#### ROYAL COMMISSION ON THE PULPWOOD QUESTION

The Royal Commission appointed to enquire into and report upon the pulpwood resources of Canada will hold public hearings at an early date when an opportunity will be given to all interested to be heard. The first hearing will be at Halifax on Oct. 2nd. Subsequent meetings will be announced in the very near future. In view of the fact that so many of the provinces of Canada have a specific interest and concern in the pulpwood question the scope of the sittings of the Commission will practically need to be Dominion-wide. It is likely that sessions of the enquiry will be held in this part of the North Land where pulpwood is an important matter to many interests, settlers as well as others.

For the general information, the secretary of the Royal Commission, Mr. E. H. Finlayson, has sent The Advance an extract from the Order-in-Council by which the Commission was appointed, giving particulars of the matters into which the Commission has been instructed to enquire.

This intimation was forwarded at the direction of the Commission to give opportunity for any preparation necessary to set before the Commission any representations desired to be made when sittings are held in this district. All facts or suggestions submitted in writing will receive careful attention and consideration. The exact from the Order-in-Council is as follows:—

"The Commission is to inquire into and report on the forest resources of Canada, with particular regard to:—

(a)—The extent in each Province of wood of various kinds available for the manufacture of pulp.

(b)—The quantity of wood so available on lands owned by Provincial Governments and subject, under Provincial laws and regulations, to restrictions requiring the partial or total manufacture of such wood in Canada;

(c)—The quantity of wood so available on lands owned by the Dominion Government and subject, under Federal laws and regulations, to restrictions requiring partial or total manufacture in Canada;

(d)—The quantity of such wood on other lands and the conditions under which such lands are held, whether by ownership or lease, whether by corporations or individuals, whether by citizens of Canada or citizens of other countries;

(e)—The quantity of pulp wood produced in each Province of Canada during the past ten years, showing the portion used in Canada and the portion exported;

(f)—The question of the prohibition or restriction of the export of pulp wood from Canada;

(g)—Any other matter touching upon the production, manufacture or sale of pulp wood essential to comprehensive consideration of the next

preceding section (f);  
(h)—The making of recommendations that may be deemed expedient for the better conservation of the supply of pulp wood for present or future use."

#### TRIED TO FINISH THEIR FIGHT IN THE STATION

Last week two men were arrested as a result of a drunken brawl. The one man was fairly well decorated when he was run in and both fellows had freely given of their foreign blood to the soil of this country. After they were fastened in their cells, ("fastened" being closer than "locked," as the cells do not really lock any more), the two fighters decided to renew the combat. Accordingly one of them managed to get out of his cell and he released the other, the two then making use of the space in front of the cells as a battle ground. The police heard the noise of the battle and went downstairs and separated the fighters and again fastened their cell doors as well as was possible. The doors of some of the cells for some time past have been kept closed by the use of billets of wood, the locks being out of order. While prisoners are not able to get out of jail through this, they are sometimes able to get from the cells into the cell-room if they can figure out a way of manipulating the cell door. The two fighters referred to were able so to figure and thus to be able to renew their fight for a minute or two.

#### "STRANGE" PLANT PROVES TO BE WELL-KNOWN WEED

Last week reference was made in The Advance to the discovery near Sault Ste. Marie of a strange plant that had puzzled the botanists of that district. It had leaves like a thistle, but without the stinging qualities of that plant, and it boasted a gorgeous yellow flower. No one in the Sault district had been able to identify the plant or give a name to it, the despatches suggested.

"Isn't this the plant referred to?" asked Mr. Geo. A. D. Murray last week, as he exhibited a specimen that answered the detailed description given in the despatches from the Sault. Mr. Murray, who takes more than a passing interest in floriculture and botanical matters, explained that this particular weed was not uncommon enough to suit him. He was busy this year rooting it out of his garden. It is the weed known as the Sow Thistle in Western Canada and as the Milk Thistle in England. It grows from the root as well as from seed. It has leaves of the same appearance as a thistle, but the leaves have no sting. The blossom looks like a large dandelion.

The encyclopedia description of this weed is as follows:—"Sow Thistle (Sonchus Oleraceus) very abundant as a weed; is generally fed upon by many animals, and is sometimes used as a pot herb."

It is too bad, perhaps, to spoil the story of the strange, new, nameless plant found by the railway track near the Sault, but it was no doubt nothing more or less than the Sow Thistle, and instead of transplanting it as a curiosity it would be well to eradicate it as a possible pest. Instead of searching for a name for it, the botanists had better seek to find a way to do away with it. If it gets going the botanists will have lots of names to call it, and every name worse than the one before.
