The Hollinger and Knights took the field at 8:15, the former winning the toss. The whole Hollinger team were at bat this innings but only succeeded in getting three runs. The first two of the K. of C. struck out, Lynett getting first, stealing second, and romping home on Sloane's two-bagger. The second frame saw the Hollinger going out, with three strike-outs and Bill Wylie's two-bagger. The Knights went out three in a row. The Gold Miners found the home plate three times in the third, the Knights romping across six times, giving them a lead of one run, but in the fourth the Holly came back with two runs, and sent Androcheck's team to the field after three men had attempted to hit the ball. The fifth was also all in favour of Gordon Ross' outfit, three runners romping home, and the Knights again going out one, two, three, returning the compliment in the sixth by retiring the Miners the same way and getting two runners across. The seventh gave the Hollinger one run, and the Knights two, the game ending with the Miners one run up.

### BUILDING RESIDENCE FOR TEACHERS AT SCHUMACHER

In the growing North Land centres there has always been difficulty experienced in securing proper accommodation for the school teachers, and naturally the difficulty in securing suitable accommodation reacts in the way of making it difficult to secure and retain the best teachers. South Porcupine has removed this difficulty by building a teachers' residence for the accommodation of the school staff. Schumacher is also adopting the same plan, and at the present time there is a teachers' residence under construction at Schumacher. When completed this building will provide ample accommodation for the school staff at Schumacher, provision being made for the housing accommodation of the principal and all the teachers. Timmins Public School Board considered the same plan to provide accommodation for the teaching staff but in view of the large expenditures for other school purposes this year it was decided to defer the matter for the present.

### MAN ARRESTED AT SOUTH END SENTENCED TO CHAIR

Sergt. F. Gardiner, of the Provincial Police, returned last week to Cobalt after being at Old Forge, Pennsylvania, where he had been called to give evidence in connection with the trial of Pasquale Stalloni for the murder of three men at Old Forge a year or so ago. Stalloni was arrested at South Porcupine some months ago following information reaching the police that he was wanted by the police of Scranton, Pa. After the police had secured full description and photographs of the man wanted, Stalloni was taken in charge. At first he denied his identity, but eventually admitted being the man accused. He did not appear to be a violent man, but quiet and refined. Detectives came here from Old Forge and took him back for trial. At the trial last week Stalloni was found guilty and sentenced to the electric chair. He was charged with killing Lorenzo Semenza, Ralph Lettiero and John Mulutti during a party at Old Forge. Stalloni's defence was based chiefly on the story that Semenza killed the other two men and that he had to kill Semenza in self-defence. The State evidence, however, pointed to Stalloni as the killer of the three men and the sentence of death was accordingly passed. The arrest of Stalloni up in this North Land gave rise to a number of thrilling romances, and no doubt his conviction and sentence will give occasion for a few more specimens. The previous romances pictured Stalloni as escaping from Old Forge by being shipped away in a coffin as a dead man, and the stories also credited his capture to the jilting of a sweetheart he picked up here and to whom he told his life story.
