MUSIC HEARD HERE FROM SCOTLAND BY THE RADIO

Sandy Falls Radio Expert Listens In to Programme from Glasgow. Music Clearly Heard.

In an interview last week at Toonto Mr. Hugh F. The reception was strong and clear, and the programme from Glasgow, Scotland, was thus heard plainly and of effectively in the Porcupine. Mr. M. J. Cavaney, who conducts the radio station at Sandy Falls, is one of the pioneers of radio in this North Land. He has had striking success in the work almost since the inception of the invention or discovery. At the station built and operated by Mr. Cavaney messages have been received from the most distant points on this continent and beyond. On ! more than one occasion the station of has 'Histened in' on European messages and on despatches from South America. The programme broadcasted last week from Glasgow, Scot-15 land, was heard with unusual clearness and the whole programme reached the Sandy Falls station as distinetly as programmes from stations in the nearer sections of this continent. With the full programme from Glasgow so clearly heard here it is certain that Mr. Cavaney will now make still further progress in "listening in' on the wide, wide world. 📂
