ANOTHER WORLD WAR MAY BE PROVOKED BY PEACE TALKERS

It is an unfortunate fact that there seems to be at the present time a danger of another world war. Italy is prepared to uphold by arms its national honour and to secure punishment for the murder in Greece of its accredited representatives. Italy has already moved in warlike way, being far from satisfied with the diplomatic answers made by Greece. A war between Italy and Greece might have little world significance, if the other nations of the world stood aside. It is doubtful, however, if actual warfare between Italy and Greece will be reached, without complications that will draw other nations into the fray. As soon as any other nations are drawn into the contest, there will be a general lining up on one side or another. The stage is set for a repetition of the days of 1914 and after.

Wisdom would avoid such a catastrophe, but nations unfortunately are no wiser than men, and in the matter of peace and war, for all the blatant peace talk that has irritated the world in the past few years, wisdom among men seems still to be far away. The great trouble with the preaching of peace has been that the preaching and praying has been done too much in the wrong quarters. France, for instance, has been counselled much more to peace than Germany has been urged to pay what it can of the much it owes. France, indeed, has been so peace-preached against as to be fairly irritated into a spirit of war. The same sort of attitude is being adopted towards Italy. Italy is being begged and bullied by the peace preachers. If these peace preachers would turn their guns on Greece and Germany, urging these nations to go the limit and beyond to avoid war, the danger of a serious war again might be more hopefully avoided. If the war clouds again descend upon the world, the peace preachers will be the ones really responsible for the calamity. It was the peace preachers, through the unpreparedness their campaign created in countries like Britain, Belgium, and the United States, and through the comfort and hope they had given the enemy as to still further unpreparedness on the part of the nations attacked, that really was at the root of the German hope and ambition in the last world war. The peace preachers had much consideration for Germany. Germany suffered little from peace talk. The

peace preachers did not lull Germany into any false security. To-day, again, through wrong choice of those to preach to, the peace talkers may cause untold harm. Their furious preaching to France and Italy, and their apparent neglect to preach to Germany and Greece, may work to evil ends indeed. All will sincerely hope that peace after all may prevail, despite the peace howlers. It is not peace, however, that chiefly needs to be preached, but a fair deal for all.

Here and There

A discovery of excellent ochre (raw sienna) was recently made near Ellershouse Station on the Dominion Atlantic Railway. The color is uniform throughout, with very little gritty matter in the main body. The material can be burnt to produce a variety of colors from reddish brown to black. Prospecting is still going on.

Canadian Pacific S.S. "Metagama" westbound from Glasgow via Belfast, recently docked at Montreal and Quebec with the record number of 382 cabin and 1,078 third class passengers. This constituted a record only for ships of the size and type of the "Metagama," the Canadian Pacific Empress liners often having a far larger list.

Canadian Pacific Railway officials estimated that 61,000 men would be required to harvest the western crops this year. They expected to supply only 9,000 from the prairie provinces and British Columbia and made arrangements to carry over 50,000 from Ontario, Quebec and the east.

United States factories turn out chewing gum to the value of \$41,000,000 annually. The extent to which this product is used in this country can be appreciated when it is known that at the Canadian Pacific Windsor station, Montreal, a man is continually employed in removing gum stains from the marble floor.

Despite the fact that the new Basilica at Ste. Anne de Beaupre is still in course of construction, many thousands more have visited the shrine this year than in former years, and at frequent intervals the Canadian Pacific Railway has been called upon to add special equipment to its regular trains to accommodate the pilgrims. The Reformatory Fathers are investigating a large number of cures claimed to be miraculous.

E. L. Richardson, manager of the Calgary Stampede of 1923, held under the patronage of the Prince of Wales and Governor-General Byng, announces that, owing to the enormous success of the great rodeo July 9-14 it will be staged annually instead of at intervals of several years, as heretofore. The recent Stampede was attended by 137,800 people.
