HAILEYBURY STRIVING TO REGAIN ITS BEAUTY

Haileybury for many years was the beauty town of the North Land. Since the fire of last October, however, Haileybury has been forced into the class of unsightly towns. This has naturally been one of the griefs of the people of Haileybury who always took a great interest in the fine appearance of their community. Others who knew Haileybury have also missed its attractive old-time appearance. Both Haileyburians and others in the North Land who have taken pride in the appearance of Haileybury, the County Town, will be pleased to know that the citizens of Haileybury are not forgetting their old-time good ideas about having a pleasant appearing town. In the last issue of The Haileyburian the following paragraph appeared:—"Although Haileybury as a town is rapidly 'coming back,' and presents a brave and prosperous appearance as compared with the weeks immediately following the great fire last fall, the hand of time alone can restore much of the natural beauty of her surroundings. TIMMINS GOT REVENGE LAST THURSDAY, 12 TO 6

The following is The Broke Hustler's brief report of the district baseball last Thursday at Timmins:— Timmins secured sweet revenge for the two defeats handed them by the local ball tossers when they administered a 12 to 6 lambasting to the Falls last Thursday at Timmins. Poor pitching, failure to hit in the pinches and terrible fielding were the reasons for the town boys defeat. The grounds at Timmins were in awful shape, the infield being ankle deep with sand, but even this is not alibi enough for eight errors. Oscar, at short was the worst offender with four marked up against him while Bill Brydge and Fritz Anson accounted for a brace apiece. Timmins also ran wild on the bags, pilfering no less than five bases from Morrison, who suffered from a bad finger nail and a temporary slightly glazed arm. Coombs played a nice game at first, picking several bad throws out of the dirt. Fritz also knocked down a couple of hard drives at the hot corner but was playing in hard luck. Brydge's errors were also of the tough break variety, caused by over anxiety to make a double play.

McLean, shortstop for the Timmins team appears to be the most finished ball player in the North country. Outside of making five putouts, having five assists with only one misplay and getting three hits, all of which he turned into runs, he did not do anything all afternoon.

Spence, the pride of Timmins, was touched up freely by the locals but was saved by the first class support of his teammates. The errors made by Timmins, did not come when hits meant runs, as in the case of the Falls.

Flanders, started off well, but was a trifle wild and after a few errors had been mixed with half a dozen hits he was taken out by the "Chief" and Derosiers sent in. Derosiers allowed only four hits for the remaining five innings but was also the victim of many errors.

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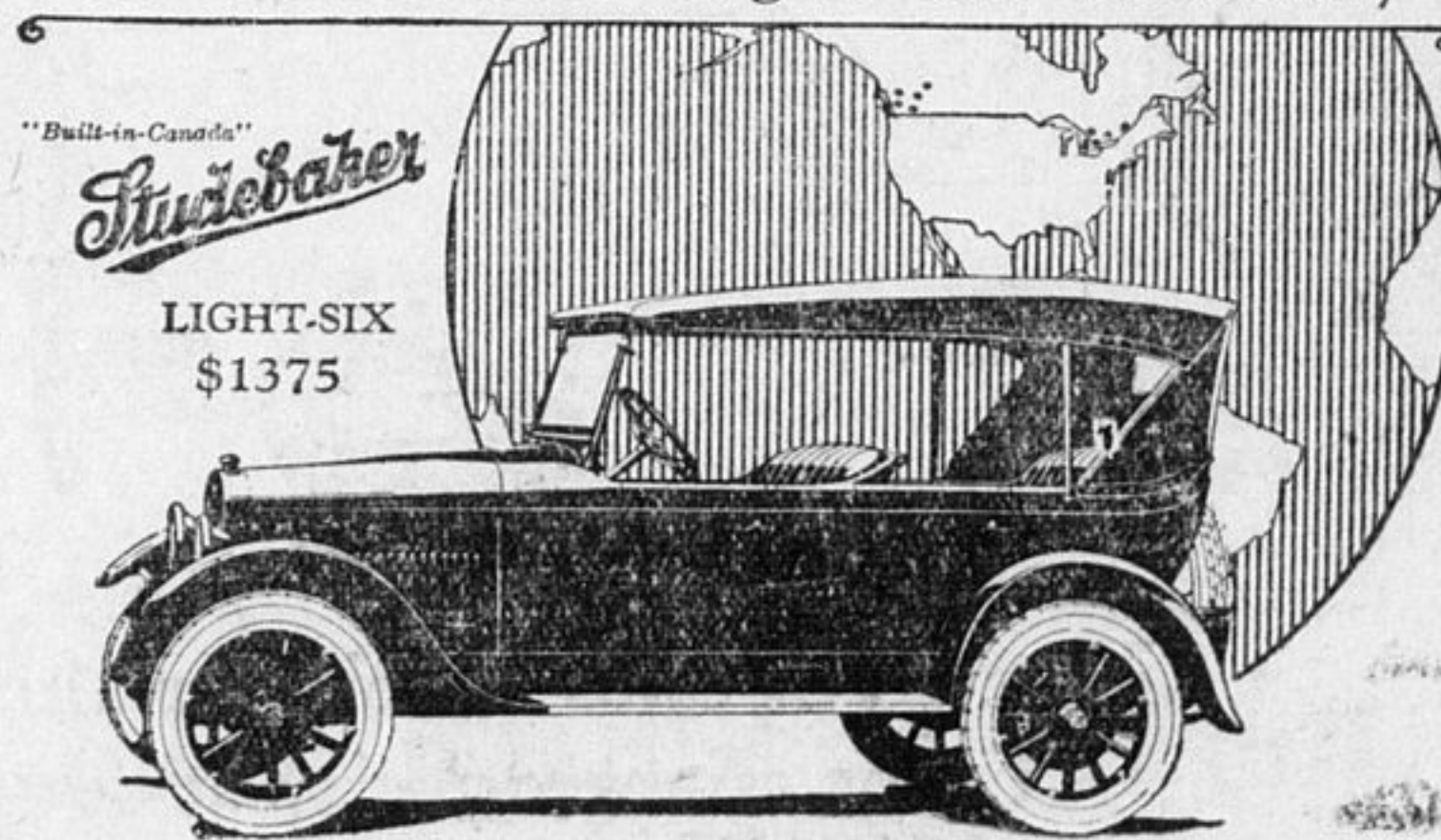
