### PREMIER DRURY DEFENDS HIS GOVERNMENT RECORD

only. Mr. Drury retorted that it was better propaganda than put out by the other parties, reference then being made to the Shevlin-Clark deal. This roused Mr. J. P. Bartleman who asked the Premier to give the facts in the Backus case. The Premier invited Mr. Bartleman to give the facts, and Mr. Bartleman started to do so from his reading of the evidence in the Telegram-Backus suit and the other inquiries. Mr. Bartleman claimed that the Government had not given competitors time to cruise the limits before the tenders were closed. Consequently, although there were three or four bids, they were all partners of Backus, as came out in direct evidence given by supporters of the Government at the time of the Telegram suit. "You did not give anyone time to cruise the limits," said Mr. Bartleman, "and you gave the White Dog Rapids to Backus and if anyone else had obtained the limits they could not have gotten water power." The Premier insisted that there had been time enough to cruise the limits, three months being allowed, and Hon. Mr. Ferguson had put limits up for sale on 16 to 20 days' notice in 1914. Mr. Bartleman persisted in his claim that there had not been time enough for cruising, and he disputed the Premier's statement that Mr. Anson had

cruised the limits. The Premier further argued that his Government would have been within its legal rights if it had sold the limits without public competition. The Premier then turned again to the insurance plan. He said an arrangement had been made with the London Guarantee & Accident Company of London, England, which had agreed to accept it in accordance with the farm loan credits, but even those farmers who do not come under the farm loan credits will be able to secure the new rate of insurance he said.

The Premier dealt at length on what the Government had done for the North, citing \$3,700,000 for Northern Ontario Development, \$1,000,000 on colonization, and \$1,400,000 on protection of forests and reforestation. With these figures he also managed to work in uncomplimentary references to Hon. Mr. Ferguson and the Conservative Government generally.

The Premier did not touch on the O.T.A., nor did he deal in any way with the mining industry, though these two questions are probably the ones of most vital interest to the public in this district. Mr. John Vanier, Labour Party candidate for this riding, was the only other speaker for the evening, and on account of the lateness of the hour he made his address a brief one. Mr. Vanier asserted his freedom to support a Government that not only was favourable to the North Land but upheld the policies for which he stood. "I will support you," he said to Mr. Drury "only if you accept the policies for which I stand." The Premier nodded his head. Mr. Vanier made it clear that he was a straight Labour and North Land candidate, and not pledged to support any party or Government in particular, but free to give his support to any Government that was working for the North and for Labour. Agriculture, mining and lumbering were the three great industries of this country, Mr. Vanier pointed out, and he had a definite policy and platform for the advancement and safeguarding of these industries. One of Mr. Vanier's suggestions was that the fire rangers be employed all the year round. To get to this meeting Mr. Vanier had to walk eight miles to get his train, and he had consequently

gone without food from morning until after the meeting. It is his intention to hold a public meeting in Timmins at an early date to fully discuss the problems of the North Land and to explain the planks of his programme.

#### PUTTING THE CAPTURE OF ROGERS "ON THE HOG"

A yarn was around town last week to the effect that Rogers, the North Bay bandit, had been captured Wednesday night. "He was caught in a pig pen," the smart lad would say. "How did they come to locate him," the innocent by-stander would ask. "Oh, the pig squealed on him," was the reply.

#### GETTING THINGS TWISTED REGARDING HAILEYBURY

Newspapers inside and outside the North Land have been doing their best to "boost" Haileybury, and so help in some measure in aiding that town to recover from the disastrous fire of 1922. Just how the outside newspapers have gone far astray in this good work is indicated by the following paragraph in the last issue of The Haileyburian:— "It was brought to our attention this week that Haileybury is being boosted as a workman's paradise in points as far away as Nova Scotia. We have been told that several workmen from the Maritime Provinces arrived here recently in search of work, having read in their home papers that there were four thousand men required immediately for the rebuilding of Haileybury. This seems rather far fetched, as the population of the town was only about 3,500 at the time of the fire, and people in other provinces should be able to ascertain this fact before coming. Everyone in Haileybury wants to see the town grow, but there is a limit to the accommodation at present, and the flooding of the town with unemployed workmen will not help things along. However, there is usually a demand for men in the district, and perhaps the boosting we are getting in other provinces will eventually do good in a general way."

#### ESCAPED PRISONER MAY BE TERMED "PREVALENT"

The dictionary defines "prevalent" as "predominant; most generally received or current; extensively existing." That seemed to just about fit Leo Rogers, the young fellow who escaped from custody at North Bay and shot two police officers, causing the death of one. Last week Rogers was "predominant" in the press and in the conversation of the people. Judging by the reports current he was also peculiarly "generally received or current," apparently being dozens of places all at the one time. That he was most "extensively existing" would seem to be proven by the fact that he was reported as existing at the same moment at points hundreds of miles apart. One issue of a Toronto newspaper reported the arrest of Rogers at North Bay, Ottawa, Madawaska, Aurora, Toronto and Corbeil. In each case, however, the arrested man proved to be other than the man wanted. So Rogers not only proved himself "prevalent," but most "elusive" as well.
