mineralization and where first cut, a hand sample averaged over \$22.00 per ton. This vein resembles in many respects No. 1 vein on the second level. It is fully expected that south cross-cut No. 26 will soon encounter No. 4 vein, already found on the second and third levels. These developments on this, the lowest level of the mine, are very significant and highly satisfactory.

Construction—We have installed during the last month an electric light plant of sufficient capacity to supply our needs until such time as electric light will be furnished by the power company, which will be about the end of July. Although it is only a temporary expedient, it reduces by a great percentage, the chances of fire and is giving a great amount of satisfaction to everyone concerned. As the weather has somewhat modified, we are progressing with the construction of numerous buildings on the property suitable houses for the manager and staff being among the first that will be completed. An addition is being built to the dining room to take care of more men which at the present time number about 60 on the company's account, 24 men employed by wood contractors, 7 men by diamond drill contractors and 5 men by boarding contractors, making a total of 96 men engaged in the company's activities. A bath house with shower has been completed for the use of the men and in a very short time, we shall have a camp with all up to date necessary conveniences.

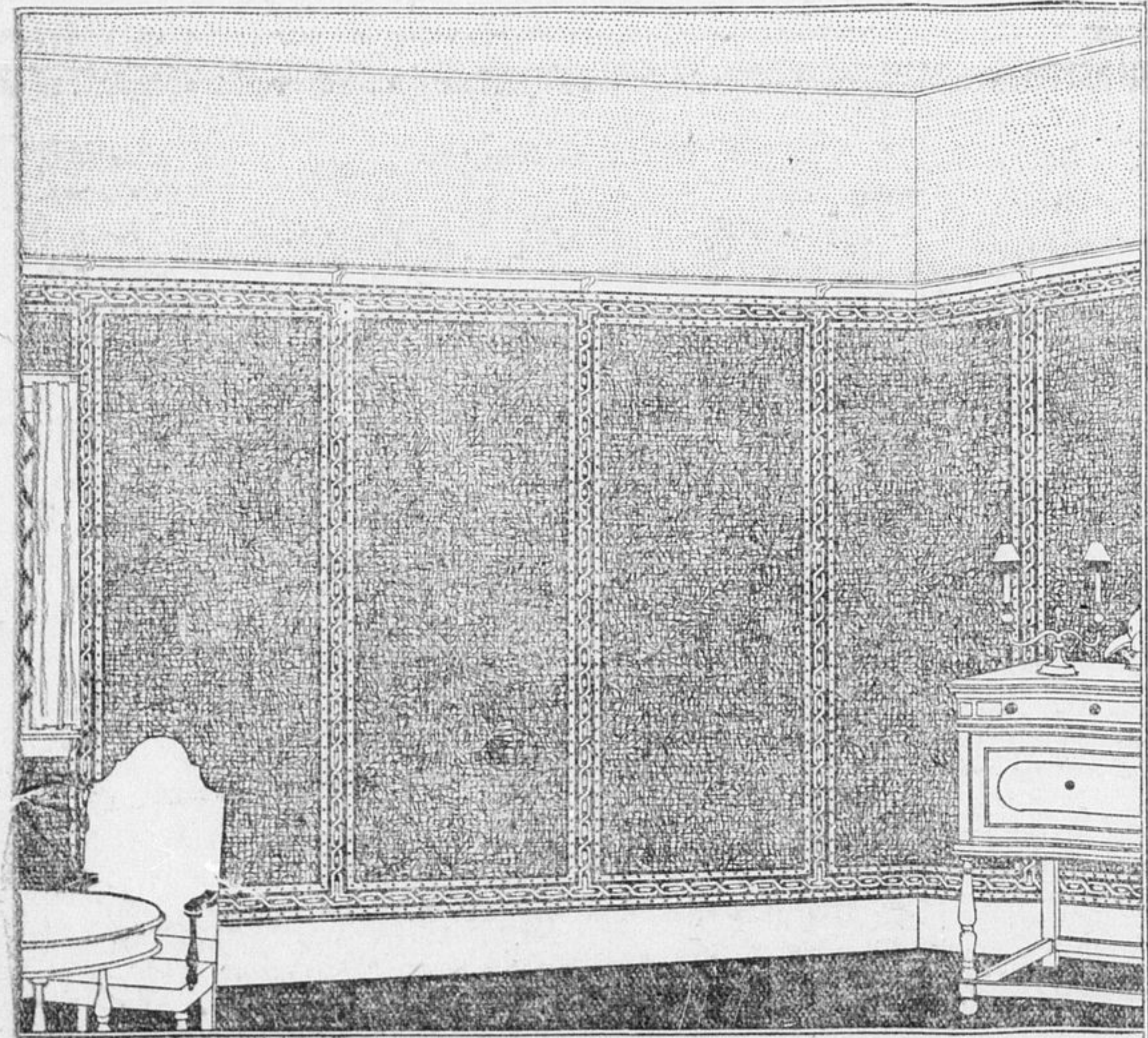
Power—Numerous disquieting reports seem to be going the rounds regarding the power situation in the Porcupine camp. Personally I do not think that there will be any shortage of power in this district after a very short time. Your company, however is amply protected in this respect, as we are just about to sign a contract with the Great Northern Power Company. This contract would have been signed some time ago but, as it was deemed advisable to protect ourselves from any future complications, certain conditions were insisted upon by us for our protection and eventually the power company saw fit to meet those conditions. The result being that we shall have priority power rights, with ownership of the line from the mine to South Porcupine, which in the event of the failure of the power company to supply us with sufficient power, will enable us

PENINSULAR TO INSTALL 200-TON MILL SHORTLY

Additional and New Buildings Being Erected. About 100 Men Engaged On Property.

In accordance with the policy adopted by the Board of Directors of the Night Hawk Peninsular Mines, the shareholders of the company are kept in the very closest touch with the progress and development at the property. A recent letter from the Chairman of the Board, Mr. James R. Dodworth, dated "Philadelphia, March 16th," gives the following very interesting information:—

level No. 4 vein has opened up in a highly satisfactory way and the easterly drift has continued in a heavy sulphide ore with an average value of \$14.00 per ton, across the full face of the drift. On this level No. 1 vein West Drift has encountered what looks like another ore shoot. This is being developed and can easily be reached on the second and fourth levels. On the 425 foot level No. 2 vein is opening up a very strong ore body. The character of the ore being a heavy sulphide for the entire width of the drift with a probable width of 12 to 15 feet. The average value across the face is \$8.00 per ton with individual samples running as high as \$24.00 per ton. Another important vein has also been encountered on this level. The character of the ore is mostly quartz with a liberal pyrite



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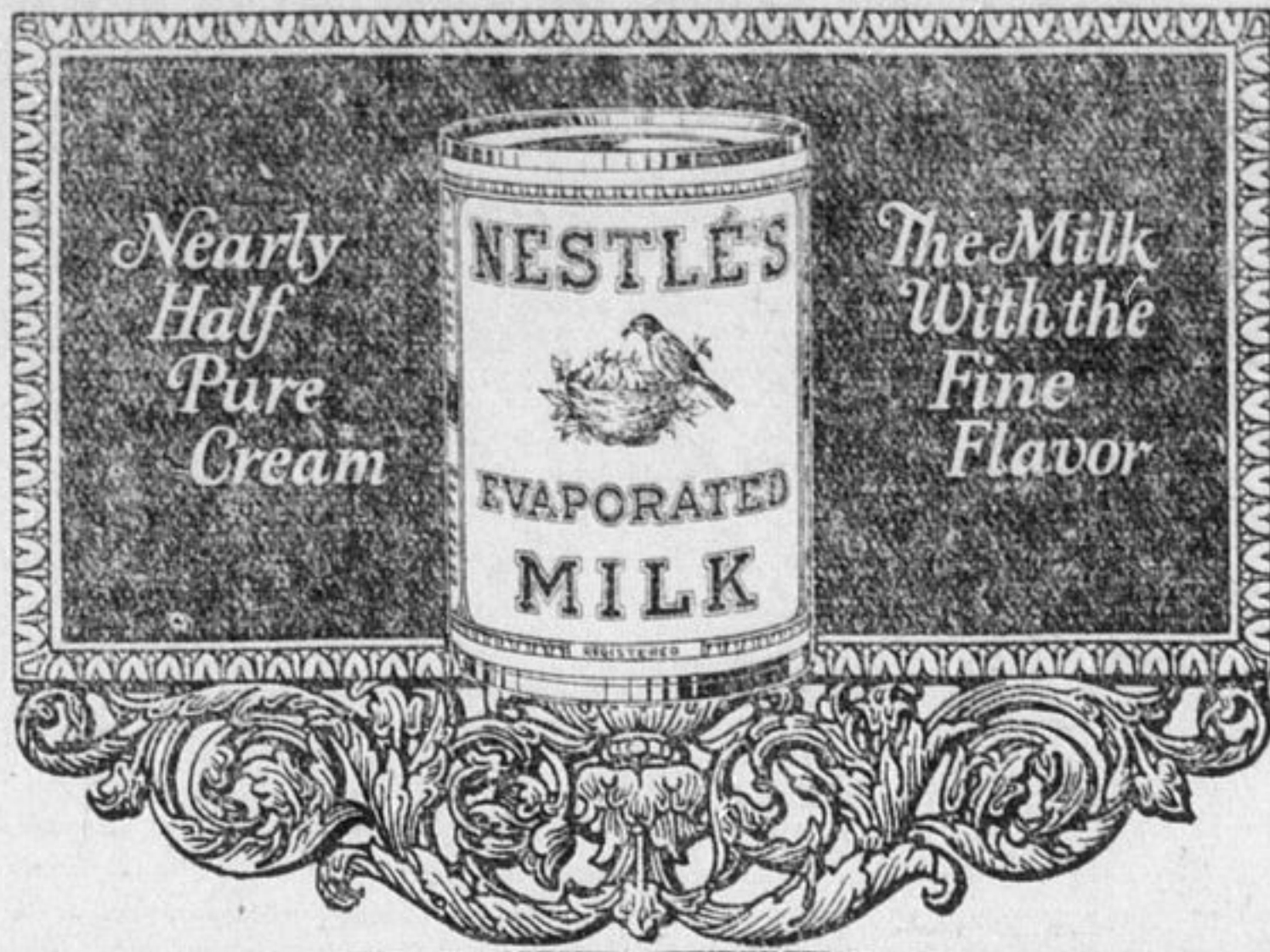

DEATH OF MR. STEPHEN ORR AT TORONTO LAST WEEK

The following paragraph from The Northern News of Cobalt has reference to the death of Mr. Stephen Orr, father of Mr. Wyman Orr, of the Northern Ontario Light & Power Co., staff here:—

"At the residence of his daughter Mrs. C. B. Allen, 413 Brock Avenue, Toronto, Mr. Stephen Orr died at the age of 76 years. The late Mr. Orr was an old resident of Haileybury, coming there with his family in 1908. He was well-known in mining circles, being the original owner of the Orr property at Kirkland Lake.
