DUST ON STREETS WORSE THAN A CURSE THIS WEEK

The authorities should see that effective measures are taken at once to prevent the recurrence of any such dust curse as occurred in the main parts of the town on Monday of this week. Dust was blowing round in regular clouds to the injury of eyes, noses, throats, faces, clothing, comfort, and everything else. At times it was difficult to distinguish the cloud dust from a London fog, except that a London fog doesn't blind you until you get into it. Monday's dust storm was a little bit of too much. When it proved so much of a nuisance to pedestrians and motorists, it is easy to imagine the damage it would do and the nuisance it would cause to merchants and their goods. To prevent similar dust storms this summer some effective system of dust laying must be adopted. Many believe that oiling the streets would be the most economical plan, and that oiling can be effectively carried out if it is done right. Others favour a water sprinkling plan. It does not seem important which scheme is adopted, so long as the dust is effectively laid. If water is to be used a practical sprinkler should be put in commission. The sprinkler should be used, not only when there is nothing else to do, but when it is needed. To use a sprinkler a team could be kept on the go practically all the time in dry weather, if the dust is to be kept in its place. With the extra town team now provided, it should be possible to secure a system of sprinkling that will prevent

the dust nuisance.
P.S.—As this article was being written it commenced to snow outside. However, in this country dependance has been placed too long on snow and rain for dust laying.
