The report showed that the event had been successful financially as well as in other ways, a balance of some five dollars remaining to the good after all expenses were paid. The programme for the evening was a remarkably good one, even for Caledonian Society events. The big crowd present enjoyed every minute of the evening. It was agreed to be "one of the very best yet." VICTORIAN ORDER NURSE FOR TOWN OF TIMMINS

Illustrated Address on Sunday Evening Organization Meeting Monday Afternoon.

Miss Boswell, Victorian Order Nurse, who has been in town for some days past, gave an address on the work in the New Empire Theatre on Sunday evening after the church services. The address was illustrated by a number of very interesting lantern slides. Dr. McInnis, Mayor, occupied the chair in his usual happy manner. While the attendance was not unusually large, all found Miss Boswell's address interesting and informative. Miss Boswell after showing the amount of good work accomplished in other towns and cities, emphasized the fact that the V.O.N. work supplements the work of the regular nurses of a community and does not overlap. It provides skilled nursing for those who cannot afford professional nurses in the ordinary way. It also features advice and assistance to mothers and expectant mothers. Its usefulness in these lines has been very great elsewhere. What may be termed "community work" is also featured. The Nurses co-operating in every way with the Health authorities, the doctors, nurses, etc., for the public health and benefit. The nurses do not give their services free, except in indigent cases, the homes being expected to pay what they can for the services rendered. The nurses were supported by the fees, municipal grants and voluntary subscriptions.

On Monday afternoon in the Council Chamber there was a largely attended meeting to organize for the V.O.N. work here. The following officers were elected:

Dr. McInnis, Chairman; Rev. J. D. Parks, Vice-Chairman; Rev. R. S. Cushing, Corresponding Secretary; Mr. J. P. Taillon, Treasurer.

Executive Committee—Rev. Fr. Thériault, Capt. Clegg, S.A., Rev. M. R. Hall, Mrs. Poulin, Miss Copps, Mrs. J. A. McInnis, Mrs. Corp, Mrs. Simms, and all the doctors in town.

It was decided to have the Record-

ing Secretary write headquarters to appoint a Nurse for Timmins without committing the Town to any special obligation. The next meeting of the organization will be called as soon as a reply is received to this communication.

SIXTH ANNIVERSARY OF PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

The sixth anniversary of the Timmins Presbyterian Church will be observed by special services on Sunday, March 4th.
