FIREMEN EXTINGUISH A.S.D. SOFT BALL EXPERTS

Frank Carling's Independents Prove Too Weighty for the Argonauts. Auspicious Opening of Indoor Baseball League.

Despite the cold weather, and consequently small crowd, two very interesting games of Soft Ball were staged at the Timmins Rink on Thursday evening last in the opening games of the new schedule of the Soft Ball League.

The first game between the Independents and the Argonauts saw Frank Carling's crew of heavy hitters defeat Harry Boyd's light-weights to the tune of 21 to 6. The second game witnessed the defeat of A. E. Riddell's A.S.D. team by Chief Borland's Firemen to the score of 20 to 14.

At 8:15 the Independents and Argonauts took the field for the first game, and though the later got a run in the first the Independents came back strong in the second, five men crossing the plate before the side was retired. This lead was increased in the third by seven more runs the Argonauts only getting one man across the plate. The fourth and fifth were all the Independents, four more runners scoring, and four crossing the rubber in the sixth. The winners were the better team, having more weight than the Argonauts. The batteries for the teams were:—Argonauts—Boyd pitcher; Wilson and Hackett, catchers. Independents—Carling, pitcher; McIntyre, catcher. Umpires, Belanger and Plaunt.

At nine o'clock, the Firemen and A.S.D. team took the field, the Club team sending the Firemen to the field scoreless after the first innings, and getting two runners across the plate. The second saw this lead increased by five more runs, the Firemen again being unable to find the plate. Though the Fire lads got two in the third, the innings belonged to the A.S.D. team, four runners crossing the plate before the side was retired. The fourth saw both teams getting down to business, Chief Borland's Pets being retired without a run, and holding their opponents to one run. The fifth belonged to the fire-fighters, five men encircling the diamond for them, and the A.S.D. team going out three in a row. The sixth opened with Morris Dahar driving out a home run, and ended nine runs later when Dahar again crossed the plate. The seventh was a desperate battle on the A.S.D. side to even up the score, but the side was retired, getting only two runs. The batteries for the teams were A.S.D.—Hoggarth and Huckabone, pitchers; George Carson, catcher. Firemen—Deacon, pitcher; Dahar, catcher. Umpires—Senny and "Bunny" Morganson.

PART OF EXTENSION FROM SWASTIKA READY BY DEC. 15

According to an announcement made at North Bay last week by Mr. Geo. W. Lee, Chairman of the T. & N.O., the Commission had been assured by Messrs. Sinclair & Sinclair, contractors on the Swastika-Wendigo branch of the Nipissing Central Railway, that steel will be laid from Swastika as far as the Argonaut Road by December 15. This will complete the first twenty miles of the extension and will permit traffic for some distance, to the advantage of mines in the immediate vicinity.

WHO WAS THE FIRST TO START REBUILDING IN HAILEYBURY

The new and greater Haileybury to-day rising on the site of the town destroyed last October might well secure that first re-built residence and preserve it as a memento and a material exposition of the "spirit of Haileybury."

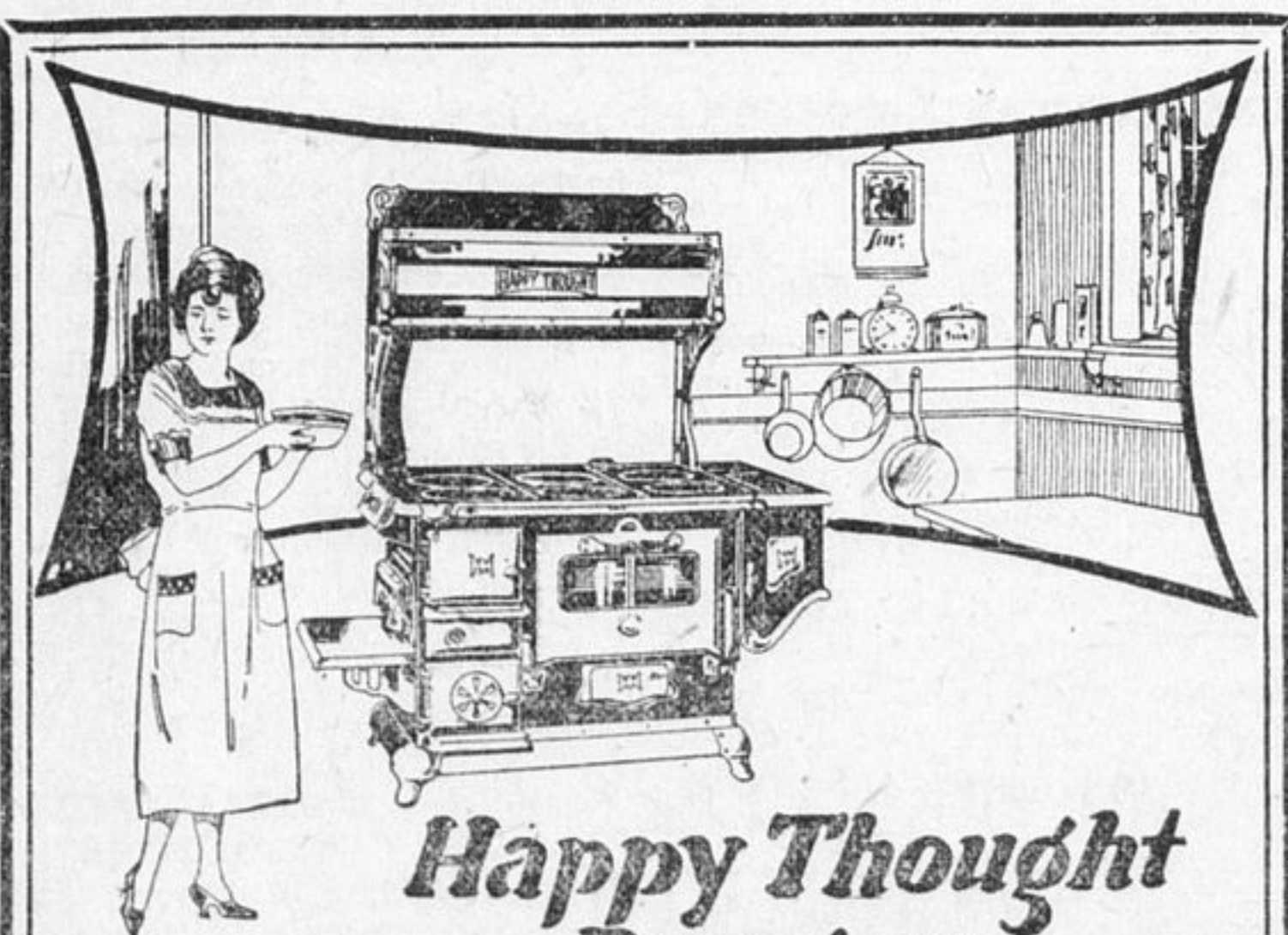
