**TEACHERS ASK FOR ANNUAL  
TRIP TO NORTHERN ONTARIO**

In the summers of 1920, 1921 and 1922 there were parties of school teachers touring the North Land during the month of August. These parties were under the auspices of the Ontario Department of Education and the Ontario Educational Association. It was generally felt that these tours were of decided advantage to the teachers and the North Land alike. The teachers found the trips of great educational interest and the North Land felt that by this method the truth about the North Land, gained by the teachers at first hand, was given general circulation in the South, the schools in so many cases being ideal centres from which to spread knowledge to the people in general. For this reason there was a general desire to make these Teachers' Tours of the North Land an annual event. The late Government seemed to favour such a plan, but last year the feature was dropped. The matter passed without any particular protest because of the election and other matters this summer. Last week, however, a deputation representing the teachers of Ontario waited upon Premier Ferguson at the Parliament Buildings for the purpose of urging him to continue this year the annual teachers' excursion to Northern Ontario. The Premier stated that the finances of the Province were so straitened that the Government might feel constrained to discontinue the trip. He assured them however, that he deeply appreciated the educational value which the trip had and promised that he would carefully consider the matter in order to see if it might not be made possible.

**NEWSPAPERS BEST MEDIUM  
SAYS ADVERTISING EXPERT**

Mr. John S. King, a recognized authority on advertising, having won his position through success in this line, recently expressed his views on advertising as gathered from a long and noteworthy experience. Mr. King is the head of the firm of the John S. King Company, Cleveland, and in an address last week at Hamilton, Ont., to the members of the Chamber of Commerce business men's class, he said some things that might well be considered by business men everywhere.

The speaker strongly recommended newspapers as a medium of arousing public interest. He mentioned the larger American firms and the totals they expended annually in making their products known to the public. The average appropriation was three per cent. of the total year's business, but this was often exceeded. Such expenditures he regarded as an investment, pointing out that it brought revenue through increased sales. "All advertising creates, diverts or reminds," it was added. A good appeal was pleasing to read. Publications brought an audience to a merchant and it depended upon his advertising whether or not he could hold his interest. Of the number who read magazines and newspapers, advertisements were followed by a far larger per cent. by the newspaper class, it was stated, the number being estimated at 54 per cent.

**"FOGHORN" MACDONALD  
NOTED PIONEER, PASSES**

There will be general regret at the death last week in Montreal of Major Neil Macdonald, one of the pioneer mining men of the North Land. The late Major Macdonald was better known as "Foghorn," on account of his remarkably powerful voice. In the early days there were scores of people who knew "Foghorn" well who would have been unable to give any other name to him. He was a Glengarry man, and a mining man by profession. He spent some years in the Yukon, Mexico, Montana, Nevada and other fields, and went to Cobalt in the early days of that Camp. In Cobalt he acquired fame for his wit and democratic ways. At Cobalt he was connected with several mining ventures, including the management of the Erie silver mine. From Cobalt the late "Foghorn" Macdonald came to Porcupine. Here he acquired as wide fame as he had enjoyed in other Camps. From Porcupine he went to Montreal and from the latter city he enlisted for overseas, going across with the regiment more or less appropriately known as "The Little Black Devils," of Winnipeg. In active service overseas, "Foghorn" also won fame, his powerful voice and his moral as well as his physical courage winning special notice from the men of all ranks. Innumerable stories are told of his "telling off" of obnoxious officers and his faculty for keeping the men in cheerful train of mind. He rose to the rank of Major in the army, and on account of his mining experience he proved a particularly valuable man. He was given the work of the oversight of the famous mine that was designed to blow the top off Kennel Hill. Eventually "Foghorn" was transferred to the Canadian Forestry Corps where he was widely popular and did effective work. It is suggested by some that his transfer to this branch of the service was partly due to his fearlessness in speaking his mind to officers in the army, irrespective of their rank, when he considered their attitude was not the best for the men and the winning of the war. In the Forestry Corps he proved a valuable man, and again was the centre of scores of stories in regard to his wit and humour and resourcefulness.

It is said that "Foghorn" was first called thus by another man from Glengarry, Hugh Macdonald, who was impelled to use the name the first time he listened to that powerful voice in the early days of Cobalt. Among the near relatives surviving is a brother, Mr. John Angus Macdonald, formerly manager of the Foster Mine at Cobalt and later of the McEneaney Mine at Timmins, but recently engaged in mining work in the Fort Matatachewan area. He left Matatachewan last week on news of the death and proceeded to Glen Nevis, Glengarry County, Ontario, to attend his brother's funeral there.

Cobalt's newspaper, The Northern News, last week editorially urged the changing of the municipal election date so as not to conflict with the holiday season. Iroquois Falls, Timmins and Whitney Township, are among the North Land municipalities that have changed the date of municipal elections so as to avoid the holiday season. In these municipalities nominations are held on the last Monday in November, and elections on the first Monday in December, the municipal elections thus being over before the holiday time arrives.

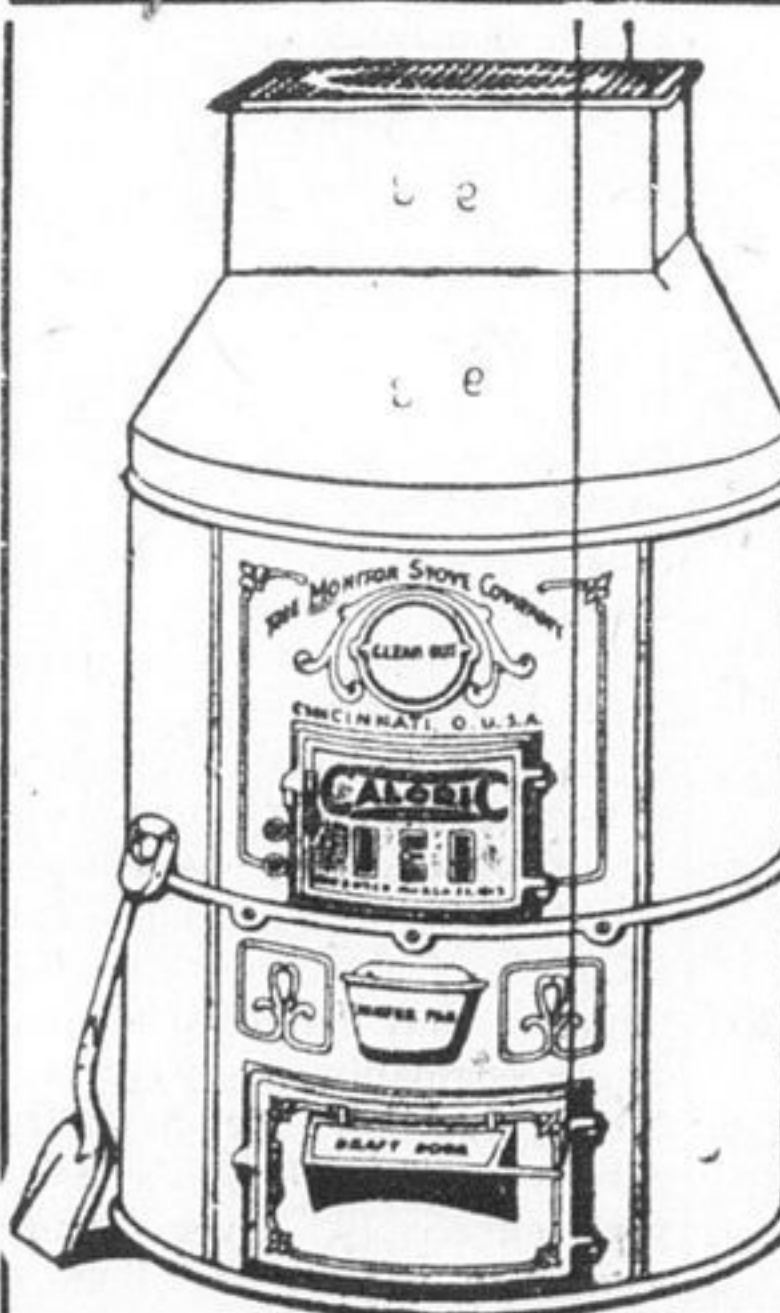
