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BIG CROWD AND GOOD TIME AT FOOTBALL SPORTS DAY

Football, Baseball and Golf Contests Rouse Special Interest. Novelty-ties Attract Crowd.

The Day of Sports and Novelties at Timmins on Monday, under the auspices of the Timmins Football Club, may be written down as a great success in every way. There was one of the biggest crowds ever gathered in this Camp. Everyone had a good time and enjoyed the events. There was something doing every minute, and general interest was at a high point all day. Financially the event was a success, nearly \$600 being netted from the occasion. The financial statement appears elsewhere in this issue. In view of the general success of the day the Committees in charge of the various features feel recompensed for the time, effort, interest and hard work necessary to arrange and stage the event. The whole event was handled by the executive of the Football Club, committees from the executive being in charge of each department.

There were only two points upon which there was any "fall-down." One was the fact that the programme could not be followed according to schedule. This was due to the delay in the first baseball match which threw arrangements out along the line. However, there were no dull moments, and the crowd was well pleased. The other point was the way so many crowded out on the grounds interfering with the events and shutting off the view of those in the grandstands. The Committees did their very best to offset this, and regret very much the unfairness to those who kept behind the wires. Next time arrangements will be made to keep ALL behind the wires, so as to give equal chance to all to see the events properly.

The music by the Timmins Citizens' Band was a much-appreciated feature of the day. The conducting of the Band by the Maseot and the latter's speech from the throne also greatly amused the crowd.

The baseball games were followed with the keenest interest and the winning of the medals by Bob Wilson's Pels was a popular one. They had to work for the victory. The Canadians gave them a run for their money in the morning, the game being a lively one with lots of good baseball. The score was 14 to 4, but the game was a lot better than that. In the afternoon in the game with the Mill team it looked for a time as if Bob Wilson's team might lose out all together, but they staged a rally, Scotty Coghoun being a material factor in the winning of the game, the final score being 11 to 10. Friend Bob Wilson is the proud man, even threatening now to wear all the handsome gold medals himself.

The Football matches for the day were specially good ones. After a fine exhibition of good play Timmins Juniors won from Dome Juniors 3 to 2, thus securing the generally coveted medals. Mr. E. ABOUT FOUR APPEALS AGAINST ASSESSMENT

General Increase in Land Values in Town. Majority of Assessments Sustained.

The Court of Revision to hear appeals against the 1923 Assessment Roll held its first session at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning. This court is composed of members of the Town Council. There were about forty appeals. In the large majority of cases the assessments were confirmed, though a number secured reductions from the figures set by the assessor. There has been a general increase in land values, owing to the growth and development of the town and the assessor in defending his figures emphasized the increased values of land here as the importance of the town increases.

There was one regrettable feature of the session. A number of those appealing had pressed their cases strongly and the assessor came in for some criticism. Apparently the criticism "got his goat," for eventually he attempted to push one citizen from the room. A scuffle followed in the court room, with the police promptly intervening and restoring order. The assessor should remember that content and criticism are inevitable in his position, and that as a servant of the people he must be prepared to be long-suffering and kind and all the rest of it.

There were a few cases not disposed of, these being left over until the next session of the court which will be held after the Council meeting on Monday, July 9th.

Another special was the Golf. Mr. C. G. Williams won the Shield for the men's events, and Mrs. D. Grinston was the winner of the ladies' event.

VIPOND PLANNING FOR DEVELOPMENT AT DEPTH

Operations are being carried on at the Vipond by steam power. Work is being conducted on the 300, 400 and 500 foot levels. On the 500 ft. level they have cut the downward extension of the ore body already proven at the 300 and 400 ft. levels which showed a very good commercial grade of ore along with considerable high-grade. The vein at the 500-ft. has widened out considerably, and appears to be much richer also. The indications are that the ore body will show still more favourably at greater depth. The intention is to open up the 600-ft. level and prove the vein there. A separate ore body has also been proven to exist at the 1,000-ft., and in addition to opening up at the 600-ft., the company intends to develop the ore on the 1,000-ft. level.

MONTHLY MEETING BOARD OF TRADE NEXT MONDAY

Owing to the regular meeting night of the Timmins Board of Trade for this month falling on the holiday, it was decided to postpone the meeting to Monday evening next. Another for driving the wrong side of the silent police. A third fine was imposed for taking on passengers within the prohibited area.

CONSISTENT DEVELOPMENT AT THE MARSH GOLD MINES

In connection with the recent visit to the Camp of some of those interested in the Marsh Gold Mines, it is interesting to note the progress made by the property. So far as known there is no recent official statement made but the general opinion seems to be that the money had been well expended on the property, and has been spent for actual mining work that should give results. A consistent development campaign has been capably carried out. The shaft is down 700 feet, and results are understood to be very promising. The Marsh Gold Mines is working two claims in Deloro Township, south of Ankerite.

VISITORS LAST WEEK TO NEW YORK-PORCUPINE

Mr. H. A. DeHalle, of the New York-Porcupine Mines visited the Camp last week, accompanied by a party from Brooklyn, Lockport, Jamestown and other points in New York State. The party spent some time at the New York-Porcupine property and were very favourably impressed. The New York-Porcupine is in Tisdale and adjoins the Dome immediately on the south. There is a shaft down 200 feet. Recently a very extensive and encouraging diamond drilling campaign has been carried out, and it is now the intention to open up some of the ore indicated by the diamond drilling.

TIMMINS FIREMEN WIN REEL RACE AT LISKEARD

Only Brigade to Win Two Prizes at Annual Firemen's Tournament.

At the annual Temiskaming Firemen's Tournament held at New Liskeard on Monday the Timmins Brigade was the only one to carry off more than one prize. And at that, Timmins played in hard luck. The ill-luck really started before the brigade left here on Sunday, for when it came time for the train it was found that one of their best men, the old reliable Jack Morrison, was unable to make the trip owing to illness. This left the brigade a man down, but re-arrangements were made for the events and the boys were still well in the running. In the main event of the day at Liskeard, the Wagon Race the boys had a little more hard luck. One of the men whose position had to be changed from the usual was left handed and in getting off the wagon he brought the hose against Alex. Borland, Jr., who was thus suddenly unbalanced for a moment. In keeping his feet Alex dislocated his injured shoulder and was out of the race for the time. Despite this accident, however, the boys made a great record and finished only two-fifths of a second behind the winners of the event, coming in second place. In the Reel Race, Timmins won by a big margin. In the other feature of the tournament, the Ladder Race, Timmins showed practical efficiency. The way in which Timmins recovered from the effects of the accident in the Wagon Race and actually made up time, coming within a fraction of a second of winning, shows the practical nature of the training and practice of the local brigade. The brigade was in charge of Deputy Chief W. G. Smith and his aide-de-camp, J. D. McLean, Fire Chief Borland remaining on guard at Timmins for the day.
