**NEW ROAD TO PAYMASTER
 PAVED WITH HIGH-GRADE**

Dump Rock From Well-Known Por-
 cupine Property Shows Some
 Rich Specimens.
 Laborers and teamsters working on
 the new Government road between
 reported to be in
 Timmins and the Premier Paymaster
 Mine are reported to be finding many
 fine specimens of "high grade" in
 the rock they are taking from the
 mine dump for road building.
 In order to facilitate the finishing
 of this new road with a dressing of
 rock, the management at the Paymas-
 ter very kindly co-operated with the
 Government by allowing them to re-
 move part of their old dumps, and in
 the course of this work something of
 the richness of the Paymaster Mine
 was revealed. These specimens are
 coming from what was presumed to be
 all waste rock that was mined and
 thrown out on the dump during the
 past winter.
 Not only have rich specimens been
 found while loading the wagons at
 the mine dumps but some more very
 rich specimens have been found by
 parties walking over the road after
 the rock has been spread.
 It is safe to say that this new Pay-
 master road is probably the "highest
 grade" road ever built anywhere in
 the world as some of the specimens
 exhibited would easily run \$10,000 to
 the ton in gold. Automobile owners
 driving over this road to the Pay-
 master Mine are expecting to have
 "Gold Filled" tires before the sum-
 mer is over.

**GOLD EXPEDITION SAILS
 FOR NORTHERN LABRADOR**

Last month "The Petrel," a vessel
 chartered from the Canadian Govern-
 ment, sailed from St. John, Newfound-
 land, for the coast of Northern Labra-
 dor in quest of gold. There is a party
 of seven on board, headed by M. Ogil-
 vie, an Ottawa mining engineer and
 pioneer prospector, who has been in
 many big gold rushes, including the
 Klondyke and British Columbia gold
 rushes. The boat has a skilled cap-
 tain and a crew of 22. The party has
 full equipment for making thorough
 tests of ore, etc., as well as the usual
 prospectors' outfits. There have been
 persistent reports as to the presence
 of gold in the northern stretches of
 Labrador and this party is to test out
 the theories. Any kind of a "rush"
 to Labrador before gold was actually
 discovered and steps taken for es-
 tablishing communications with the
 world would be a sure disaster. It will
 be at least October before the party
 referred to will be able to send back
 even a preliminary report of their
 findings.
