FAVOURABLE PROGRESS AT PORCUPINE-DAVIDSON

The work of sinking the big central shaft on the Porcupine-Davidson is progressing rapidly. The 200-ft. level has been passed. Values came into the shaft unexpectedly before the 200-ft. level was reached, and the outlook is officially stated to be very favorable.

Heavy mining equipment and an abundant supply of Hydro-electric energy from the Great Northern power plant at Indian Chutes has placed the management of the Porcupine-Davidson in a position to make the maximum rate of progress in sinking the big inclined shaft—the biggest of the kind in Northern Ontario with the exception of the International Nickel Company at Sudbury.

NEWRAY SHAFT TO BE PUT DOWN TO THOUSAND FOOT

A reader of The Advance asks this question:—"What official ground was there for the statement made last week in the daily papers that the Coniagas were ready to gamble a million dollars in the development of the Newray Mine?" Of course, there was no official ground for such a statement. The Coniagas people are in the mining business, not in gambling. As The Advance suggested last week any expenditures on the Newray would be made on business principles. The mining business is not free from risks. But neither is any other business. Every business has in greater or smaller measure to take a chance. But the business that takes a gamble on this or that is not being conducted on the best business principles. Present-day mining is conducted on business principles. Chances are taken, but they are fair chances. The Coniagas will risk its money on the Newray if there is reasonable grounds for expecting good returns. But no one should take the mistaken idea that any mining company will say, "Here's a piece of mining property, and here's a million dollars, let's mix them up and see what comes of it!" It is not done like that in the best mining families. A mining company will take a chance on testing out a property. If results justify it, further expenditures will be made for larger development. Work is carried on upon a definite plan, and though details of the plan may be changed as circumstances require, a definite plan remains. It is a business proposition, not a gamble. The mining company may find results that justify further work, but it is not likely that an expenditure of a million dollars would be necessary to prove all plans hopeless. In the case of the Newray the property will likely be proven up before an expenditure of a quarter of a million is reached. No doubt the Coniagas has had such results from the work so far as to make further work fully warranted as a business proposition. As for the foundation of the story by the daily newspapers, it is hard to say off-hand where some outside journals get their ideas, if any. In the case of the future expenditures on the Newray, it may be that the basis was secured from the annual report of the Coniagas Company. In this annual report the following reference is made to the Newray:—

"The last annual report to the shareholders referred to an option which had been taken by your directors on a majority of the capital stock of the Newray Mines, Limited, in the Porcupine District. During the present year the mine has been unwatered and work has been carried on vigorously. This work consisted of drifting 606 feet on the 400 foot level and upraising to connect this level with a new three compartment shaft being sunk from the surface. It is the intention to continue sinking this shaft to a depth of 1,000 feet and carry on the exploration at this level. Surface work has consisted of general repairs to the buildings and equipment, in addition to the erection of a new steel head frame, power house and plant equipment. A transmission line to the South Porcupine sub-station of the Great Northern Power Company has also been completed, and the necessary machinery and equipment to carry out the development of the lower levels of this property will have been installed at the end of the current calendar year. To date about \$117,000 have been expended on this property."

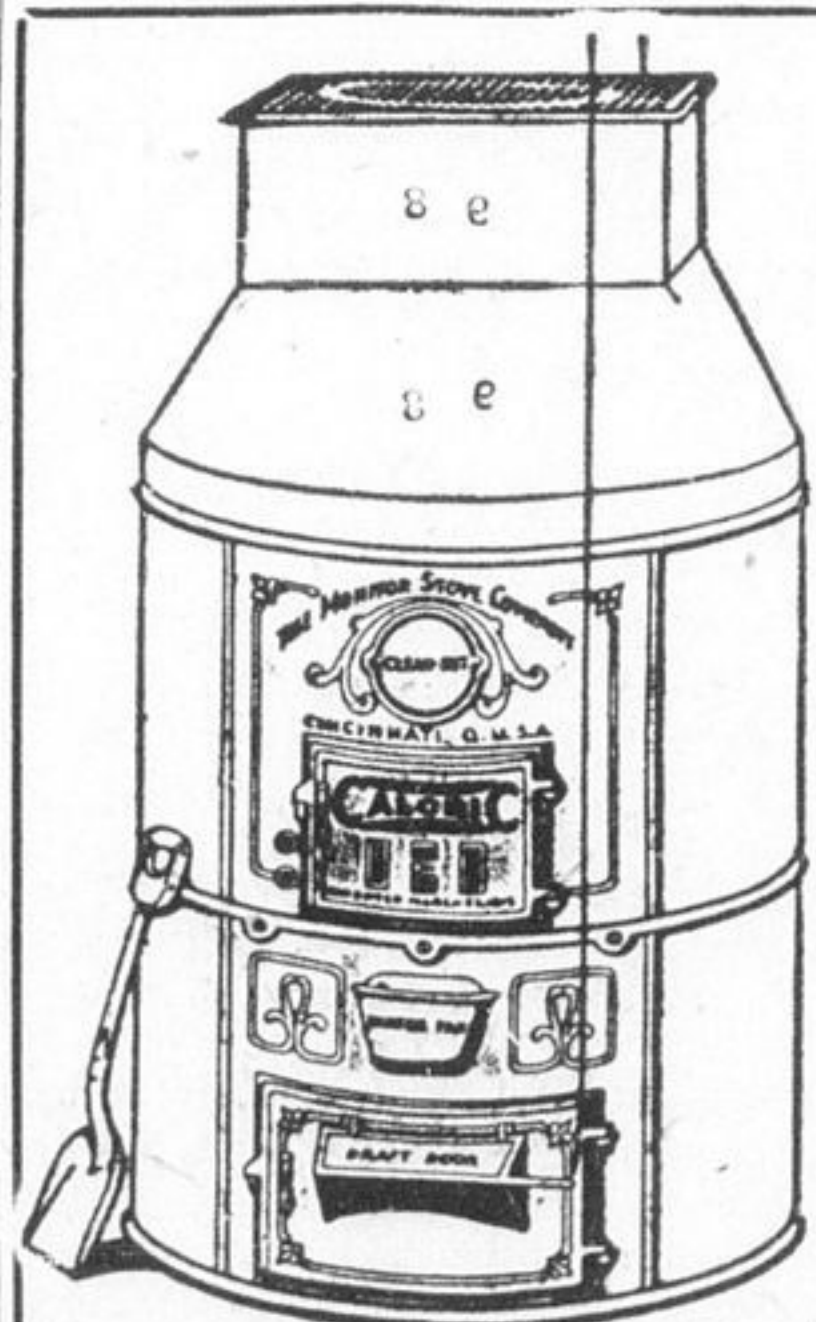
