BAY WANTS HIGHWAY ON ROUTE ALREADY SURVEYED

Since the announcement that the new Ontario Government had definitely decided to start work next spring on the linking up of roads so as to make a highway from Cobalt to join up with the southern road system, there has been more or less agitation to have the proposed highway routed via Sturgeon Falls and Field instead of direct from North Bay. This plan has aroused the North Bay Board of Trade to very energetic protest. The North Bay Board of Trade has pointed out to the Government that the route already surveyed has been endorsed by North Bay, Cobalt, New Liskeard, Haileybury and other towns interested, and any change in the route will necessarily mean delay in starting the project. The route already surveyed to North Bay is the shortest possible and so should be the one to be favoured, according to the viewpoint of the North Bay Board of Trade. The North Bay Board of Trade has ample grounds for fearing delay in the construction of the highway if the route already surveyed is dropped. A re-opening of the question of the route of the highway would likely mean an indefinite postponement of actual construction until such time as the various interests could fight out the question. All in the North Land, while more or less indifferent as to the ultimate route at the lower end will sincerely hope that no fighting rivalry develops as to the route. The North Land needs and desires the connection with the Old

Ontario road systems. The North Land is not particularly fussy as to the particular route that may be used, so long as the North and the South are duly linked up in the matter of highways. But the North Land has had experience before this in the clashing of rival interests. While two sections of the North may be squabbling, the dispute is liable to be taken as an excuse for deferring work altogether. The proposers of rival routes should always assure themselves that their agitation is going to get them something, rather than simply defer the other parties from securing something necessary and desirable.

MESSRS. W. D. and A. D. PEARCE WIN IN BUFF-ORPINGTONS

In correcting a typographical error last week in the list of prize winners at the Porcupine Fair held at Golden City on Sept. 27th, the wrong line was lifted and as a result there was some slight confusion in the listing of winners in part of the poultry classes. A number of Cobalt men will have a hearing next week before Magistrate Atkinson on the charge of failing to give all the legally-required information in a mining prospectus issued by them. The Act Respecting Joint Stock and Other Companies requires the publication of certain details regarding directors, shares, commissions, etc., and some of these details are alleged to have been omitted from the prospectus of the mining company referred to.

MINING EXCHANGE MEN PAY VISIT TO THE NORTH

The party of members of the Standard Mining Exchange, Toronto, on tour of the North Land, spent a few days in this Camp last week, and were delighted with the progress and growth evident on all hands in the Porcupine. The party travelled by special train and made a tour of inspection of the various mines and the country generally. On the trip they also visited Cobalt, Lorrain, Kirkland Lake and other centres of interest, and will no doubt return to the city with increased interest in the North Land mines and the North generally. The party visiting here numbered about seventy-five and included some old-timers of the North. Among the latter was Mr. C. Weston, who received hearty welcome here from old friends.

FIRE STARTS IN AUTO BUT IS SOON EXTINGUISHED

While going up Fourth Avenue this morning Mr. John Kilgore noticed smoke coming from the auto of Mr. H. Ledue which was standing near the Goldfields Hotel annex. Mr. Kilgore gave the matter very prompt attention and his quick work no doubt saved the auto. Chief Borland was also nearby and had a chemical tank on the scene and at work instantaneously. The fire which for a few moments threatened to completely destroy the auto was extinguished in short order by the chemical in the skilful hands of the Fire Chief, but not before a little damage had been done to the car, and Mr. John Kilgore had his hands slightly burned in tearing away the wires to stop the fire. A short circuit was responsible for the blaze and had it not been noticed and promptly dealt with Mr. Ledue would have been ready for a new car.

SECOND OF SERIES OF BAND CONCERTS ON SUNDAY, OCT. 11

Sunday evening, Oct. 14th, after the church services the second in the series of band concerts by the Timmins Citizens' Band will be given in the New Empire Theatre. The Band has prepared a number of new selections for the occasion and in addition there will be a pleasing programme of vocal and instrumental solos, duets, etc. Motion pictures of appropriate kind will also be shown, and the event throughout will be a pleasing one. The first of the series of band concerts held on Sept. 30th delighted a well-filled hall, and the attendance Sunday evening should be even larger as the programme is expected to be even more interesting. It is the intention to continue the series of band concerts every second Sunday evening during the fall and winter months. Lovers of good music should not miss any of these events.

SIGREST PLEADS GUILTY TO WOUNDING WITH INTENT

At the Supreme Court at Cochrane yesterday (Tuesday) Paul Sigrest, through his counsel, Mr. D. W. O'Sullivan, pleaded guilty to a charge of wounding with intent to do bodily harm. Sigrest is the man who struck Frank Dugere with an axe a couple of months ago at Mattagam. For a time it was feared that Dugere would not recover, but he is now recovering all right from the injuries received. The original charge read against Sigrest yesterday was that of attempted murder. This was reduced to wounding with intent, and a plea of guilty entered to this latter charge. Sentence was deferred, but will likely be announced to-day. The penalty is a term not exceeding three years, according to the Criminal Code. Crown Attorney J. M. Greer conducted the case for the Crown at Cochrane this week.

A number from Timmins were on the list of jurors at Cochrane for the Supreme Court. These, together with Chief Greer who was a witness in the Sigrest case, had to return last night in state by freight train, or remain another night in Cochrane. The train service to and from Cochrane make that town an inconvenient centre so far as Timmins and other towns on the Porcupine branch are concerned.

During the past year there have been 425 new buildings erected in Haileybury in the area burned over by the fire of October, 1922. This is exclusive of shacks, street-cars and other temporary housing accommodation. There are 361 comfortable residences, 57 stores and business blocks, two churches, two schools, the Court House, the Masonic Temple, the pumping station, the fire hall, and the T. & N.O. station.

INTERESTING GAMES IN THE SOFT BALL LEAGUE
