Timmins and District Notes

Mr. R. D. Smith, of London, Ont., was a visitor to the Camp this week.

Haileybury is planning to build a new fire hall to cost around \$15,000.00.

The next regular meeting of the Town Council will be on Monday afternoon next, June 11th, at 4 p.m.

The Public Health Nurse has moved from the King building to the Courtemanche Block, next to The Advance office. The Clinic Rooms are now very comfortably and conveniently located in the premises recently occupied by Ivan Stadelman's book and music store.

Premier Drury denounces Ferguson, and speaks slightly of Wellington Hay. The latter condemns Drury and does not seem to have much regard for Hon. Mr. Ferguson. Hon. Mr. Ferguson severely scores Drury and apparently treats Hay with more or less silent contempt. Apparently they are all a bad lot. They're all pussyfooting on the O.T.A.

Among the local items in a recent issue of The Cochrane Post was the following:—"Mr. J. R. O'Neil, Conservative candidate, of the Dome Mines in Porcupine, came up yesterday and is leaving tonight for the different points on the C.N.R. to get acquainted with his constituents. Mr. O'Neil is an old Cochrane boy, having been here during construction days in 1911 and '12, but finds few of the old-timers left."

There is just as likely as not to be a big police court this week,—because there were only a few cases the beginning of this week. Chief Greer and his men, however, are likely any time to turn one of these small dockets into a crowded one. The cases now on the docket include a charge of breach of the early closing by-law, a charge against an alien of illegally having firearms, a case of breach of the auto regulations, and a man accused of being drunk and having liquor illegally in a public place. There is also a Russian held at the jail for examination as to his sanity.

A start has been made on the actual construction of the new Court House at Haileybury, the foundation being now put in. The new Court House will be considerably larger than the one destroyed in the 1922 fire.

Mr. J. P. McLaughlin, now of Toronto, but one of the pioneer businessmen of Timmins, and for two years Mayor of the town, is spending a few days here renewing acquaintances and looking after the several business interests he still has in this district.

Mr. Wm. Burns, of New Liskeard, has taken up residence in Timmins. "Billy" will make a noteworthy addition to the hockey talent of Timmins, having been one of the experts of the Creamery Town team for some years.

Dominion Day, July 2nd, will be observed in Timmins this year by a big day of sports to be presented by the Timmins Football Club. There will be baseball, football, field sports, athletics, novelties, etc. Arrangements are now being made to have a first programme for the occasion.

It is understood that all the construction material to be used in the Quinze power project is to be brought over the T. & N. O. Railway to Haileybury and then transported across the lake by boat. This will mean a noteworthy addition this summer to T. & N. O. freight traffic.

Messrs. George and Joe. Robitaille of Cobalt came before Judge Hartman last week and pleaded guilty to the charges against them. The latter was fined \$100 and costs, and the former given not less than three months nor more than two years. The charges arose from trouble with the police when Joe was arrested for being noisily drunk. He did not want to be arrested and the brother took a hand in the matter, the police being somewhat battered by the use of a piece of iron.

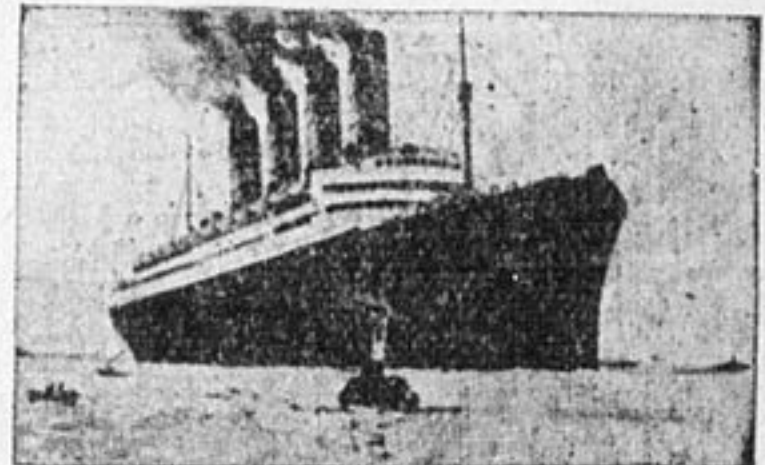
