FAMOUS ENGLISH PICTURE AT NEW EMPIRE THIS WEEK

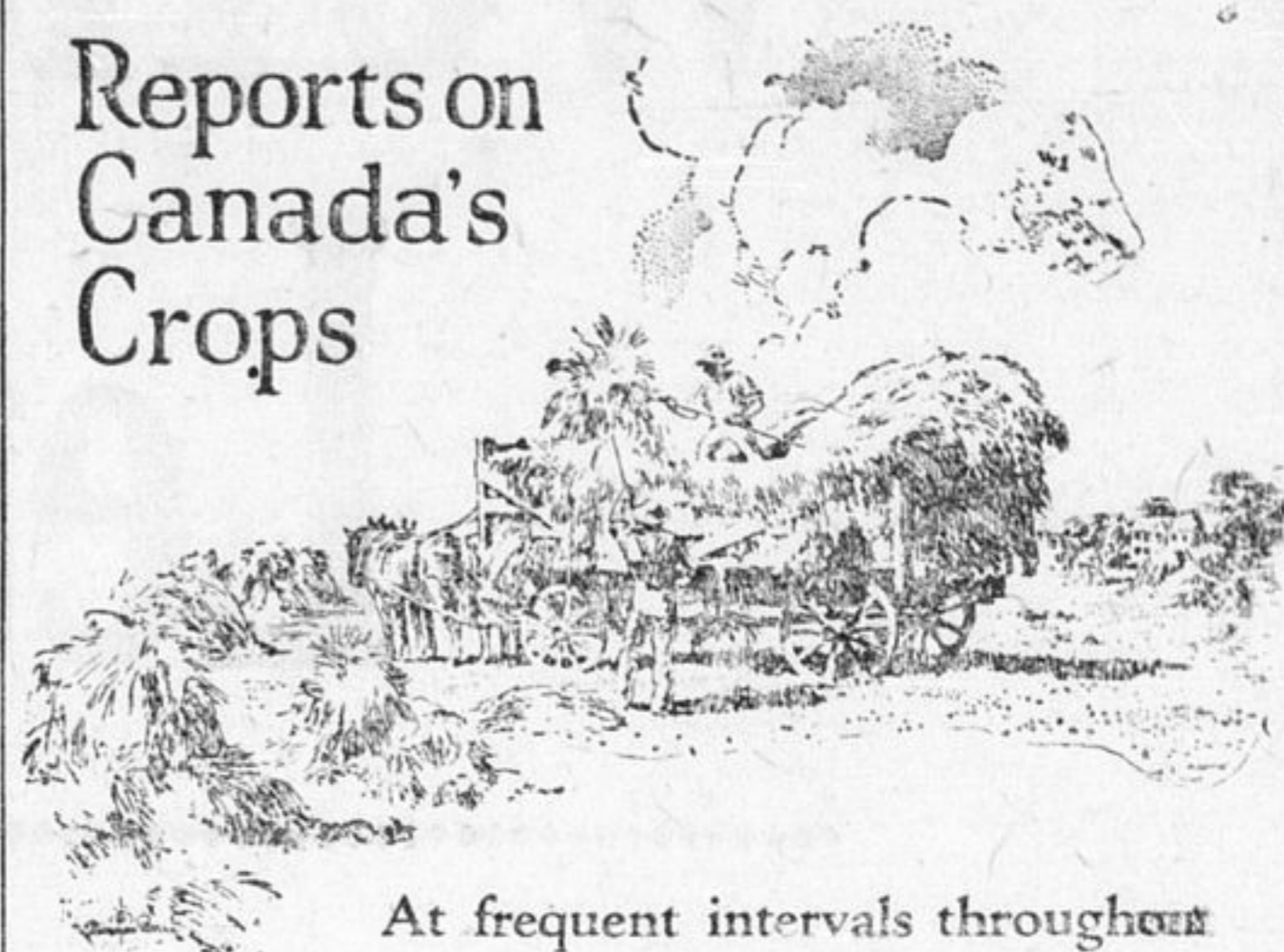
The special at the New Empire Theatre this Friday and Saturday, June 22nd and 23rd, is "The Game of Life," an English production that has made a record hit not only in the Old Land but in this country. "The Game of Life" is the story of three girls who were born on the same day as Queen Victoria, May 24th, 1819. The picture proper starts on Coronation Day, 1837, introducing the six principal characters in the story on that gala occasion. Fate takes these six people and plunges them through the game of life. There is interest and dramatic effect in every scene. An actual Derby of the Victorian period is shown with all the remarkable types of the bookies, jockies, etc. The story then takes the characters through the dramatic turn of fortune at the old London Music Hall, which is staged to the last detail from the original prints in the British Museum. Then there is the murder trial at the Old Bailey, famous in Dickens and Thackeray and in the pages of British history. The burning of the Blackmoor prison is shown, with the convicts depicted as frenzied and the guards as panic-stricken. Then the Game of Life proceeds to the Crimea, and there are glimpses of the battles of Balaclava, Inkerman and others.

Perhaps the most remarkable scene of all, and one of the most striking in all motion picture history is the reproduction of the Charge of the Light Brigade. The charge as shown in the picture was staged by special permission of His Majesty King George V., who loaned the producer of "The Game of Life" 600 light cavalrymen from the very same regiment which performed the glorious exploit on the Balaclava battleground 68 years ago.
