ONTARIO LICENSE BOARD VISITED HERE LAST WEEK

Mr. James Hales, Chairman, and Mr. George Smith, Commissioner, of the Board of License Commissioners of Ontario, were in Timmins last week and also visited other towns in the district during a regular tour of the North Land. Mr. Smith is well known all through the North, having been for many years a resident of Haileybury, and also being in the public eye on account of his long connection with the License Board both before and after the passing of the O. T.A. Messrs. Hales and Smith were here to study conditions at first hand. Generally they were pleased with the excellent order of the Town and the general good law enforcement. The License Board is constantly in receipt of complaints in regard to the enforcement of the law and kindred matters. In regard to Timmins the number of complaints has not been as large as might reasonably be expected. Chairman Hales said that there had been some complaints made but there were practically none in regard to houses improperly kept or in regard to immoral places here. He thought that the police must be keeping the situation well in hand in Timmins. All the other towns in the North Land were not in as good condition.

PIONEER SETTLER OF HOYLE DISTRICT PASSES AWAY

All who knew him will deeply regret the death of Mr. Stephen Salzer, who passed away last week at the Cairns Hospital, Timmins, after an illness of about a year from cancer of the throat. The late Mr. Salzer was one of the pioneers of this part of the North Land. In the early days he was a popular resident of South Porcupine. Later he took up a farm in the Hoyle district and despite many difficulties he made a success of the farm by his ability and industry. He specialized successfully in market gardening and also in producing seeds and plants particularly adapted to the conditions of this country. He was beginning to make a name for himself as a successful North Land market gardener and horticulturist when he became ill. For a time he was able to continue at business, but later he had to be confined to his home. A few weeks ago Mr. A. C. White and other friends at Hoyle saw to his removal to the Cairns hospital, but despite all that care and attention could do Mr. Salzer succumbed to the malady from which he suffered for many months. A son of the late Mr. Salzer came here from Michigan to see to the arrangements for the last sad rites in connection with the death and burial.

THREE YEARS FOR THEFT FROM COCHRANE POST OFFICE

A short time ago a registered mail parcel from one of the banks disappeared from the mails at Cochrane. There was the neat sum of \$5,500.00 in the parcel, and the Dominion Police were notified at once of the loss. Sergt. MacLachlan was put on the case and proceeded at once to Cochrane. He apparently made a thorough investigation and no doubt had the case lined up in very short order, but no arrests were made for a day or two. Then a young man named Redden, who was assistant postmaster at Cochrane, boarded the train for a trip away. Sergt. MacLachlan placed him under arrest and a search of his grip revealed \$5,300.00 in bills. Until the money was found Redden was strong in his protestations of innocence, but when the goods were found he weakened. He was taken before Magistrate Tucker and eventually sentenced to three years in Kingston penitentiary. This is the minimum penalty for such thefts from the mails, the maximum being a life term. The law in this regard is more severe than the O.T.A. Within a week of the time the Dominion Police were put on the case, the guilty was on his way to serve his term at Kingston.

TIMMINS CADETS RETURN FROM LONG BRANCH CAMP

The most of the boys of the Timmins Cadets returned on Saturday evening last from the Cadet Camp held this year at Long Branch, near Toronto. Four or five of the lads remained in the south to visit that part of Ontario for a few days longer. The Timmins Cadets, in charge of Mr. C. S. Carter, principal of the Timmins Public School, went down to Camp about 22 strong. This is the first time that the Timmins boys have been able to take in the annual Camp, and they surely enjoyed the outing. The boys came back well tanned and hearty looking and report an agreeable time, though there was considerable rain during their stay at the Camp, there being more or less rain nearly every day they were away from Timmins. The boys will be looking forward to the next annual Cadet Camp, and in the meantime they are very grateful to Mr. Carter, who was very largely responsible for their being able to attend this year's Camp.
 During their stay at Camp there were a number of very interesting reviews, competitions and contests. In all these events the Timmins boys did honour to themselves and to their town. In the Cadet Challenge Cup match at the Rifle Ranges Timmins came fourth. This event was won by the Sault Ste. Marie with 268 points. The Brantford Cadets were second with 264, Orillia third with 225 and Timmins fourth with 217. North Bay also made 217 and Midland 216. The shooting was at 200 and 300 yards.

MOUNTJOY SETTLERS TO ASK FOR GRAVELLING OF ROAD

For some time past the Mountjoy Settlers' Association has not been very active. This, perhaps, has been due to the fact that the right sort of co-operation seemed to be altogether lacking on the part of the Ontario Government. In the last few days, however, the Settlers' Association has again evidenced signs of activity and useful interest, and they intend to endeavour among other things to have the road west of the bridge gravelled and made fit for travel. Some time ago efforts were made along the same line, and the Government authorized the work to be done. The contract was given and the work started and then without any excuse or explanation, so far as known, the work was suddenly ordered stopped. That was the end of it. The Farmers' Government had apparently been convinced of the absolute necessity for the work, but then had repented. Now with a new Government in office the settlers may be able to get something done for them. It is to be hoped so anyway. They have at least the comfort that they can't be much worse off than they have been, anyway.

Messrs. C. Hirschfield and Billy Burns will officiate at the district baseball game here tomorrow.

Mr. Frank McGuire left this week for Toronto where it is understood that he will take up residence having a good position in the city with a big wholesale concern. Frank will be much missed here in sporting circles and especially in hockey. He was generally conceded to be the finest shot in the N.O.H.A., and a hockey player in general of outstanding ability. It is a foregone conclusion that his hockey ability will be utilized by some of the Toronto teams and what is the loss of Timmins will be a noteworthy gain for Toronto hockey, town and district and the hockey fans especially will regret his departure from his home town.

Mr. F. E. Roberts, of Toronto, Inspector for the Norwich Union Fire Insurance Company, visited Timmins this week on a tour of inspection. Mr. Roberts has been making regular visits here for several years and is one of the insurance men with a correct appreciation from first-hand investigation of the situation here regarding fire hazard. Mr. Roberts believes that with the situation of the town, the fire-guard area round it, and with reasonable care and close attention, and the maintenance of the fire department and equipment, the town is safe from bush fire menace. The chief danger he sees is from townsites building up on the cleared areas near the town thus bringing the bush nearer, as it were, and forming a line of communication with the danger zone.

MRS. A. J. KENNEDY DIES AT NEW LISKEARD FRIDAY

General sympathy will be extended to Mr. A. J. Kennedy, recently elected Member for Temiskaming in the Ontario Legislature, in the death of his wife at their home in New Liskeard on Friday last. Mrs. Kennedy had been an invalid for about a year, suffering from paralysis.

MILL AT DAVIDSON MINE BURNED DOWN THIS WEEK

Word was received here on Tuesday morning of the destruction by fire of the mill at the Davidson Mine. The cause of the fire is not known, and no particulars are available in regard to the fire or the damage done. It is known, however, that while the loss will be a material one, it will not cripple the Davidson in its progress and development and expansion will be carried along as usual. The mill was a ten-stamp one. No other buildings on the property were damaged to any extent.

POWER SITUATION NOW ON IMPROVED BASIS

With the turning on this week of two units of the Sturgeon Falls new plant of the Northern Canadian Power, Limited, a further capacity of 7,000 horse power was made available for the use of the Camp. It is expected that the power now available will provide for the needs at present of the three big producing mines, and leave a surplus available for the other properties, such as the Vipond, Goldale, West Dome Lake, etc. It is also understood that the Great Northern Power Company is trying out its first 2,250 horsepower unit at Indian Chutes and expects to supply power to the Porcupine Davidson within a week. Two weeks later, the Night Hawk will get power from the same source and early in August it is anticipated that Newray will get a supply. Machinery for a second unit at the Chutes is arriving and will be installed before September, while ground work is being done for a third unit.

While even the present provisions do not give full opportunity for the future expansion of the big mines as planned, the present situation is improved and all may carry on. With the Hollinger proceeding with its own plans for power development, the end of power shortage may be seen when the various enterprises for supplying power have completed their programmes.
