TORONTO STAR CONTINUES SLANDERING THE NORTH

In an editorial article last week The Toronto Star returned last week to what is apparently one of its favourite pastimes—the slandering of the North Land. The Star's editorial presumed to deal with the Leo Rogers case, and in the course of some platitudinal comments, The Star seized the occasion to suggest that the North Land is the particular home for serious crime and desperate criminals. Perhaps it is useless to reply with the facts of the case and state that the North Land's record is a remarkably good one so far as morality and law observance are concerned. The mining camps of New Ontario are famed throughout the world for their orderliness and moral healthfulness. The lumber camps in similar manner compare more than favourably with other camps elsewhere. The rural districts are as moral and law-regarding as any of the country sections of Old Ontario,—and that is not saying as much as might be thought at first blush. In view of conditions in the North Land,—the proportion of foreigners, the small proportion of peace officers to the population, the newness of the country, and other factors, the North Land has reason to be proud of its record. Welland and Oshawa, for example, are two Old Ontario towns having many of the difficulties and conditions that confront North Land centres like Timmins and Sudbury. If comparison is made between such towns, the creditable showing will

appear for the North Land places. Even in the matter of fad legislation like the O.T.A., that has little to do with crime and less with order and decency, the advantage would appear to lie with the North. Here the law is more thoroughly enforced against rich and poor alike, and even then this country does not seem to be any worse than its neighbors to the south. It is all very well for politicians to prate against referring to "Old" and "New" Ontario, or the "North" and the "South," and pleading that all should unite simply as the people of Ontario. Why not direct such talk to The Toronto Star, for example. The North Land is not going to mildly pose as an integral part of the Province for political purposes, but a "horrible example" to be lectured as a distinct section when it suits the purposes of the unnecessarily good folks of the South. Drury would have the North Land as a cow to be milked; The Star would have it as a bad lad to be kicked. But the North Land has other ideals for itself. The North Land is simply a land of wonderful possibilities, and many good people and a few not so good. It is striving to open and develop a new country and build up communities of prosperous, progressive and creditable citizens. As a new land, pioneered under great difficulties, the South should be proud of this country instead of having the tendency to lecture and preach to it from a self-appointed attitude of supposed sanctity and superiority. The Star will have its hands well filled in explaining Toronto's crime record, the crime record of certain rural sections, and the crime record of cities that might be named, one for instance with lesser population than the North Land, and yet holding the record of having more unpunished murders than this country has had of all kinds of murders.

During the week-end there was a well-contested baseball game between two selected teams,—the Wanderers and the French-Canadians. The match was an interesting one and suggested the amount of good baseball talent available in town. The crowd enjoyed the game, while doubtful as to the score or the winners.

At the last meeting of the Porcupine Board of Trade the President, Mr. W. MacGregor, resigned, and Mr. R. Dipaolo was elected as president in his place. The meeting requested the new President to get in touch with the T. & N. O. to find out why the stopping of the trains Nos. 46 and 47 has been discontinued. On June 3rd, six men were left unaccommodated at Golden City because the train did not stop, and practically every day similar inconvenience is caused by the trains not stopping at Golden City.

A suggestion was also made that the Porcupine Board of Trade give all possible assistance to the prospectors of the district in having the law amended to remove disadvantages now obtaining.
