PUTTING IN PLANT AT THE NEW YORK-PORCUPINE

At present work is under progress at the putting in of the foundations for the engine compressor and hoist to be installed at the New York-Porcupine Mines. It is expected to have the foundations in and ready before the advent of severe winter weather. With the foundations in the rest of the work of installing the plant and erecting the buildings to house same will be carried through irrespective of the weather. The New York-Porcupine property was formerly known as the Martin claims. On Nov. 1st the company made the second payment on the property, and as the amount involved was a material one, this is perhaps as sure a way as any of indicating the increasing confidence felt in the property. Mr. Larry Darling is in charge of the New York-Porcupine, and very satisfactory results have been following the work of the last few weeks. There has been an extensive diamond drilling campaign in progress. The diamond drill showings are very interesting. Five holes out the ore and indicate \$30.00 ore four feet wide. A length of 600 feet and a depth of 500 feet have been prospected, the length referred to being only half the claim. Some of the diamond drill results are as follows:—2½ ft., \$21.80; 10 ft., \$3.20; 10 ft., \$5.40; 9 ft., \$28.80; 13 ft., \$55.00. Surface, 3 ft., \$19.00. There was visible gold in the surface showings in two holes. The indications are that in the New York-Porcupine there is the making of a big mine.

DELORO ASBESTOS CLAIMS AGAIN BEING OPERATED

A Montreal syndicate is having work carried on again upon some asbestos claims in Deloro Township. Only a small crew of men is engaged at the work, but the indications are that the intention is to thoroughly test out the property. The claims, which are some five miles from South Porcupine, were worked upon some years ago, but the operations were not carried on for enough to test out the property as an asbestos proposition. A quantity of high-grade asbestos was shipped, but work was discontinued, war and other economic conditions making the proposition inopportune at that time. Many who ought to know have great faith in the possibilities of the asbestos properties in Deloro and the Camp generally would be much interested in the outcome of any thorough plan of testing out any of the asbestos claims. Prospectors with knowledge of asbestos claim that Deloro and other sections of the Porcupine have noteworthy fields of commercial asbestos. If so, the Camp generally would like to see the fact established, with the establishment of asbestos mining following. While gold mining is, and no doubt will remain, the great leading industry of the area, other forms of mining would also prove welcome as adding to the development and the wealth of the country. Deloro has a number of asbestos claims from which very promising samples have been taken. The development of any one of these claims would no doubt mean activity on all of them.

MR. J. MCGREGOR'S FINE NEW BUILDING IN SCHUMACHER

Work has commenced and is away to a good start on a fine new building for Mr. J. McGregor at Schumacher. The new building is going up near Todd's Drug Store. The sides are of tile, with the front brick veneer. The building will be two storeys and basement. The basement will be used as a garage and for storage for cars. The first floor will be equipped for a couple of shops, and the second storey will comprise rooms or flats. The new McGregor building will make another noteworthy addition to the new buildings of growing Schumacher.

WERE SHOOTING PARTRIDGE AND GOT TWO BULL MOOSE

Two Timmins men, Messrs. W. Fiss and J. Graham, had an odd but lucky incident last week in connection with a little hunting trip. They were out in Whitesides Township shooting partridge, but fortunately each man was also carrying a heavier gun in case bigger game might be encountered. They had roused a flock of birds and had separated a little so as to get the birds as they came up between them. However, they had to forget this particular bunch of birds in a big hurry, for unexpectedly from the bush came two big bull moose and charged furiously down upon the two men. They had barely time to get the guns from their backs and take aim before the moose were nearly upon them. Both the big moose were shot down in their tracks. Messrs. Fiss and Graham were able to take a wagon right up to where the moose lay dead, load the carcasses on and bring them to town.

PLACER MINE MAY BE TAKEN UP NEAR MATHESON

Several months ago The Advance referred to plans then under way to inaugurate placer mining on the sand plains near Matheson. On account of the lesser initial capital required, placer mining has advantages over rock mining so far as the ordinary prospector is concerned. The attempts at placer mining near Matheson, however, did not "pan out" well. There was such a heavy overburden of sand that the ordinary methods of placer mining could not be used to advantage. Two or three sections were worked by the placer miners early this year, but results did not justify continuance of work. One man said he could "make wages" and that was about all. There was gold in the sand all right, but it would take a more expensive outfit than he could afford to handle the amount of sand necessary to be moved to get to bed-rock. Another got to bed-rock and found gold in commercial quantities, but the cost of equipment to handle the overburden along most of the claim made it impractical to attempt to work further. Again it is reported that a plan is under way now to sluice the entire overburden of sand and gravel. Such a plan, if it can be done economically, will mean that the work can go on, and it is generally agreed that with sluicing on an extended scale enough gold would be recovered to make it well worth while.

ANOTHER RICH STRIKE ON THE LAKE SHORE MINE

A despatch last week from Kirkland Lake says that another rich strike has been made at the Lake Shore Mine, this time at a depth of 800 feet, where the crosscut at this new deep level has just intersected the No. 2 vein. The deposit carries visible gold as well as tellurides, and proves another 200 feet in depth of the exceptionally rich ore of the Lake Shore. In this connection it is important that the Lake Shore ore bodies have been increasing in length accordingly as depth is attained, it having been demonstrated that 1,900 feet in length of drift at the 600-ft. level is in ore. A duplication of this at the new 800-ft. level will result in adding possibly \$5,000,000 to the proved ore of this rich mine.

It is also stated that arrangements are to be made to continue the shaft this winter to the 1,000-foot level, and then continue on to a depth of 1,200 feet. All the evidence points toward Lake Shore moving on to a place with the leading gold mines of Canada, probably taking a place with McIntyre and Dome. Owing to the slow delivery of machinery and supplies, the new milling addition will not be ready before early spring, but in the meantime the mine will be in excellent condition to assure full capacity operations on high-grade ore.

PRO. HOCKEY SCOUTS ARE COMBING THE NORTH LAND

The amateur hockey teams in the North Land are suffering this season, more or less, from raids being made by Pro. Hockey scouts looking for likely material. As noted last week, "Red" Green had been caught by Pro. Hockey. Representatives of a Western Canada club are said to be centering at present on securing Philips and Donnelly of the Sault Ste. Marie team. Other professional teams are said to be seeking to secure a couple of the star players of the Sudbury team, and very flattering offers are understood to be made by the visiting scouts. Many hockey fans feel that this sort of thing will do much to injure Senior Hockey in the North. However, it is a compliment to the brand of hockey played in the N.O.H.A., if that is any comfort.
