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WORK ON TRUNK ROAD, BAY TO BAY, TO START IN SPRING

Definite assurance is understood to have been given last week by Premier Ferguson that work will be actively commenced next spring in the linking up of roads so as to make a highway system from Cochrane, Timmins, Iroquois Falls, etc., to connect up at North Bay with the Southern Ontario road systems. The location of the trunk road between North Bay and Latchford is not yet decided upon, but the Government has before it surveys, etc., for the two routes advocated, one route paralleling the T. & N. O. railway to large extent and the other being known as the South Lorrain route. It is understood that some favour is now being shown in official circles to a third route—this to be an extension of the North Bay—Sturgeon Falls road, North from Field, cutting through a densely forested and undeveloped area between Sturgeon Falls and Temagami Lakes. This route appeals to many as likely to eliminate any direct competition with the railway and also opening up a stretch of desirable territory. So far as the route is concerned the people in this part of the North will take kindly to any of the routes suggested provided the trunk road is gone on with so that the big area of the North Land may have connection with the road systems of the south. Southern Ontario in recent years has been supplied with a number of highways. The North Land modestly asks for one trunk road so that the centres up here may have some sort of road connection with each other and with the south. At present the railway is the only connecting link. In pressing for a trunk road the North Land has not been finding fault with the T. & N. O., but simply asking for an auxiliary service that would supply certain needs that can not well be met by a railroad.

ANOTHER OPINION ABOUT LABRADOR MINE PROSPECTS

A couple of weeks ago The Advance published the opinion of Sir R. Squires, ex-Premier of Newfoundland, in regard to the gold mining prospects for Labrador. The Newfoundland knight was by no means enthusiastic on his return from a visit to the Labrador field. Others returning from a visit to Labrador have expressed views similar to those of Sir Richard. Many in this Camp have taken special interest in the Labrador field, so the opinion of Sir Richard, adverse though it seemed to be, was of special interest. However, there is another side to the story. Capt. Jeffrey, an experienced mining man, recently returned to Haileybury after spending several months in the Labrador in the interests of a mining company with which he is associated. Capt. Jeffrey gave The Haileyburian to understand that he had great faith in the Labrador and predicts that it will be an important mining centre some day. He said that a lot of money would be required for development, that it is not a placer proposition, but a question of drilling and sinking, and that he is fully convinced that the values are there if they are gone after. Capt. Jeffrey enjoyed his sojourn in the Labrador. He says there is an abundance of game and the country is not bad to live in. Some members of his party remained and will spend the winter in the Labrador. So there are the two sides of the Labrador mining probabilities. "You pay your money and you take your choice," or otherwise, "as may be."

PROPOSAL TO BUILD BIG HOTEL IN HAILEYBURY

Mr. D. M. Morin, who owns and operates the Nickel Range Hotel at Sudbury, has made a proposal to the Haileybury Board of Trade for the erection of a big modern hotel in Haileybury. The proposed new hotel plan would include a building to cost between \$125,000 and \$150,000 with 75 to 100 rooms, and all up-to-date in every way. Mr. Morin's plan is to finance by forming a joint stock company capitalized at \$200,000, it being expected that Haileybury and Cobalt would supply \$30,000 to \$40,000 of the capital, and the municipality to give certain concessions in the way of fixed assessment, etc. Haileybury Council is evidently favourable to the plan, but it is probable that Provincial legislation will be necessary to make it possible to carry through the plan.

ASSOCIATED BOARDS OF TRADE MEET SEPT. 26-27

The Associated Boards of Trade of Temiskaming will meet at Englehart on Wednesday and Thursday of next week, Sept. 26th and 27th. At this meeting it is hoped to have representatives from all the towns of the North Land and to take up questions of general interest to this section of the Province.
