**TRIPLE COMPARTMENT
SHAFT FOR PENINSULAR**

Will be Sunk to 425 Feet This Year. Recent Developments at Mine.

In a recent letter sent out by Mr. James R. Dodworth, Chairman of the Board of the Night Hawk Peninsular Mines, much interesting information is given to shareholders. Mr. Dodworth says, in part:—

"Eight of your Board of Directors visited the mine June 1st to make a personal examination of the underground and surface developments, and all feel that General Manager Globe has been very conservative in his reports from time to time.

"The operation has taken on an air of real mining importance, as the results to date mark it as the most important new development in the Porcupine District.

"I beg to inform you of the recent developments which are as follows:—

Exploration—A diamond drill hole is being sunk at a point about 800 feet East of the present shaft for the purpose of cutting the mineralized zone at a depth of about 700 feet. It is expected that this hole will give us sufficient information to guide in the location of a new triple compartment shaft which will be sunk and completed to the 425 foot level by

January 1st, 1924. This shaft will be sunk to greater depths, to open up additional ore reserves.

Development—Underground development has been confined to the third and fourth levels with highly satisfactory results.

On the 300 foot level, No. 4 vein has been drifted on for a distance of over 400 feet, all in ore. The present face is still of the average grade with every indication of a continuance of the same. This ore body has an average width of eight feet and value of about \$11.50 per ton.

No. 5 vein on this level still continues strong and is a sulphide ore body about 9 feet wide and with an average value of about \$8.00 per ton.

Stopes are being started in No. 1 vein on this level to prepare for production when mill is ready.

On the 425 foot level, vein No. 5 East of 29 cross cut has been driven a distance of about 90 feet. This is a strong sulphide vein with an average width of 7 feet, with a value of about \$8.00 per ton.

A raise has been started in No. 1 vein on this level for the purpose of connecting through to the level above.

A telegram has just been received from Mr. Globe stating that No. 4 vein on this level has been cut to 29 cross cut South, showing a total width of 17 feet with sample assays running from \$10.00 to \$17.00 per ton, averaging about \$13.50 per ton across the entire width. This is a very strong sulphide vein with every showing of permanency. Mr. Globe states that this is the most important strike in the history of the mine.

Construction—Additional sleeping camps for the men and staff are being erected together with additions to the dining room and cookery. When completed, we will have accommodation for about 140 men exclusive of the staff, which should be sufficient for some time to come. A telephone line has been completed from the mine to Connaught Station, providing local and long distance connections.

A 40 ton scow has been built, and a heavy duty gasoline boat for moving and other purposes, will be delivered this week. A 60 foot dock and a tram have been constructed for the proper and economical handling of equipment at the mine.

Mill—Practically all of the equipment for the 200 ton mill has been purchased and is now being delivered. Rapid progress will be made from now on and Mr. Globe confidently expects the mill to be in operation by November 1st next.

Power—A power contract was entered into with the Great Northern Power Company, Limited several months ago for a supply of electric power sufficient for our purposes for some time to come. This contract includes a priority clause and also a guarantee by the Power Company to furnish power by not later than July 31st next.

The power line from South Porcupine to the Company's property (about 14 miles in length) is under active construction and should be completed by July 1st.

General—In order to be fully assured that the milling process adopted would be the right one, additional mill tests were made at the Dome Mines, several months ago by Mr. C. W. Dowsett, General Superintendent and the results obtained checked up fully with those previously made by the Temiskaming Testing Laboratories at Haileybury last year.

Our Manager Mr. A. R. Globe and his staff are all highly pleased with the success of the operations, and are earnestly working to bring the property into production at the earliest possible moment.
