MUNICIPALITY OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CALVERT, DISTRICT OF COCHRANE, PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

BY-LAW NUMBER 69

FOR BORROWING THE SUM OF TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$10,000.00) FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING A SITE AND ERECTING THEREON A TOWN HALL AND FIRE STATION FOR THE TOWNSHIP OF CALVERT.

WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the Township of Calvert deem it expedient to borrow for the purpose of acquiring a site and erecting thereon a Town Hall and Fire Station, the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00).

AND WHEREAS in order thereto it will be necessary to issue debentures of the said Corporation for the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for the purpose of acquiring a site and erecting thereon a Town Hall and Fire Station as hereinafter provided, (which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this By-Law) the proceeds of the said debt to be applied to the purposes aforesaid and to no other.

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to issue the said debentures at one time and to make the principal of the said debt repayable by yearly sums during the period of twenty years, being the currency of the said debentures, said yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate amount payable in each year for the principal and interest in respect of the said debt shall be as nearly as possible equal to the amount so payable in each of the other years of the said period.

AND WHEREAS the total amount required by the Consolidated Municipal Act, 1914 and amendments thereto to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest as hereinafter provided is Eight hundred and seventy-one dollars and eighty-four cents, (\$871.84).

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the Township of Calvert according to the last revised Assessment Roll thereof is Six Hundred and Thirty-two Thousand, One Hundred Dollars, (\$632,100.00).

AND WHEREAS the Township of Calvert has no debenture debt.

THEREFORE, THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CALVERT, enacts as follows:—

1. The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Calvert shall expend the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) in the payment for purchasing a site and erecting thereon a Town Hall and Fire Station, and for the purpose of raising the said sums, debentures of the said Corporation to the amount of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) as aforesaid, (which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this By-Law) in sums of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) shall be issued on the fifteenth day of December, 1923; and shall be dated on the date of the issue thereof, and shall be payable within Twenty years thereafter at the Royal Bank of Canada in Ansonville in the said Township of Calvert.

2. Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Reeve of the said Corporation or by some other person authorized by By-Law to sign the same and by the Treasurer thereof; and the Clerk thereof shall attach thereto the corporate seal of the said Corporation.

3. The said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of six per centum, per annum, payable yearly at the said bank, on the 15th day of December, in each and every year during the currency thereof, and shall have attached to them coupons for payment of the said interest, which coupons shall be signed by the Treasurer of the said Corporation.

4. During the Currency of the said debentures there shall be raised annually by special rate on all rateable property in the said Township of Calvert the sum of \$871.84 for the purpose of paying the amount due in each of the said years for principal and interest in respect of the said debt.

5. The debentures issued hereunder shall contain the provisions of Section 316, Sub-Section 1 of the Consolidated Municipal Act, 1914, as to transference of Debentures.

This By-Law shall come in force and take effect on the day of its passing its third reading by the said Municipal Council and an application shall be made to the Ontario Railway & Municipal Board for the confirmation of same.

BIG TENNIS TOURNAMENT HERE ON LABOUR DAY

In connection with the big day of sports under the auspices of the Fire Brigade at Timmins on Monday next, Sept. 3rd, Labour Day, the Timmins Tennis Club has arranged for a very attractive programme for a tennis tournament, the tennis, of course, like the rest of the day being under the auspices of the Fire Department. The Timmins Tennis Club is open is specially represented, everything made in Canada from a fountain pen to a locomotive being among the 150,000 exhibits at the Fair. The special educational and entertainment features are said to be unusually attractive this year. Dr. Fricke of the Mendelssohn Choir is again conducting the pagan chorus, with over 2,000 chorists. Band, instrumental and vocal competitions will feature the music this year. There will be a season of Grand Opera at the Coliseum Sept. 3 to 8. Auto racing, trap shooting, regatta, floral festival, Cleopatra Spectacle, art exhibits, dog show, horse show, sports show, are some of the other lines. There will be over 100 pipers, an unprecedented event in the history of Scottish music in Canada, in a welcome to be extended to a contingent from the London, England, Scottish Regiment. The Canadian National Exhibition was visited by 1,372,500 people in 1922, double the attendance of any of the great State Fairs across the line, and a better showing than ever was made by any of the World's Fairs of the past in the same number of consecutive days.

Practically all in the south on holiday from the North Land will take in the "Ex.," and in addition many from this area will go to Toronto specially to enjoy Canada's now famous Exhibition, really unique in its type and extent and equally unique in its continued success and development from year to year.

EXTENSIVE CAMPAIGN PLANNED FOR GOLDACRES

The Goldacres property, south of the Schumacher Mine, is to be thoroughly tested out and considerable work is planned. This property was formerly known as the Success, and had much work done when under that name. The present management is banking on work at depth, the neighboring properties, Schumacher and McIntyre showing such attractive results at depth, and the reasonable theory being that the Goldacres in the same area and similarly circumstances will show equally gratifying results from work at depth. At first work will be centered in diamond drilling the Goldacres. The Goldacres is now backed by a strong group of Toronto financial men, Messrs. Anderson and Robinson, two well-known Toronto financiers, being among those interested. Mr. Peter MacLaren, a mining engineer of wide experience and with a special knowledge of the Porcupine area, is here in charge of the opening of the Goldacres property, with the plan and determination to go ahead and make a mine of it.

CANADIAN NATIONAL EX. AT TORONTO NOW IN PROGRESS

The 45th Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto opened on Saturday last. Managing Director John G. Kent predicts an attendance of a million and a half for this year. The Exhibition costs \$700,000 each year to stage and produce, apart from the vast displays. There are over 80 permanent buildings and 300 temporary structures. The exhibition covers an area of 300 acres, with about one mile of water front. This year is "International Year," and there are exhibits from nations all over the world. Canada, of course, to receive entry from double and single teams from any club in the district. Entries should be made on or before Saturday, Sept. 1st, but if this is not possible, entries will be accepted on the grounds on the morning of the event. The tennis tournament will start at 10:30 a.m. The entry fee is 50c per head. Mr. E. H. Hill is in charge of the feature and no doubt will be pleased to give any interested all information or particulars desired. A very interesting tournament is expected, great attention being given to tennis not only in town but throughout the district. Competition is expected from South Porcupine where there is keen interest in tennis and where there are many skilled players, and from Schumacher where there are two strong clubs with many skilled players. Tennis has been a popular game in Timmins for some years past, and no doubt the town will contribute strongly to the competition for the various events. Tennis enthusiasts look for Monday to be a big day here in tennis.

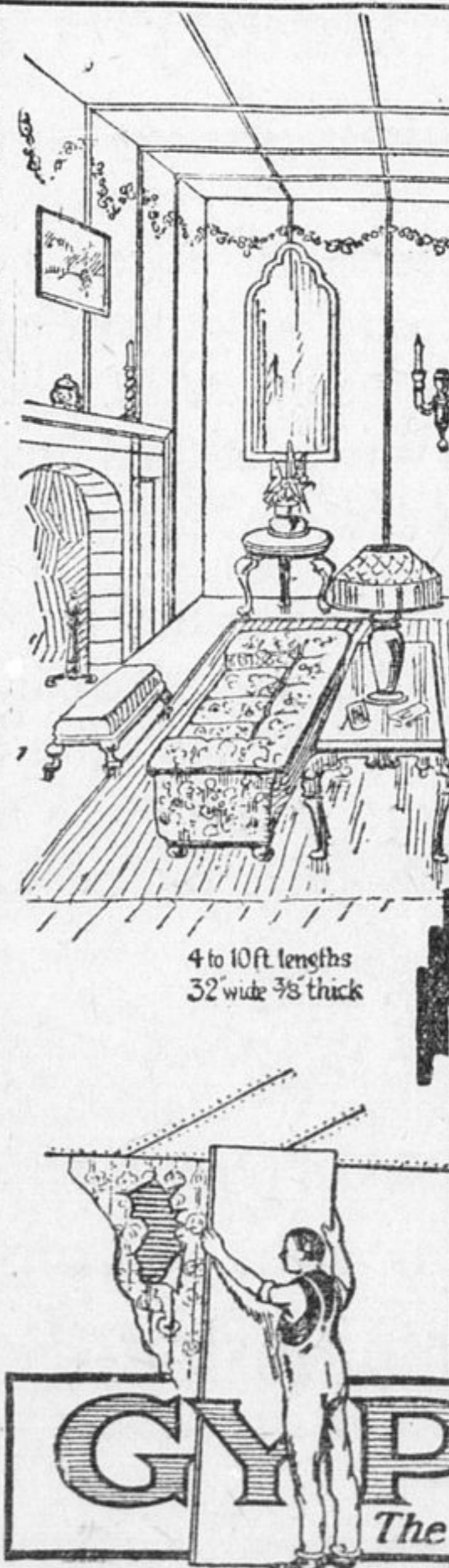
