**MARCH GOLD MINES SHAFT  
 MAKING GOOD PROGRESS**  
 The shaft of the March Gold Ine.  
 property, Porcupine, is now down 730  
 feet, splendid time having been made.  
 Progress has been at the rate of 100  
 feet a month.  
 At 730 feet depth what is known as  
 number one vein, a large body, came  
 into the shaft. It is thought that the  
 shaft will continue in it until 800 feet  
 where crosscutting will commence and  
 considerable lateral development car-  
 ried on.

 Capt. G. F. Morris, Chaplain and  
 Representative of the Navy League of  
 Canada, spent a few days last week in  
 Timmins in the interests of the Navy  
 League. In addition to the meeting in  
 the New Empire Theatre on Sunday  
 evening, to explain the plans and pur-  
 poses of the Navy League work, as  
 outlined in last issue of The Advance,  
 Capt. Morris made a canvass of the  
 town for subscriptions, renewal of  
 membership fees, and new members,  
 meeting with gratifying success. Capt.  
 Morris, before leaving Timmins, ex-  
 pressed his sincere appreciation of  
 the response made by Timmins and  
 district to the call for funds for the  
 sailors and their dependents.

**CANADIAN JEWS HELP IN  
 RE-BUILDING PALESTINE**  
 According to Treasurer's report for  
 period June 1922, to May 1923, the  
 sum of \$153,000 was received from  
 128 different cities in the Dominion at  
 the Head Office in Montreal. The ob-  
 ject for which this money is being col-  
 lected is to help the rebuilding of Pa-  
 lestine, which according to the famous  
 Balfour Declaration, the Jewish peo-  
 ple are given the opportunity of es-  
 tablishing there a Jewish homeland.  
 Great Britain having been granted the  
 mandate over the land. Considering  
 the financial situation prevailing, ex-  
 perts regard such a sum collected dur-  
 ing the given period as an achieve-  
 ment and the credit is due to the ef-  
 ficient propaganda carried on by the  
 Zionist Organization in Canada. The  
 Canadian Federation has the distinc-  
 tion of being counted second on the  
 list for activities and per capita re-  
 turns among the Zionist Federations  
 of the World. The Canadian Organiza-  
 tion has its branches all over the  
 Dominion counting about two-hundred  
 cities in which groups or affiliations  
 exist.

**M.P.P. ASKS RELIEF FOR  
 MATHESON FIRE SUFFERERS**  
 Among the items in a report of the  
 recent session of the Ontario Legisla-  
 ture, Toronto newspapers said:—  
 "Malcolm Lang condemned the T.  
 & N. O. Railway for not settling with  
 the Matheson fire sufferers according  
 to the arbitration award of June, 1921  
 and he declared that unless the com-  
 pany made a settlement of claims le-  
 gal action would result. Premier Drury  
 and Mr. Raney promised to take  
 the matter up."

 Last Wednesday, Mr. D. J. Moleski,

 portant changes made, and a first-  
 class hotel is to be conducted along  
 the most modern lines, with special  
 sample rooms for travellers, taxi and  
 bus service, and other features. Trips

 on Mr. Joe Clouthier's boat, "The  
 Foch" in connection with the Queen's  
 Hotel.
