ASKING FOR CLEARING FOR NIGHT HAWK RIVER

Petition Being Circulated in Camp for This Very Necessary Work. Would Open Good Route to McNeill Field.

This week Mr. D. O'Connor, of Connaught, brought a petition to town for signatures, the petition asking the Ontario Government to have the East Branch of the Night Hawk River cleared of all log jams, etc. The petition was readily signed by all approached here, who knew the situation and it will receive the heartiest support of all in the district. The clearing of this river will make accessible to prospectors, fire rangers, investors, etc., the Townships of Fallon, Fasken, McNeill and Cleaver. With the clearing of the river the stream will be navigable through from Connaught for gasoline launches to take in supplies, machinery, etc., to the townships named. In view of the present striking discoveries in McNeill and adjacent territory and the resulting rush to these parts the work is of double importance. McNeill and Cleaver Townships are now staked up solid, with stakings also being made in neighboring townships. If work is to be carried on at the claims staked and the district developed and proven out, transportation routes will be necessary. The Night Hawk River can be made a most convenient and economical means of communication by the clearing asked for. The total estimated cost of the work is around \$1,000,000, and the Government should not hesitate to spend this as soon as the petition is received.

STEALING OF WOOD MUST BE STOPPED IN DISTRICT

On innumerable occasions complaints have been made in regard to the theft of standing timber from claims and other property throughout the district. Among the heavy sufferers here recently have been the Canadel Gold, Limited, this company losing wood from many of its claims, and in some cases being left without enough for their own use during the winter. To put a stop to the practice of stealing wood from claims the Canadel had one man up in police court last week. Mr. C. L. Morgau, on behalf of the Canadel, showed the

BIG INCREASE SHOWN IN CANADIAN GOLD OUTPUT

Revised statistics recently issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics show that the Canadian gold production evidences marked increase in importance.

During the calendar year 1922, the gold production from all sources in Canada amount to 1,263,364 fine ounces, valued at \$26,116,050, an increase of 36% above the previous year. This production has only been exceeded once, that being in 1900 when 1,350,057 ounces valued at \$27,908,153 was produced. In the latter year the Yukon placers reached the peak of their production.

The values given below are those reported by the shippers as the total payments received for gold and silver contained in products shipped.

annoyance and loss entailed on the company through this form of theft, and said the company wanted a heavy enough penalty to discourage the wood stealing. Mr. Morgau, however, did not wish to have the accused sent to jail as the man was a married man with a family. Magistrate Atkinson imposed a fine of \$25.00 and costs, with the suggestion that more serious penalties would be imposed if the theft were repeated.

NORTH LAND TO HAVE BIG SPACE AT NATIONAL FAIR

More Than 18,000 Square Feet, with Frontage of 194 Feet, in New International Building.

For some years past the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade and other North Land interests have been endeavouring to secure a more representative exhibit from the North Country at Canada's National Exhibition at Toronto. It has been felt that the space specially devoted to North Land interests at the Fair covers only a part of the interests of this country. Other typical exhibits are scattered throughout the various sections of the Exhibition. Accordingly, no comprehensive view is given the people attending the Exhibition in regard to the resources, industries and general life of the North Country. Strenuous efforts have been made in the past two or three years by the Associated Boards of Trade to secure such space at the Exhibition as would afford opportunity for a fair presentation of the North Land and its activities. This year the Associated Boards received very hearty co-operation from the T. & N.O. Railway Commission, and also from the newly-elected Premier of Ontario, Hon. G. Howard Ferguson. In the latter connection, it might be well to quote for its present interest and also, perhaps, for its future value for reference purposes, say at election time when some newspapers are inclined to become excited, the paragraph from a recent issue of The Toronto Globe. The good old Globe says:—"That the new Premier is determined to carry out his promises made to the North Land is in a measure evidenced by the recent letter received at the Exhibition offices ordering a huge exhibit space which will be devoted exclusively to a demonstration of the progress of the northern districts of the Province."


According to information now to hand over 18,000 square feet of space with a frontage of 194 feet, will be reserved for this year's North Land exhibits at the Toronto Fair. The space will be in the new International Building, and should give opportunity for the representative exhibit for the North Country. Products of the forest, field, mine and workshop will be shown, and effort made to give outsiders as adequate a view as possible of just what the North Land has and can do. The position of the display is described by one of the Toronto newspapers as "one of the most effective and beautiful display situations in the whole of the Exhibition buildings."

BRITISH EMPIRE FORESTRY MEMBERS COMING TO NORTH

Details of the tour through Canada of the members of the British Empire Forestry Conference are given in letters received from the Canadian National Railways. The British Empire Forestry Conference, one of the most important public bodies to have visited Canada in several years, left Ottawa last Sunday evening by special train over the Canadian National Railways, for Toronto, to commence the second stage of their tour through the Dominion. The visitors were in Toronto on August 13th, for a few hours only and returned to the Queen City for a longer visit on Tuesday night, the intervening day being spent on a trip to Niagara Falls and St. Williams in Norfolk County where the forestry nurseries of the Ontario Government will be inspected. The Conference leaves Toronto to-day for the final leg of their long journey. They will travel by Canadian National Railways through to British Columbia, visiting en route Algonquin Park, Temagami, Iroquois Falls, Minaki, Winnipeg, Indian Head, Regina, Saskatoon, Wainwright, Edmonton, Jasper National Park, Kamloops, Vancouver and Victoria.

Delegates to the conference have come from every portion of the British Empire and from every province of the Dominion of Canada. Each and every member is distinguished in his particular field in the science of silviculture, and the store of knowledge which they will be able to impart and to imbibe during the conference will, it is confidently expected, result in much material benefit to forestry in the Dominion and throughout the rest of the British Empire. Already their meeting can be judged a success, for if nothing else took place, and if nothing else was learned, the discovery by Lord Lovat of the white pine weevil in a section of New Brunswick forest where its presence was not suspected, will prove of incalculable value to limit holders there and prevent the destruction of many fine stands of timber by this dreaded pest.

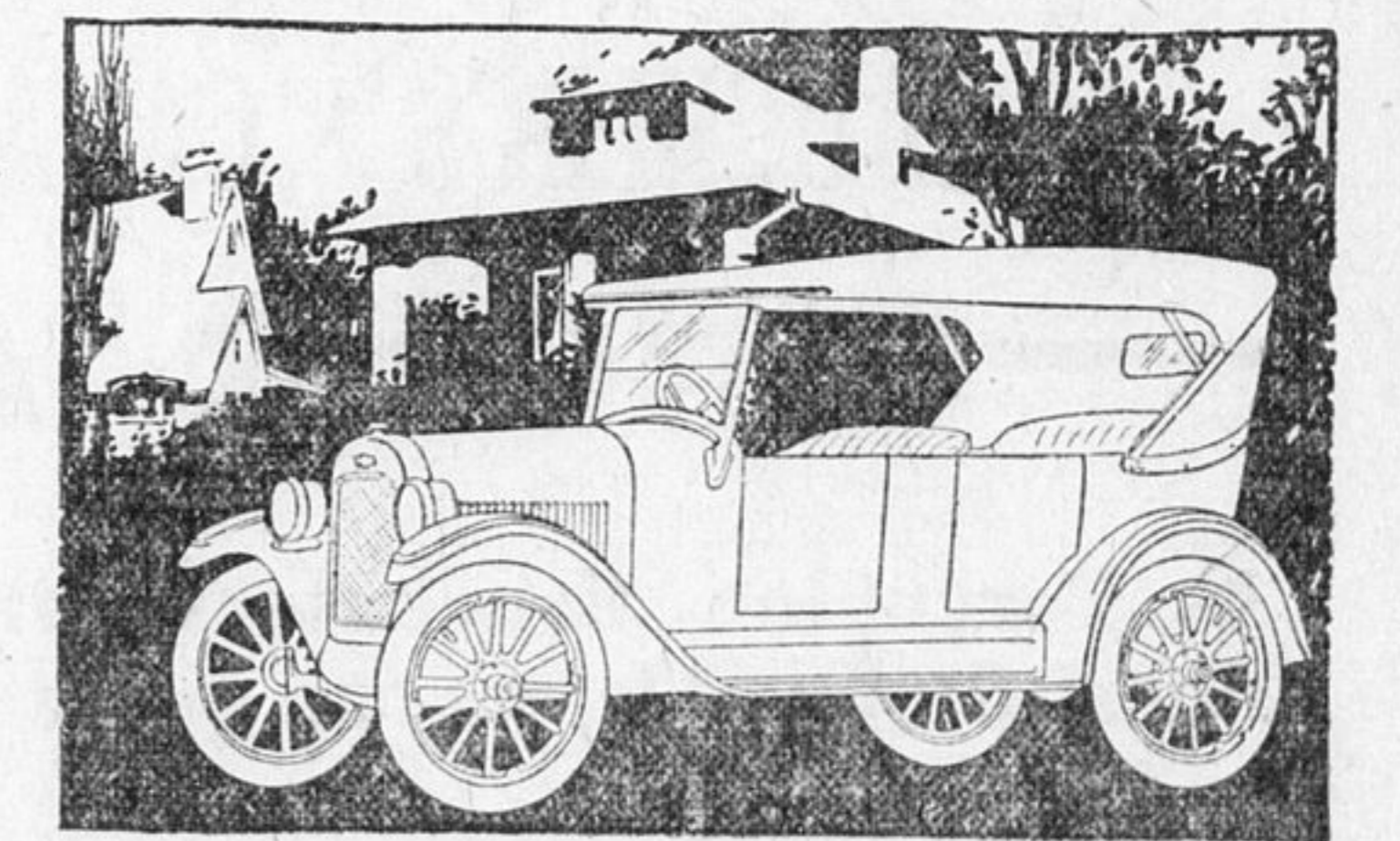
