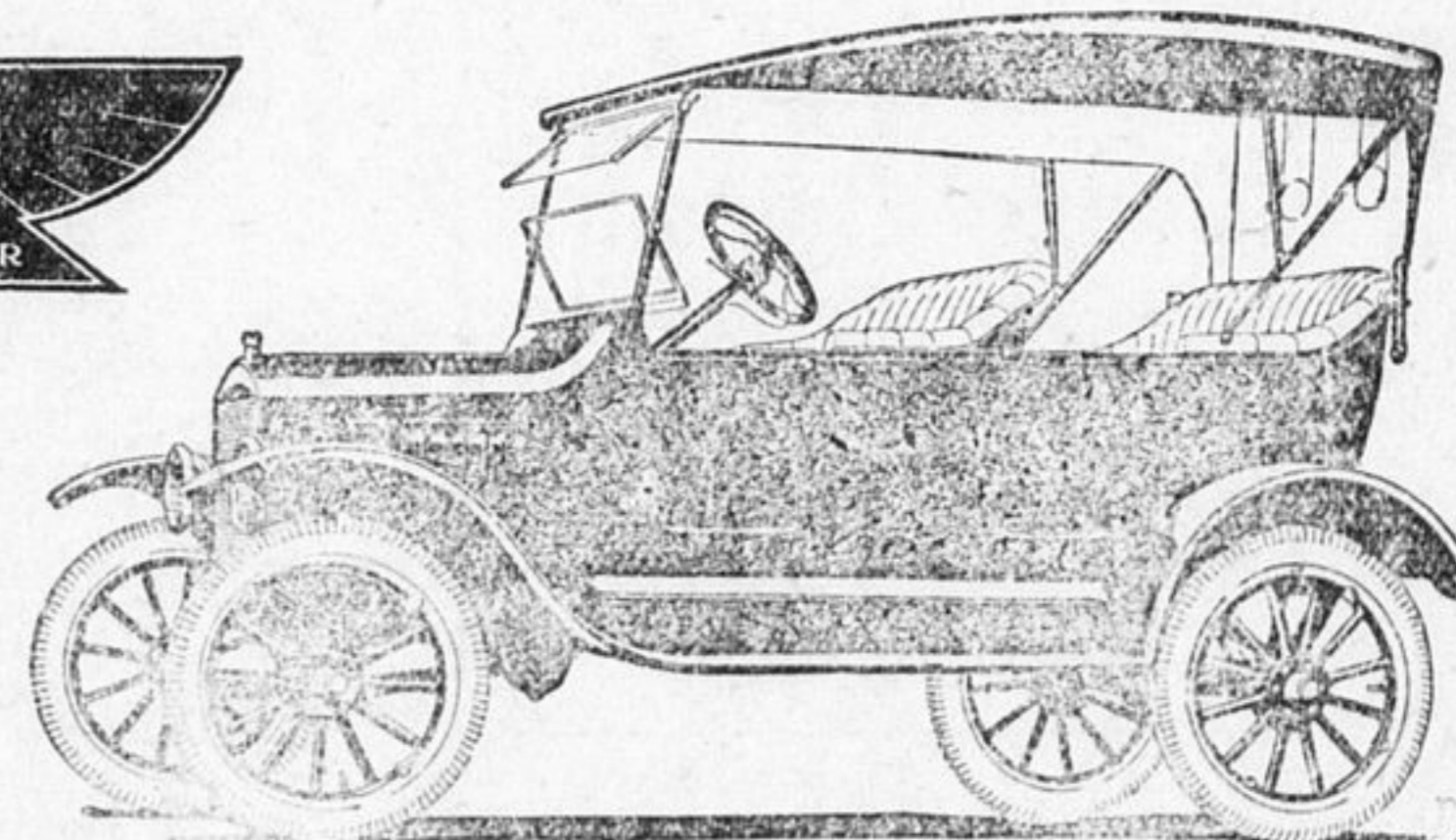
