DELAY IN ESTABLISHING VICTORIAN NURSE HERE

Fact That Provincial Grant Has Not Been Paid, Has Interfered With Plans. More Town Help Necessary.

In February Miss Boswell, Victorian Order Nurse, visited Timmins, and addressed gatherings here relative to the work of the V.O.N. As a result of this visit and of previous efforts along the same line, an organization was elected here for the Victorian Order of Nurses work, and with the expectation of having a nurse appointed for Timmins. At a meeting of this organization it was decided to have the Recording Secretary (Rev. Mr. Cushing) write headquarters at Ottawa to have a nurse appointed for Timmins without committing the Town to any specific expenditure for maintenance. The Victorian Order Nurses are supported by Provincial Government grants, municipal and private grants and subscriptions, and the fees received from patients able to pay. Owing to the fact that the Provincial Grant has not been paid this year as expected, though no reason has been given for its non-payment, and it may yet come through all right, the Victorian Order of Nurses is not able to finance the establishment of new nurses without special municipal assistance. In a word the question so far as this town is concerned resolves itself into this:

"Does the Town believe the need for a Victorian Order Nurse here would justify the making of a substantial municipal grant?" At the previous visit of Miss Boswell full explanation was given of the purposes and plans of the Victorian Order of Nurses, and there seemed to be general enthusiasm to have a nurse of the Order here. The officers appointed to deal with the matter included:—Dr. J. A. McInnis, chairman; Rev. J. D. Parks, vice-chairman; Rev. R. S. Cushing, corresponding secretary; Mr. J. P. Taillon, treasurer; executive committee, Rev. Fr. Theriault, Capt. Clegg, S.A., Rev. M. R. Hall, Mrs. Poulin, Mrs. Corp, Mrs. Simms, and all the doctors in town.

At the meetings here, it was made plain that the V.O.N. is in no sense in opposition to the work of other nurses, but has a place of its own in the community. According to literature issued by the society, it originated in 1897 as a national memorial of the diamond jubilee of Queen Victoria. The purpose of the V.O.N. is to supply nurses, thoroughly trained in hospital and public health nursing, for the nursing of the sick, prevention of disease and the promotion of health. The poor always receive first attention, the Order being primarily for such; also, for people of moderate means. Each visit costs the Order one dollar. Many are unable to pay anything; some pay five or ten cents a visit, some fifty cents, and so on according to their means, up to the cost price. No matter how little is paid it helps to make possible a visit to some one who can not pay at all. People in good circumstances pay regulation nursing fees. As everyone pays in proportion to their ability no one is robbed of his or her self-respect or pauperized. Although bedside nursing is its fundamental principle, the activities of the V.O.N. include all phases of work concerned with family and community welfare. The nurses prepare for and assist at operations and confinements, sterilize and prepare surgical dressings and district supplies, teach by demonstration how to carry out the physician's orders, etc. In some towns they act as social service workers, industrial nurses, etc. In some towns they are directly employed by the municipality. They are

all graduate nurses in good standing. Last year there were 277 Victorian Order Nurses in Canada, and they made 428,420 nursing visits, 54,848 child welfare visits, 20,654 pre-natal visits, 163,819 life insurance visits, 40,414 free nursing visits, 110,295 other free visits, and other visits bringing the grand total of visits made to 593,279. The central office is financed from the income derived from a small endowment fund and from various grants and donations. The local associations receive local financial support from fees received, grants from towns, industries, etc., and from the contract with the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. The Victorian Order of Nurses is established in all the leading cities and larger towns. Among the towns where the work of the Order may be known to readers of The Advance, Pembroke, North Bay, Sudbury, Arnprior, Galt, Barrie and New Liskeard may be mentioned. The Order also seems to be particularly active in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick towns, as well as in the West.

It is the intention, it is understood, to place this question of a Victorian Order Nurse for Timmins before the people of the Town and the industries of the district. The facts given above may accordingly be of interest and use in the circumstances.

FINE AND JAIL TERM FOR MATTAGAMI SHACK OWNER.

At police court last Thursday Magistrate Atkinson imposed a fine of \$200.00 and in addition a term of two months in jail upon Marcel Riard who owns a number of shacks in Mattagami. The case against Riard arose from his renting his property for disorderly house purposes, the police bringing forward proof to show that he knew at the time of renting the purpose for which the high rent was being given, and that in other ways he was profiting by the illegal and immoral business carried on. The police have been persistently raiding the shacks since this district came into the town, and those residing in the district are now giving the police commendation and credit for the good and quiet work that has resulted in a clean-up.

J. Trudell, on a liquor selling charge, was fined \$1000.00 or six months taking the term.

The adjourned case against Dr. Minthorn in connection with filling prescriptions without observing all the rules of the O.T.A. resulted in a fine of \$300.00 and costs being imposed.

A charge laid by Chief McInnis of Tisdale, resulted in F. Bukalo being fined \$50 and costs for illegal purchase of liquor.

Two drunks and five men facing gambling charges preferred by the town police were each assessed \$10 and costs.

C. C. Boyd, Inspector under the Ontario Pharmacy Act, had a long list of charges against some of the drug store proprietors, clerks, etc., and in the case of incorporated companies against the directors. These were chiefly technical breaches of the Pharmacy Act regulations. A number of the cases were remanded until his week for decision. For the selling of drugs by other than registered druggists, or for permitting the same, fines of \$20.00 and costs were imposed on W. D. Pearce, C. Roach (2 charges) and F. M. Burke. The decision in the other cases will be given next week.

In information laid by the Inspector against Max Levine for selling poison at Ansonville without license as a registered druggist a fine of \$20 and costs was imposed.
