

KIRKLAND LOSES TO DOME IN OPENING N.O.F.A. GAME

In Hard-Fought Contest on Dome Grounds Kirkland Lake Defeated 3 to 1.

The district football season was ushered in under most auspicious conditions last Saturday at the Dome when the homesters entertained the Kirkland Lake team before a very large and representative crowd. Mr. H. P. DePencier, President of the Dome Football Club, kicked off punctually at 6.30 amid the plaudits of the crowd. There was a large representation from Timmins at the match, the football enthusiasts turning out strong to get a line on both teams. The teams lined up as follows:—

Kirkland Lake—G. Cadman, goal; Shields and McPhail, backs; Hastie, Parsons and Purser, half-backs; Bolton, McKeown, Ramsay, Hamilton and Lucas, forwards.

Dome—Hendry, goal; Fell and Ewart, backs; Kellow, Harrower and Miner, half-backs; Armstrong, Hitt, Wallace, McKenna and Fidoek.

Linesmen—H. Charrette and W. Field.

Referee—Jack Marshall.

Harrower won the toss and set the Lake to face the sun. From the kick-off, play was at once taken into the visitors' territory, the Dome forwards exhibiting some very pretty combination and keeping the Lake defence very much on the alert. Parsons and Hastie showed up quite prominently. Fidoek, a last year's Dome Junior, was playing his first Senior game, on the extreme left, and together with McKenna, put in quite a lot of good work. Gordie Cadman, in goal for the Lake, was displaying his old-time form. The first goal scored against him was from a free-kick right in front of the goal. He made a nice save of a hot one sent in, and appeared to be getting rid of the ball, but the nippy Dome forwards pressed him so closely that he carried the ball several more steps than the rules allow, and Referee Marshall had no alternative but to award a free kick right in front of the Kirkland goal. Captain Harrower took this kick and very neatly outgassed the whole Lake team, sending a pass to Wallace who scored. Right from the centre, Bolton who was being cleverly held by Miner, eluded the defence with great speed, and made right for the Dome goal. It looked like a sure goal but the shot went well over the bar, much to the relief of the home crowd. Ramsay at centre was trying hard to break through, but he was well held by Bobby Harrower. The Lake tried hard to equalize, but the Dome defence was holding strong and gradually drove them back. The generalship of Capt. Harrower was constantly in evidence and his cleverness has a great deal at all times to do with the Dome team's success. Hitt put across a nice pass to Wallace and the latter scored the second goal with a brilliant shot. Cadman judged the shot very cleverly and threw himself to the far end to stop it, but luck was against him and he missed the save by a fraction. Play from now to half-time was very interesting, the Dome still having the best of the play, and half-time arriving with the home team leading by 2 to 0.

In the second half, play was still kept in the Lake half of the field, and it was not long before Armstrong, after some good work, added a third goal for the home team. After this the Dome team seemed to relax in their efforts, showing signs of having the game well in hand. Play as a consequence was more in favour of the visitors, and they worked hard to score. Ramsay, Hamilton and McKeown worked very hard to open a scoring account, but with all the pressure they exerted Hendry was not much pressed, which speaks volumes for the work of the Dome half-backs and backs. It looked as if the visitors would fail to break down the stone-wall defence, when Kellow gave away a doubtful penalty for a foul on Ramsay. This kick was well taken by Ramsay who made no mistake with a fast ground shot that gave Hendry no chance at all. When time was called, Dome had the honour of being the winners of a fast and well-played game by 3 goals to 1.

Summing up the game, it may be said that the Dome starts the season with a remarkably effective team, the combination work and the defence being particularly noteworthy. The Dome was specially good in the first half, though the Lake played hard, but their shooting was not good. The Lake showed up better in the second half. The crowd showed a fine sporting spirit the good plays on both sides being impartially applauded.

For the visitors, George Cadman in goal, was up to his old-time high standard, and made some wonderful saves. Parsons played a very fine game, Ramsay, Hamilton and McKeown starred in the forward line. Lucas, of last year's Dome team, was well watched by Kellow. After they have played



together a little longer the Kirkland team will have to be closely watched. They have good material and are a fine bunch of good sports.

The Dome has a well-balanced team and each man plays his place in very effective way. Consequently, it is not fair to pick individual members for special reference. It is the team that features at the Dome, and the Dome team is certainly a good aggregation of football players.

As referee, Jack Marshall gave very general satisfaction.

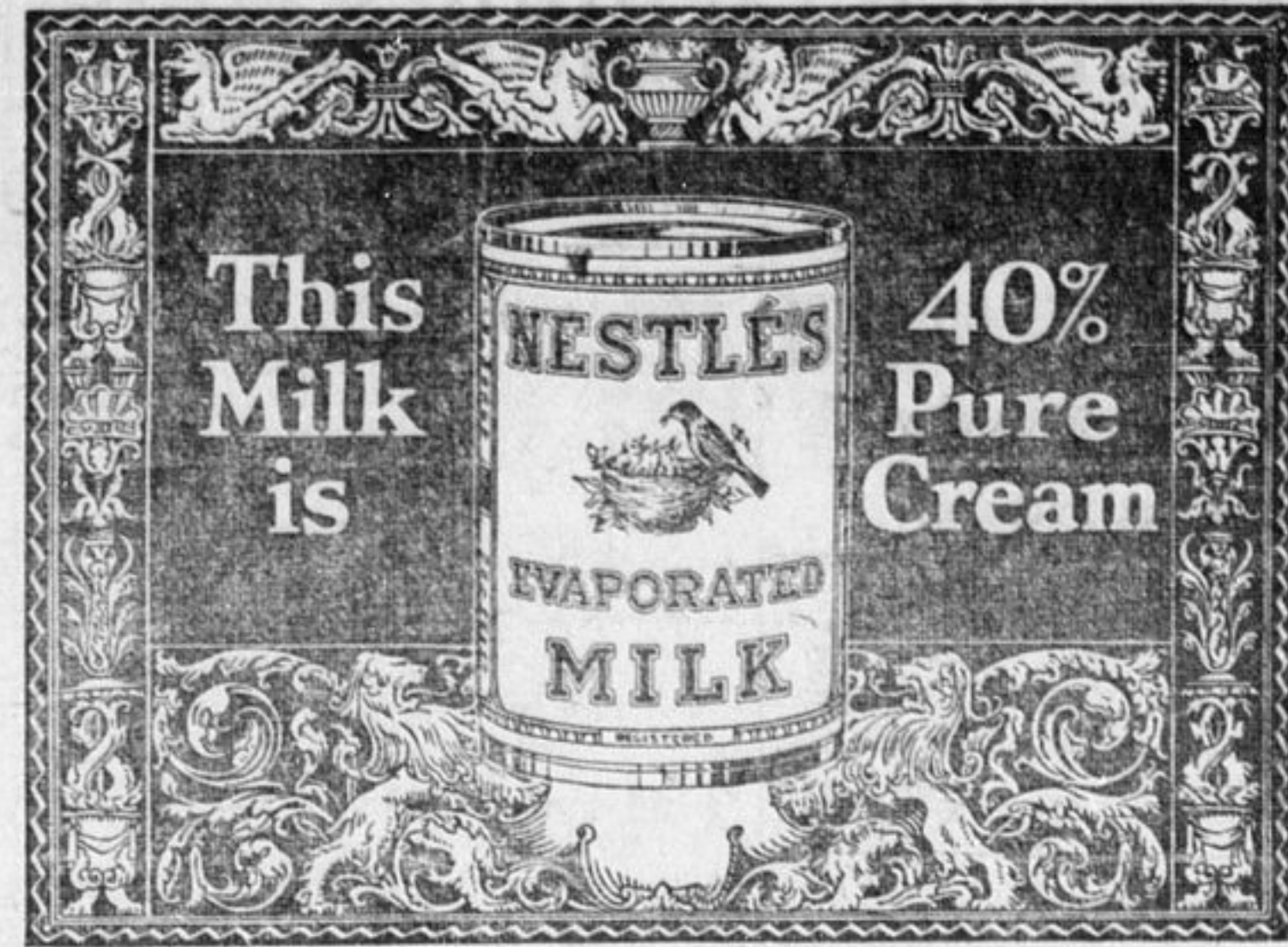
