

**BY-LAW No. 9**

A By-law of the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins, to raise by way of loan the sum of \$75,000.00 for the purposes therein mentioned.

Whereas the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins require to borrow the sum of \$75,000.00 to provide funds for the purpose of acquiring a school site in the said Town of Timmins and erecting a school building thereon, and for such purpose to issue debentures therefor, bearing interest at the rate of five and a half per cent. per annum which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this by-law;

And whereas it is expedient to make the principal of the said debt repayable in yearly sums, during the period of twenty years, of such amounts respectively that the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in any year shall be equal as nearly as may be to the amount so payable for principal and interest in each of the other years;

And whereas it will be necessary to raise annually the sum of \$6,275.97 during the period of twenty years to pay for said yearly sums of principal and interest as they become due;

And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property rateable for Separate School purposes in the said Town of Timmins, according to the last revised assessment roll, is \$1,085,180.00.

And whereas the amount of the existing debenture debt of the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins is \$66,000.00 and no part of the principal or interest is in arrear.

Now therefore the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins enacts as follows:—

1. That for the purpose aforesaid there shall be borrowed the sum of \$75,000.00 and debentures shall be issued therefor in sums of not less than \$100.00 each, bearing interest at the rate of five and a half per cent per annum, and having coupons attached thereto for the payment of interest.

2. The debentures shall all bear the same date and shall be issued within one year after the date on which this by-law is passed, and may bear any date within such year, and shall be payable in twenty annual instalments during the twenty years next after the time when the same are issued and the respective amounts of principal and interest payable in each of said years shall be as set forth in Schedule 'A' hereto which is hereby declared to be and form part of this By-law.

3. The debentures as to both principal and interest may be expressed in Canadian currency and may be payable at any place or places in Canada or Great Britain.

4. The Chairman of the said Board

shall sign and issue the debentures and interest coupons, and the same shall also be signed by the Secretary-Treasurer of the said Board, and the debentures shall be sealed with the Corporate Seal of the said Board.

5. During twenty years the currency of the debentures, the sum of \$6,275.97 shall be raised annually for the payment of the debt and interest and said sum of \$6,275.97 shall be annually included in the yearly Separate School rate to be levied and collected by the said Board for the said twenty years, the currency of the said debentures, and the said sum of \$6,275.97 shall be levied and collected annually by a special rate sufficient therefor over, and above all other rates in the same manner and form and from the like persons and property by, from, upon or out of which other Separate School rates are levied, raised and collected, for the said period of twenty years.

6. The said sum of \$75,000.00 so borrowed and interest thereon and the said debentures shall be and the same are hereby made a charge upon the Schoolhouse property and premises and on the real and personal property vested in the said Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins, and upon all the Separate School rates of the said Board to be hereafter imposed until the said debentures and each and every of them, together with all interest thereon, shall have been fully paid and satisfied.

7. The said Debentures may contain any clause providing for the registration thereof authorized by any Statute relating to Municipal debentures in force at the time of the issue thereof.

Finally passed this 19th day of March 1923.

**SUGGESTION FOR BETTER MAIL SERVICE.**

Be sure to have your mail addressed properly before you post it. Every year the Canadian Post Offices get over sixteen million insufficiently or incorrectly addressed pieces of mail matter to handle. It is safe to say that in ninety per cent. of these cases the wrong or insufficiently addressing of such mail is due to carelessness and it results in delay in delivery with possible inconvenience or loss to the sender or addressee, which could all have been avoided had a little more care been taken in getting the mail ready. Here are some points to remember, which will help us to give you the best possible service.

(1) Place your name and address on the outside as well as inside your letters and parcels, because if the article cannot be delivered it will be promptly returned to you unopened. (undeliverable articles without your name and address on the outside have to go to the Dead Letter Office causing delay and inconvenience.)

(2) Address clearly and fully including street and number, or box number, if the addressee receives his mail in a box.

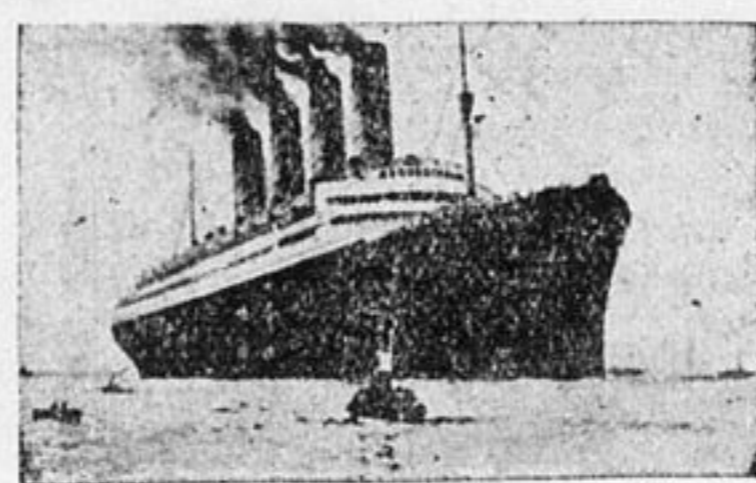
(3) Use ink. It won't wear off.

(4) Give the province or state, otherwise difficulty may arise.

(5) Wrap and tie your parcels securely.

(6) Register all valuable matter.
