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MUNICIPALITY OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CALVERT, DISTRICT OF COCHRANE, PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

BY-LAW NUMBER 69

FOR BORROWING THE SUM OF TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$10,000.00) FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING A SITE AND ERECTING THEREON A TOWN HALL AND FIRE STATION FOR THE TOWNSHIP OF CALVERT.

WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the Township of Calvert deem it expedient to borrow for the purpose of acquiring a site and erecting thereon a Town Hall and Fire Station, the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00).

AND WHEREAS in order thereto it will be necessary to issue debentures of the said Corporation for the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for the purpose of acquiring a site and erecting thereon a Town Hall and Fire Station as hereinafter provided, (which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this By-Law) the proceeds of the said debt to be applied to the purposes aforesaid and to no other.

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to issue the said debentures at one time and to make the principal of the said debt repayable by yearly sums during the period of twenty years, being the currency of the said debentures, said yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate amount payable in each year for the principal and interest in respect of the said debt shall be as nearly as possible equal to the amount so payable in each of the other years of the said period.

AND WHEREAS the total amount required by the Consolidated Municipal Act, 1914 and amendments thereto to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest as hereinafter provided is Eight hundred and seventy-one dollars and eighty-four cents, (\$871.84).

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the Township of Calvert according to the last revised Assessment Roll thereof is Six Hundred and Thirty-two Thousand, One Hundred Dollars, (\$632,100.00).

AND WHEREAS the Township of Calvert has no debenture debt.

THEREFORE, THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CALVERT, enacts as follows:—

1. The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Calvert shall expend the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) in the payment for purchasing a site and erecting thereon a Town Hall and Fire Station, and for the purpose of raising the said sums, debentures of the said Corporation to the amount of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) as aforesaid, (which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this By-Law) in sums of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) shall be issued on the fifteenth day of December, 1923; and shall be dated on the date of the issue thereof, and shall be payable within Twenty years thereafter at the Royal Bank of Canada in Ansonville in the said Township of Calvert.

2. Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Reeve of the said Corporation or by some other person authorized by By-Law to sign the same and by the Treasurer thereof; and the Clerk thereof shall attach thereto the corporate seal of the said Corporation.

3. The said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of six per centum per annum, payable yearly at the said bank, on the 15th day of December, in each and every year during the currency thereof, and shall have attached to them coupons for payment of the said interest, which coupons shall be signed by the Treasurer of the said Corporation.

4. During the Currency of the said debentures there shall be raised annually by special rate on all rateable property in the said Township of Calvert the sum of \$871.84 for the purpose of paying the amount due in each of the said years for principal and interest in respect of the said debt.

5. The debentures issued hereunder shall contain the provisions of Section 316, Sub-Section 1 of the Consolidated Municipal Act, 1914, as to transference of Debentures.

This By-Law shall come in force and take effect on the day of its passing its third-reading by the said Municipal Council and an application shall be made to the Ontario Railway & Municipal Board for the confirmation of same.

FINE DISPLAY OF NORTH LAND RICHES AT TORONTO

Products and Resources of This Country Well Shown This Year at National Exhibition.

The display at the Canadian National Exhibition this year of the products and resources of the North Land, has attracted very general attention. The public have been impressed by the improved showing this year at the Fair, and the daily newspapers have devoted considerable space to reference to this feature. The following from The Toronto Star is typical of the references made by Toronto newspapers to this feature of the Fair:—

"From the wonderland of Northern Ontario there has been sent to the Canadian National Exhibition a collection of the products of that great country, which, set out in splendid style at the eastern end of the International Building, tell a vivid story of the richness of the land 'up there.'"

"Space has not been spared in the exhibiting of New Ontario's riches, minerals and vegetables, fruits and grains being given prominence. The exhibit was prepared by Hon. J. S. Martin, Ontario Minister of Agriculture, and is under the charge of H. A. Macdonell, director of colonization in the province.

"Chief among the exhibits are the grains and vegetables. The grains which thrive in the northern part of the province are shown at all stages. There are to be seen oats, rye, corn, maize, barley, wheat and other cereals. There are many varieties of each in stages from the seed to the full grown crop, and their excellent condition is a proof of the fact that Northern Ontario is second to none as a grain growing land.

"There are no vegetables grown in old Ontario that cannot be grown in 'New Ontario,' and the collection of vegetables set out by Northern Ontario at the Ex. would excite the envy of any greengrocer, horticulturist or housewife. The potatoes are firm and clean, the cauliflowers as white as the snow that covers in winter the land they come from, and all the other vegetables combined hold out a lure to those that see them to turn vegetarian, if only they could always get their food from Northern Ontario.

"Added to this lure is one held out by the collection of fruits. Although Northern Ontario does not boast of itself as a peach growing land, yet it is true that they can grow peaches up there. But other fruits are plentiful and excellent as is evinced by the samples displayed, and the canned fruits, canned in the land that grows them, are preserved in such a way, as to make their preservation undetectable.

"In many parts of the 330,000 square miles covered by Northern Ontario wonderful clovers of several varieties are to be found, and where the clover is there are also bees. Honey plays an important part in the products of the country, and the honey sent out by New Ontario, of which samples can be seen at the Exhibition, can rival any other that the world can put forth.

"One of the most interesting exhibits is that which shows how the pulp and paper industry of Northern Ontario is carried on. From the pulp woods, shown in many forms, the process is illustrated by samples of all the material used in the manufacture of the paper, until a massive roll of paper for the daily press is seen ready to have the news printed on it.

"The minerals of Northern Ontario are set out in great array. All the various products taken out of the earth, and used by man for his several purposes are marshalled in a great array. The exhibits of gold and silver are not small, but are on the same scale as the country, a massive scale. Until the end of 1922, silver to the value of \$220,800,000, gold to the value of \$108,300,000 and nickel to the value of \$176,700,000 have been taken from Northern Ontario, and great quantities of other minerals besides.

"The wonderful exhibit is rounded by a set of illuminated pictures showing scenes in many of the towns of the northern section of the province, and illustrating the industries that are carried on there."

ONCE MORE MENTION IS MADE OF A CURLING RINK

During the past few years The Advance has repeatedly referred to suggestions made for the establishment of a curling rink in Timmins. There have been many here who have enthusiastically urged curling as a fine winter pastime, but nothing further has been done than just suggesting. If there is no call for a curling rink, then, of course, there is no need for one. But, if, as many suggest, there

is such a call, then the present time would seem to be an opportune time to get busy. Last season there was some enthusiasm roused in the proposal for a curling rink, but it was felt that the season had advanced too far to deal with the question at that time. If there is still desire and enthusiasm for curling, some enthusiast should get busy, call a meeting of those interested, and organize to see what may be done. At Haileybury there seems to be very keen interest maintained in curling. The new rink at Haileybury is well on towards completion, and according to The Haileyburian last week there was an enthusiastic gathering of those interested in curling held recently, and all signs point to a big season. The new rink will provide for four sheets of ice, and there is a commodious and well-finished club room. A spectators' gallery the full length of the ice and across one end will be a feature of the new rink. The recent meeting was to complete the arrangements for financing. The completed building has already been provided from the insurance on the old rink, the proportion carried by the Town on account of market accommodation being provided in the building, and the sale of 49 shares in a syndicate at \$100 each. A committee was appointed to see if 41 more syndicate shares can not be sold to complete the proportion to be provided by the curling club. The club expects a membership of 140 this season, and The Haileyburian completes a lengthy report of the meeting by saying, "There seems no doubt that the 'roarin' game' will be the most popular winter sport in town, as it has always been in the past."

DEDICATION NEW MASONIC TEMPLE AT HAILEYBURY

The new Masonic Temple at Haileybury will be dedicated with due ceremony on October 4th. It will be noted that the date for the dedication, Oct. 4th, is the anniversary of the fire that destroyed practically the whole of that town of Haileybury last year. Haileybury has shown a wonderful spirit of courage and resourcefulness in re-establishing itself after the disaster of last October, and of course the Masonic Order has not lagged behind in providing proper and creditable quarters for the accommodation of the Order. The dedication of the new Masonic Temple at Haileybury on Oct. 4th will be an important event and one that no doubt will attract members of the Order from all over the district.

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
