The public are invited to all the sittings of the Commission and urged to express their views as to what can and should be done to more adequately protect the forest wealth through improved methods of fire protection and forest management.

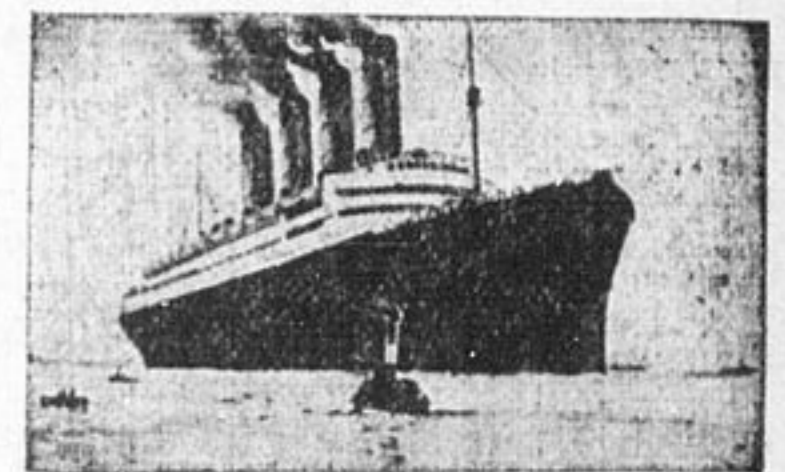
