### COBALT MAYOR UNSEATED ON RESIDENCE CLAUSE

Last week Judge Hayward gave judgment in the case brought to have the election of Mr. Taylor Pipe as Mayor of Cobalt declared null and void on the ground that Mr. Pipe was not a "resident" of Cobalt in the meaning of the Act and therefore not qualified for the position of Mayor. Mr. Pipe was elected Jan. 1st. with a majority of 15 over Mr. W. R. Lowery, and some weeks ago formal action was taken to unseat him on the grounds specified. According to Judge Hayward's finding the motion succeeds, with the costs against Mr. Pipe. It is said that Mr. Pipe will not carry the matter further, and so a new nomination for Mayor of Cobalt will be necessary. Mr. Pipe has a business in Cobalt, with living accommodation in the same block. He has a regular residence in Haileybury, where his family spent the most of their time and where his children attended school. Occasionally, both Mr. Pipe and the family would use the apartments in

Cobalt and on this ground Mr. Pipe considered the Cobalt premises one of his residences. The Judge, however, held that the Act "does not contemplate or intend any such temporary residence in the municipality as that set up by the respondent as his Cobalt residence, but rather that he should have in the municipality of Cobalt, or within two miles therefrom a residence of the kind and possessing the requisites of the residence he actually had in the town of Haileybury." In the comparatively short existence of Cobalt as a town there have been six attempts to unseat men elected as Mayors. Three of these attempts were successful, Messrs. A. Z. Trudell and F. L. Cody, and, now, Mayor Pipe being unseated. A case to unseat Mayor McKinnon in 1919 was dropped before it had proceeded very far. Two previous attempts to unseat Mr. Pipe as Mayor were also unsuccessful. It is interesting to contrast the experience of the two big mining towns of the North Land—Cobalt and Timmins—in this matter of mayoralty elections. Timmins has

three different citizens as Mayors. The first Mayor, the late M. H. Wilson, was elected five times in succession by acclamation. The second Mayor, Mr. J. P. McLaughlin, was elected by acclamation for the two years he occupied the chair. Five years in succession the present Mayor, Dr. J. A. McNinis, has been elected to the highest honour in the gift of the town, and for three of these the elections for Mayor were by acclamation. During the history of the Town there has not been even serious talk of any action to prevent any good citizen from serving the town in public capacity.

### ARGONAUT EXPECTS TO BE IN PRODUCING CLASS SOON

According to advices sent from Dane, Ont., and coming from Beaverhouse Lake, the information is given out that the fault problems on the Argonaut are being worked out satisfactorily and that the general development work is good in all parts of the mine. No definite date has been announced on which the new mill will be ready for operation, with the exception that the mine will be turning out gold bricks some time during the second quarter of the current year.

### A.S.D. CLUB HAVING SNOW SHOE TRAMP THIS EVENING

The regular weekly meeting and dance of the A.S.D. Club was held last Wednesday evening in the Club Rooms in the I.O.O.F. Hall here. ### CHEMICAL TANKS PROVE THEIR VALUE SATURDAY

Again the value of the chemical tanks was proven at the fire at one o'clock Saturday morning. The fire was at the Gamble-Robinson warehouse on Spruce Street and the alarm was sent in by telephone by one of the staff living above the warehouse. The brigade were very promptly on the scene and though there was a great amount of smoke and some flame in evidence the chemical tanks were used first, as sort of "first aid" as it were. The chemical tanks did the trick and it was not necessary to turn on the water. The damage done was slight, but the fire was a threatening one and the building a dangerous one should a blaze get away. The prompt work of the brigade and the efficiency of the chemical tanks saved any chance of serious loss. Outside of a floor burned through, the damage was confined to any injury that might result from the smoke. The chemical makes practically no damage, except to fire, and it can be brushed away afterwards. In small fires the loss from water damage used to be a serious matter, though one that could not be avoided. Up-to-date fire fighting methods include the use of chemical extinguishers in place of water wherever possible. For some time past the Timmins Fire Brigade have been using chemical tanks for all small fires, a couple of big tanks being always in readiness on the hose wagon. Should the Town secure the new motor truck with the big chemical tank equipment, this method of fighting fire will be extended to even larger blazes than in the past. The saving to property by the use of chemical instead of water is a very material one. In the saving of loss through water damage chemical tank equipment pays for itself in a remarkably short time in any community.

The origin of the fire at the Gamble-Robinson warehouse could not be definitely placed. The fire may have come from a defective stove pipe or chimney or from hot coals getting on the floor.
