Timmins and District Notes

(Miss Marjorie McGee, of Haileybury, is spending a few weeks visiting friends in Timmins.)

(Mrs. H. Egan left today for a holiday visit to Montreal and Quebec.)

There will be a Home-made Cooking Sale, at the Salvation Army Hall, Thursday, July 26th, from 2:30 to 5:30 p.m.

(Mr. O. Flood, of the head office of the Taylor Hardware Co., New Liskeard, was a visitor to town on business last week.)

(Mr. Toner Macdonald and sisters, Misses P. and V. Macdonald, of Sand Point, Ontario, were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. H. Jeffrey.)

An Ice Cream Social in aid of the R.C. church, Schumacher, will be held on the church grounds tomorrow (Thursday), July 26th, from 3 to 11 p.m.

The third annual Regatta under the auspices of the Timmins Citizens' Band will be held at the Mattagami River Landing on Thursday, Aug. 9th. Watch for posters for further particulars.

Work has commenced on the new fire hall at Haileybury, the building to cost around \$15,000.00. The ratepayers recently voted on the question, passing the by-law in the matter by a good majority.

(One of the beauty spots of the town is the lawn and flower beds at the side of the T. & N.O. station. The T. & N.O. deserves credit for the care and effort given to beautify around its stations.)

The next regular meeting of the Town Council is scheduled for Monday afternoon, Aug. 13th. In the meantime, it is expected that one or more special meetings will be held to deal with some questions needing immediate attention.

(The Dance at the Hollinger Recreation Hall last Friday evening, under the auspices of the Hollinger Community Club, proved a pleasant success, after the manner of previous events, under the same auspices. There was a good attendance and everything was of the best. The Holly Jazz Orchestra supplied attractive music for the occasion.)

A deputation from Kirkland Lake is interviewing Premier Ferguson asking that the location of the station on the new line of the T. & N.O. Railway be changed to a site nearer the town. The present plans would place the station about three-quarters of a mile from the town of Kirkland Lake.

The centres written at included Cobalt, Haileybury, New Liskeard, Charlton, Thornloe, Englehart and Swastika.

The sales were part of the methods used on behalf of the assignee to dispose of the assets of this business which recently made an assignment.

(Mr. and Mrs. E. Schelletier returned to the Camp last week and have again taken up residence in Timmins, being warmly welcomed here by many old friends. Mr. and Mrs. Schelletier were among the pioneer residents of this Camp. Recently they have been residing in North Bay. They have resumed the conducting of the Veteran House, at the corner of Cedar and Fourth.)

Timmins Junior Football team has been playing fine football this season and made a name for themselves. They have shown superiority over the Dome Juniors and are looking for new worlds to conquer. Recently it was suggested that they visit Kirkland Lake the next time the Senior team goes there, the Juniors to play a picked team of Kirkland and Swastika Juniors. At a meeting of the Timmins Football Club recently it was decided to meet the suggestion of some of the Juniors and pay half the expense of such a trip for the Juniors.)

Four of the seven foxes owned by the Boves brothers at Uno Park, which were allowed to escape from their wire enclosure by some person cutting the wires, have returned to their place of confinement and are again being kept captives. The animals returned to their own accord, apparently being unable to make a good living in the wild fox manner, and preferring the regular rations of captivity to the uncertainty of meals provided by liberty.)

This was just around one o'clock and for an hour or so there were no taxis available for service. 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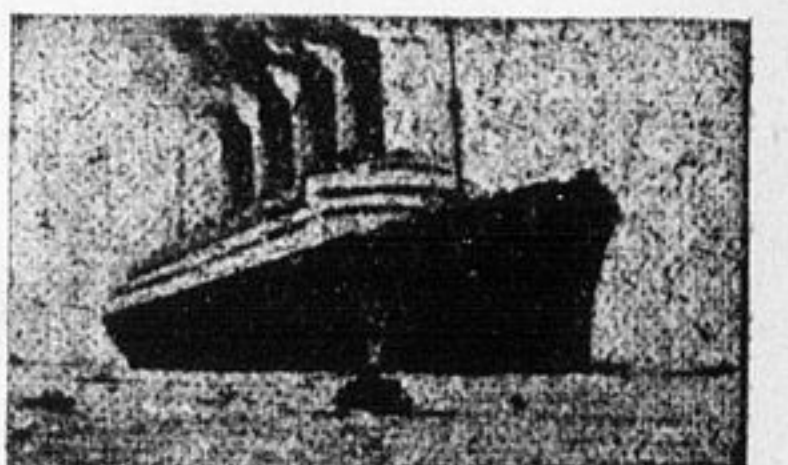
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
