ALL RADIO STATIONS MUST HAVE LICENSES

Apparatus for "Receiving Only" Comes Under the Regulations In This Regard.

With so many radio sets in this district, and with more contemplated, the following announcement from the Dept. of Marine & Fisheries, Ottawa, should be of more than passing interest. The announcement says:—

Every Amateur Radio Station in the Dominion of Canada must be licensed by the Department of Marine & Fisheries, Ottawa.

In some quarters the opinion has prevailed that Amateur Radio Stations having apparatus for "Reception Only" do not require to be licensed. Such an impression is entirely unfounded and the Department desires to make it clear that Amateur Radio Stations whether they be fitted for transmission and reception or for reception only require a license as provided under Section 3 of the Radiotelegraph Act, which reads:—

"3. No person shall establish any radiotelegraph station or install or work any radiotelegraph apparatus in any place in Canada or on board any ship registered in Canada except under and in accordance with a license granted in that behalf by the Minister."

Failure to obtain such a license may invoke the penalty of the law as provided by Section 9 of the Radiotelegraph Act which says:—

"9. Every one who establishes a radiotelegraph station or installs or works any radiotelegraph apparatus in violation of the provisions of this Act, or of any regulation made hereunder, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding fifty dollars, and on conviction on indictment to a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars and to imprisonment for a term not exceeding twelve months, and in either case shall be liable to forfeit to His Majesty, any radiotelegraph apparatus installed or worked without a license."

Licenses for "Reception Only" may be obtained upon application at the Post Office in the more important towns and cities or by writing to the Deputy Minister, Department of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa, Ont. Licenses for transmitting stations are obtainable only from the Deputy Minister at Ottawa. Applications for both classes of license must be accompanied by the sum of one dollar, which is the license fee for amateur stations. Licenses are valid for one year, commencing on the 1st. April, and expiring automatically on the 31st. March.

ALL-FRENCH PROGRAMME ON RADIO THIS EVENING

An announcement of special interest to large numbers in Timmins is made in connection with the Radio broadcasting. There will be broadcasted from Westinghouse Station "W.B.Z." at Springfield, Mass., this evening, April 11th, an all French programme put on by French artists furnished through the co-operation of the Canadian Westinghouse Co. of Montreal, and "La Presse" Station "C.K.A.C." The concert will start at 9 p.m. (Eastern Standard Time) and will run through to 1 a.m. Station "W.B.Z." operates on a 422 metre wave length. Wireless fans in Timmins and district will be much interested in this special programme, and no doubt many this evening will be enjoying the high-class programme referred to.

COBALT POLICEMEN HAVE THEIR HEADS STITCHED

George Robitaille is in jail, his brother Joseph is out on \$1,000 bail, and Chief of Police Parcher and Provincial Sergeant Urquhart have wounds on their heads that required two stitches each as the result of a fracas in the north end of the town on Friday last.

The officers were taking Joseph Robitaille to the lockup, after finding both men, they say, in a drunken state when his brother came up from behind and attacked the officers with an iron weapon, and fled.

The officers took Joe to the town hall, while Inspector Moore and Provincial Constable Craik scoured the locality for George Robitaille. They found him hidden underneath a bed in the home of F. Boucher. He is accused of unlawfully wounding the policemen and is held without bail, while his brother faces two alleged breaches of the O.T.A. and a charge of assaulting a peace officer.

ANOTHER BUSY DAY AT POLICE COURT TOMORROW

Again there promises to be quite a bit doing at police court here tomorrow (Thursday). In addition to the adjourned cases and those in which decision is to be given after the taking of evidence last week, there are a number of new ones. There will be the usual two or three cases of simple and compound drunkenness. Steve Berilla will be charged with assaulting his brother-in-law, M. Mandachuk and Steve Souk will be faced with charges in connection with what appears to have been a little rough-house at a christening party in Moneta. The Town police were sent for Sunday to restore calm to the party. According to the story told the police, Mandachuk and Souk visited the christening bee without being invited and for the apparent purpose of beating up a friend of theirs. According to the story, they were like some of the critics of the town council,—they wanted to knock and so carried a hammer. They hit their friend, it is said, in the mouth with the hammer and this annoyed him considerably. Also it knocked out some of his teeth. The hammer proving too light the men are accused of going outside and getting an axe to renew the combat. The friend, however was equal to the occasion and did effective beating on his own account. In the meantime the police were notified and journeyed to Moneta, returning with Mandachuk and Souk, also the axe. The story current that the assaulted man had an ear chopped off with the axe is not correct and was evidently invented by someone who was born with too many ears or too large a dose of imagination. Indeed, the assaulted man escaped with about as few injuries as the assaultees (if the lawyers will permit the use of this legal term). In other words, "You ought to see the other fellow's face." Another fighting case is that of E. Gignae, charged with fighting in a local poolroom. A young fellow, D. Larsch, will answer to a charge of the theft of a team of horses. According to the information given in laying the charge he went off with a team of horses hired by another man from a local livery, keeping the horses out until around midnight and running up a bill of around \$20.00 in livery hire against the man who had the team.

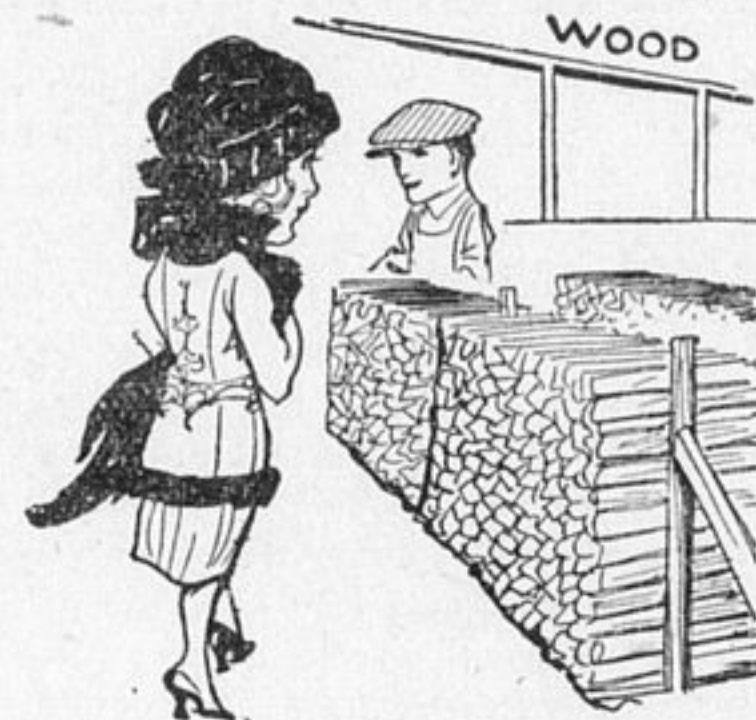
