level No. 4 vein has opened up in a highly satisfactory way and the easter ly drift has continued in a heavy sul-200-TON MILL SHORTLY phide ore with an average value of \$14.00 per ton, across the full face of the drift. On this level No. 1 vein West Drift has encountered what looks like another ore shoot. This is being developed and can easily be reached on the second and fourth levels. On the 425 foot level No. 2 vein is opening up a very strong ore body. The character of the ore being a heavy sulphide for the entire width of the drift with a probable width of 12 to 15 feet. The average value across the face is \$8.00 per ton with individual samples running as high as \$24.00 per ton. Another important vein has also been encountered on this level. mineralization and where first cut, hand sample averaged over \$22.00 per ton. This vein resembles in many respects No. 1 vein on the second level. It is fully expected that south 'crosscut No. 26 will soon encounter No. 4 vein, already found on the second and third levels. 
