**VISIT OF MINING MEN TO BENEFIT THE INDUSTRY**

**Minister of Mines Issues Statement Following Tour of American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers.**

Members of the party of mining men touring the mining districts of Ontario and Quebec on the occasion of the annual meeting of the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers were very appreciative in reference to the attitude assumed by the Ontario Government on the occasion of the visit. The Province took official cognizance of the importance of the visit, the Hon. Chas. McCrea, the new Minister of Mines, giving the matter his personal attention and showing in every way a pleasing interest and a desire to be of any possible service. There was an official welcome by the Government to the visitors, the Government showing by this that there was full realization of the possible significance of the visit and of the importance of the distinguished mining men gathered together for the occasion. While in Timmins several members of the visiting party took occasion to comment in appreciative terms of the interest evidenced by the Ontario Government and particularly the Department of Mines and Hon. Mr. McCrea.

If the mining men were pleased at the visit and its features, Hon. Mr. McCrea also appears to have found it satisfactory. Last week Hon. Mr. McCrea gave out the following statement in the matter:—I am satisfied that the mining industry in Ontario will be advanced and that greater development will take place as a result of the visit. I have felt for a number of years that there has been a spirit of uncertainty in a certain part of the investing world which was detrimental to the industry. It is a sound policy for the province to assure and make known to capital that our laws are fair and sound, and that they will be applied fairly and equitably and that capital may invest with an assurance of a square deal in taxation. Those familiar with the North Country and its needs, its hopes and its ambitions, realize that it is better to have fifty mines at work yielding profits and paying a reasonable tax in keeping with profits than a few operating bonanzas.

In the trip just concluded the visitors have been impressed with the possibilities of Northern Ontario and our aim, among other things, was to give the assurance that capital would be fairly treated. Increased industrial expansion and the production of new wealth from the mining field will help make a prosperous province and Dominion. This is our aim and hope.

Hon. Mr. McCrea's statement should make pleasing reading for the third party interested—the general public. After all the uncertainty that has handicapped the mining industry in the past few years it is agreeable indeed to look forward hopefully to better things. Under the last administration there was general feeling abroad that the Government had no other interest in mining than to force revenue from it. On more than one occasion in the last few years capital was frightened away from the development of the mining industry in this Province on account of the apparent attitude of the Government towards ill-advised legislation that would have had the effect of confiscation. On each occasion when the Government got the confiscatory type of legislation in its bonnet Mr. McCrea was found waging a very determined and usually successful battle to get something like a square deal for the mining industry. This fact makes his statement at the present time the more impressive. There can be no question of his sincerity or of his interest and attention. Outside capital and capital within the Province and Dominion may safely accept the statement that under the present administration there will be a fair square deal all round for all concerned.

**HERE'S A NEWSPAPER THAT IS KEEPING A BANK GOING**

The following is from the last issue of The Haileyburian:—"It looks as though there might be another bank failure imminent as one of our local institutions seems to be continually running short of money, and has developed the habit of calling us up and asking us to bring some down."

In referring to the extension of the territory for which Mr. M. Wernick is now district manager for the Canadian Toledo Seale Co., the dropping of a line of type in The Advance last week made it appear that Mr. Wernick's headquarters would hereafter be at Port Arthur. This is not the case, Mr. Wernick's headquarters still being at North Bay, but with another office also at Port Arthur.

**LAKE SHORE AT KIRKLAND PRODUCED \$22,662 IN JULY**

The regular monthly reports given out by the Lake Shore at Kirkland Lake are always watched with interest. This mine has maintained a high average for its regular grade of ore, running literally years on the high average of around \$20.00 per ton, many months exceeding the \$20.00 mark and its being a rare month to go below that figure. The Lake Shore Mines mill ran only 63.3 per cent. of the possible running time during the month of July, reducing 1,102 tons of ore and recovering \$22,662 in gold bullion. Last time was due to the following causes: Power off, 1 per cent.; hoist and frame-head, 35.3 per cent. The average recovery was slightly above \$20 to the ton.... In July, 1922, the company treated 2,098 tons of ore and recovered \$55,080, but the mill ran 94.96 per cent. of the possible...
