SPREAD RAIL BLAMED FOR ACCIDENT NEAR NORTH BAY

Last Friday's train No. 47 from Toronto was cancelled for the day so far as this district was concerned, on account of an accident about two miles north of Powassan. Six coaches of the train were derailed. Two of the day coaches tumbled down a 15 foot embankment, yet no one was hurt, although the wreck was not on the T. & N.O., but south of the Bay. However, they were T. & N.O. Rail-

way coaches and these coaches are trained from earliest childhood not to hurt anybody when a wreck occurs, as is the habit of wrecks. When the news reached here that No. 47 was wrecked and that the accident had occurred below North Bay, there was a tendency to fear serious consequences, especially as no particulars were available in regard to the mix-up. Information coming later, however, proved that it is safe travelling in T. & N.O. coaches. Some of the passengers got a shaking-up but none were even bruised, let alone worse injured. Going round a curve near Powassan the first and second class coaches run off the track, pulling the sleepers off with them. The coaches took a header down the bank, but the sleepers contented themselves with hanging over. The cause of the accident is thought to have been a spread rail.

BEAVERS PUT ONE OVER ON MEMBER FOR THIS RIDING

A couple of years ago Major Mac Lang made a reputation as a prophet by foretelling the type of weather the winter would be like.
