#### TAR BOILED OVER AND CAUSED THREATENING FIRE

The Timmins Fire Brigade made their usual record response to an alarm of fire on Monday shortly after 3 p.m. The fire was in a small building back of the River Road in Matagami. The building was the property of Mr. A. Anson who had been boiling some tar for roof fixing. He left the tar on the stove and went out for a time. On his return he found the tar had boiled over and taken fire and was making a bad blaze. While he was fighting the blaze with water an alarm of fire was turned in. Mr. Anson yesterday remarked on the speedy response of the firemen. They were on the spot minutes before I thought they would get there, and they certainly did fine work and saved me more loss," he said. The fire was put out by the use of the chemical tanks. About \$500.00 damage was done. There was no insurance. The long run to this fire, and the fact that the nearest hydrant was several hundred feet away, again point the lesson of the usefulness of the motor truck equipment which the Council decided by resolution to secure some months ago. In a case like this one the motor truck would have been worth many times its cost. It appears to be poor economy to "save" money on the purchase of such equipment at the expense of taking a chance on property and lives. The size of the town now makes equipment of this type practically a necessity. It will be a pity if the

purchase of such equipment is left until it is forced home by serious loss or tragedy. The Council should not allow the matter of a motor fire truck to be sidetracked.

#### T. & N.O. ROADMASTER DIED IN TORONTO LAST WEEK

Mr. Lawrence E. Moore, roadmaster for No. 3 District of the T. & N.O. Railway, including the Porcupine and Iroquois Falls branches, and with headquarters at Cochrane, died in a Toronto hospital on Thursday of last week. Mr. Moore was ill for only a short time, having been granted sick leave on July 27th for treatment and to recuperate. The late Mr. Moore was formerly foreman of the T. & N.O. at Haileybury, and his family moved to Cobalt after the fire at Haileybury in October last.

#### MARRIAGE AT SCHUMACHER WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

On Wednesday afternoon last, September 5th, 1923, at 3 p.m., the home of Mr. and Mrs. N. P. Eden in Schumacher was the scene of a very pretty wedding, when their daughter, Ida Albertine, was united in marriage to Mr. Peter Edlund, also of Schumacher. The ceremony was conducted by Rev. M. R. Hall, of Timmins, in the presence of immediate relatives and friends. Following the serving of a very dainty wedding luncheon the bride and groom, together with a number of the wedding guests, enjoyed a motor trip through the mining camp. Mr. and Mrs. Edlund will reside in Schumacher.

#### PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF SUN VISIBLE HERE ON MONDAY

A partial eclipse of the sun was visible here on Monday afternoon between half-past three and as much after five. During the two hours many viewed the eclipse by the simple use of smoked glasses. With the smoked glasses it was easy to see the half-moon-shaped black spot on the south by west corner of the sun. The astronomy sharks say that the partial eclipse was caused by the moon com-

ing between the sun and the earth during the earth's journey round the sun or the moon's journey round the earth or the sun or either or both or vice versa or otherwise. In any event Toronto newspapers might note that even up in this North Land people can see things like eclipses, just like the folks down below. It is to be hoped that the folks south used their smoked glasses to look at the eclipse rather than at the North Land.

#### TENNIS TOURNAMENT STILL IN PROGRESS

The Tennis Tournament in connection with the Firemen's Labour Day sports is still in progress, it being impossible to play the various matches and decide the several winners before this. The bad weather has, of course, delayed the matches, but the tennis enthusiasts have used every available means to overcome the weather handicap, play being carried on last week at the McIntyre courts at Schumacher to hurry along the matches. It is likely that all the matches will be decided this week.

#### WRECK AT DRINKWATER PIT LAST SATURDAY

There was another little wreck on the T. & N.O. on Saturday last the little accident causing a big delay in traffic. A number of freight cars were piled in the ditch at Drinkwater Pit as a result of the accident. The wreck this time is said to have been caused by the heavy rains undermining a short portion of the track at this point. Fortunately, no one was hurt and the only damage consisted in injury to rolling stock and loss of time. The wreck was cleared away and traffic back at normal by Sunday evening.

### Here and There

Protection of migratory birds has been added to the duties of the Canadian Pacific Railway's constabulary.

Airplanes attached to the Ontario Forestry Department are now equipped with radio sending apparatus so that they can keep in constant touch with the chief and other rangers.

There was an increase of sixty-three per cent in the number of immigrants to Canada during the last three months as compared with the corresponding period of last year.

Canadian Pacific agents in Britain recruited nearly five thousand men for work in the harvest fields of Western Canada and, through lack of steamship accommodation closed their doors on as many more who, attracted by the special harvest rate, sought to enter Canada.

The branch lines program of the Canadian Pacific Railway carried out this year will bring into operation on the prairies a larger mileage than any one year since 1914. Of the 431 miles of line under construction, 281 miles will be ready for handling grain in the Fall, and of the balance, 115 miles will be ready for steel by the winter freeze-up.

A building has been acquired by the University of Toronto to be entirely devoted to the manufacture of insulin. This will be the only factory in Canada to manufacture the curative fluid in commercial quantities and, although it is manufactured in the United States, Great Britain and Denmark, the Canadian product will be sold throughout the world.
