### GLADIOLI FROM NORTH LAND SURPRISE CITY FOLK

Many of the folks living on "Main Street," in Toronto and other southern cities, have a wrong idea of the North Land. They imagine the North as a land of snow and ice and wolves in winter and blackflies and bears in the summer, with an occasional hole in the ground from which gold or silver or nickel may be dug by the hardy inhabitants. To this type of Main Street folk who imagine that North Bay is the gateway to a wilderness of wolves, and Indians who have never heard of the O.T.A., it is difficult to give any fair impression of the progress and modern development of the North. The fact that others who stray up here yell "Let's boost," doesn't help matters much. When the blind lead the blind the ditches are liable to fill up and overflow. Fortunately, however, the North Land has its host of boosters—good citizens who boost by action and effort, instead of contenting themselves with some silly, irritating catch-phrase. Every once in a while the good work of these boosters is evidenced, and folks elsewhere get a new idea of the North Land. Here is a current example from The Toronto Globe. The Globe says:—"Visitors to the Horticultural Building at the Exhibition this week have had a surprise in the fine display of gladioli from Northern Ontario. These were grown as a hobby by C. A. Byam of New Liskeard, and when it is remembered that this is 350 miles north of Toronto, in a region too often, in the minds of the public, considered as paying little attention to floriculture, the surprise is greater. These flowers are marked by variety and unusual richness of color and by strength of stalk."

Thanks to Mr. Byam, the Main Street folks will now know that there is some favourable weather "up North," and that the whole thought of the people is not confined to gold, silver, strikes, lumber, hockey and breaking the O.T.A.

From all reports, it would have been another surprise to The Globe and to The Globe's readers, if the recent Horticultural Show at Haylebury had been viewed. The display of flowers at that event would have done credit to any town of double the size in the South of this Province. If The Globe and the Main Street folks could view the Flower Town of Iroquois Falls, with its wonderful bower of beauty—the Civic Centre—it's array of well-kept lawns and flower decked homes, the idea of gladioli grown here would never hereafter be startling. Even in Timmins (destroyed last year by forest fires that originated, and ended, in the pulp masses of the outside newspapers) there are flower displays that would delight the eye of all lovers of flowers. Timmins also has had very creditable horticultural shows in years past, and will have others still better. Nearly five hundred miles north of cities like Toronto and Hamilton, the towns of the North, like Timmins, Iroquois Falls, Cochrane, South Porcupine, Schumacher, Connaught and so on, are striving to make the most and the best of life. And thanks to the wonders of this country, they are doing very well thank you!

The Japanese disaster at a glance: Cities of Tokio and Yokohama reported to have been wiped out by earthquake, fire, typhoon and tidal wave Saturday morning.

Hundreds of seacoast cities and towns within a radius of 100 miles of Tokio reported to have been destroyed.

Loss of life estimated at more than 300,000.

Millions homeless.

Martial law proclaimed in Tokio.

Tens of thousands of buildings reduced to debris and consumed by flames.

Scores of villages buried by landslides.

Imperial palace at Tokio destroyed. Dowager Princess Yamashina, Princess Hiroko Kanin and Prince Moromasa, of the Japanese Imperial family, killed.
