COUNCIL APPOINTS HIGH SCHOOL BOARD HERE

Preparatory to Establishing Regular High School in Timmins. Other Council Business.

At the regular meeting of the Town Council Monday, with the Mayor in the chair and Councillors J. H. Bacon, E. L. Longmore, F. M. Wallingford, L. S. Newton and J. E. Morin present, a resolution was passed naming a High School Board for Timmins as follows: D. Ostrasser and J. P. Taillon for three years; H. Charlebois and V. H. Emery, for two years; A. R. Harkness and W. Rinn, for one year. This action was taken in accordance with a request from the Timmins Board of Education. The approval of the Department of Education is now all that is awaited before a regular High School can be established here.

The Township of Tisdale asked for a meeting of representatives of the two municipalities to adjust matters regarding the incinerator, and this will be arranged for.

Arrangements were made to formally appoint Constable R. Gratton as an officer for O.T.A. enforcement.

A by-law was passed for the better regulation of rooming and lodging houses.

Minor repairs were authorized for Chief Greer's residence, and for the lumber, etc., for a shed for the Fire Chief's house.

Instructions were given for the pre-

paration of a by-law to appoint Mr. Murdock as Town Engineer. Mr. Murdock has been Town Engineer at Dundas, Ont., and comes here with the highest recommendations and the best prospects for filling the position most acceptably.

A wooden sidewalk on Sixth Ave. from Elm street to the Hollinger Townsite was authorized.

The Town Solicitor reported progress on the matter of the annexation of Moneta, also mentioning that the Rochester petition had been delayed because it was not in formal shape and did not show the area proposed to be annexed. These matters will be righted at once.

The Fire Chief and Town Engineer were instructed to make a report at next Council meeting of the condition of the streets in town, with the particular view of having all streets safe for the use of the fire apparatus.

The matter of submitting the by-law regarding the purchase of a LaFrance motor fire truck to the electors was deferred to next meeting. Councillor Wallingford and other Councillors expressed the view that the rate-payers should be allowed to decide by their vote. The Mayor, however, influenced apparently by misinformed street talk and the prejudiced stand of some in the matter, thought the Town could get along this year without the truck, and he was not anxious accordingly for any vote of the rate-payers. The question, after the usual discussion, was left over the next meeting.

It was decided, however, to put in an extra team at the fire hall. The present team have outlived their usefulness, and it is also desired to have a second team to go out in case there is a second alarm. It was thought that the one team could be used in the Public Works Dept. on occasion, and this will be done if it is practical.

The Town Solicitor explained the proposed agreement suggested by Dr. McDougall, Chief School Inspector, regarding a Union School Section for Timmins and the unorganized part of Mountjoy. The Solicitor was afraid that this plan would not work out satisfactorily, and the Council agreed that the better arrangement would be to have Timmins confine its school authority to the town limits, looking

ANOTHER BUSY DAY FOR POLICE COURT THIS WEEK

Gambling charges will again figure prominently in the police court this week. On Sunday Chief Greer and his staff gathered in a number of Chinamen who will face charges of gambling on the Lord's Day. The names as they appear are:—Lee, Hing Si, Yee, and Lee Sing. A place near the police station was raided Monday night and the police arrested Frank Kalomula as the owner and Vieno Keleta as the manager, and six other Finlanders who were taken as players in the game. The eight will come up on Thursday this week to answer to the charges preferred, most of them being out on bail in the meantime. When the police entered the place, there was a great scatter, one man jumping head first through a window some eight or ten feet from the ground. He got away but there was a hole left in the ground where he struck when he came through the window.

There will be more than eight drunks. Two of these are Mike Babinnone and Andrew Fedezzah, a big fellow and a smaller man, who created quite a bit of excitement by their disinclination to go to the jail last week. They had to be assisted most of the way, and they acted in very wild fashion that would be no general recommendation for any kind of intoxicants.

Another case to come up tomorrow is that of A. Gauthier who was brought back from Cobalt last week on a charge laid by Mr. N. Blahey, the charge being that of obtaining goods with intent to defraud.

Other interesting cases are also expected.

There has been a decided improvement in the situation at Cochrane, new cases falling off, and there being general hopes that the worst is past. The official figures give the total death list up to last Friday as 38, out of a total of 776 cases.
