RT. REV. L. RHEAUME NEW BISHOP OF HAILEYBURY

New Bishop a Member of the Oblate Order, First Missionaries in This Part of North Land

Despatches last week from Rome conveyed the information that Pope Pius had appointed the Right Rev. Louis Rheaume as Bishop of Haileybury, to succeed the late Bishop Latulippe, in charge of the Roman Catholic Church in this part of the North Land.

It is understood that the consecration of the new Bishop will take place at Ottawa on August 24th, Archbishop Emard and other prelates officiating.

The Bishop-elect was born at Levis, Quebec, in 1873, and so is 50 years of age. He studied engineering at Laval University and later joined the Oblate Order. This Order furnished this part of the North Land with its first missionaries who established what has been known as the Old Mission in 1843. The headquarters of the Order for the district was moved to Ville Marie in 1884 and from this centre the Oblate Order has done its good work through the northern portions of Ontario and Quebec for more than a third of a century. Rev. Fr. Rheaume went to Rome in 1898 to make theological studies. He received the degree of D.D. in 1904. In April, 1904, he was ordained a priest of the church. After serving at Ottawa University as professor of higher mathematics, he was rector of that university from 1915 to 1921. He has been Director of the Seminary of Theology at Ottawa since 1921.

As a theologian and educationalist, the Bishop-elect has the highest standing and a wide reputation as a man of superior talents and piety. His appointment is a compliment to the bishopric of Haileybury.

Until the Papal Bulls relative to the appointment are received, the diocese will remain in charge of the administrator, Rev. Father Gauvin, of North Temiskaming.

There has been much in the way of rumors and reports regarding a division of the diocese or the making of two bishoprics from the large area now in charge of the Haileybury See. Also, there has been talk of Cochrane, instead of Haileybury, being the headquarters for the new bishop when appointed. There is nothing official

announced in regard to these matters and so it may be taken for granted that for the present the See will remain as before. The matter of the residence of the new Bishop will likely be decided upon after the Bishop formally takes over his new duties.

HAILEYBURY WHARF TO BE REBUILT IN NEAR FUTURE

The amount of \$26,400 has been provided in the estimates of the Department at Ottawa for the rebuilding of the Haileybury wharf, and the main part of the wharf will be built this year, the foundations having been put in this spring. Work is expected to be started at an early date, tenders having been called for and considered.

WILL EXTEND RAILWAY TO ROUYN, IF CAMP HOLDS GOLD

Mr. Geo. W. Lee, Chairman of the T. & N.O. Railway Commission, is quoted as saying that if the Rouyn gold camp proves up as well as present reports would indicate the Kirkland Lake branch of the T. & N.O. will be extended under the Nipissing Central charter into the new Quebec gold mining area. Surveys for such an extension are being made at present, and if the new camp proves up the surveys will be followed by actual railway building. This will be following the announced policy of the T. & N.O. to provide the North Land with railway facilities in every section where a line is needed and where it shows promise of being moderately profitable.

KIRKLAND VOTES AGAINST LIGHTS FOR SWASTIKA

Teck Township recently had two by-laws submitted to the people. One was in regard to a debenture issue and carried by a majority of 7. Swastika voted solidly for the by-law, but Kirkland Lake's vote was 20 for and 77 against, the total, however, of the two towns making it 84 for and 77 against. The second vote was on the agreement with the Northern Ontario Light & Power Co. This was to provide Swastika with light and power. Swastika gave a unanimous vote for the lights, 65 voting for and none against. Kirkland Lake, however, upset this by a vote of only 16 for and 81 against. Thus the total vote from the two places was 81 for and 81 against, or a tie, and the by-law was thus lost. As a result Swastika will remain without electric lights.
