A LINE OR TWO ABOUT THE CANDIDATES FOR COUNCIL

There are twenty candidates for the six places at the Municipal Council Board for the coming year. The number running may make a choice difficult. The list includes material for two good councils, or it might be reduced in such a way as to leave only one set of six that would not prove a credit or benefit to the town. There are several of the candidates with such extreme views that their election would not be of advantage to the municipality. There are others whose sole purpose apparently is to relieve their own private and personal grudges and ill-will. There are still others who are unknown quantities. At this particular time Timmins can not afford to take chances with either the ineffective or the self-seeking.

The best method to judge the candidates is to weigh them on their past public service. Men who have given generous public service in the past may be counted upon to work for the advantage of the town if elected to the Council Board. It is not unfair to suggest that men who have done nothing in the past in the way of public service and who are forward now only because of personal ill-will or private grudge are likely to prove poor public servants, especially when they give away their own characters and attitude of mind by the improper motives they are so ready to impute to others.

Let public-spiritedness, then, be the test. Eliminating those who have given no public service in the past and who have been forward in no effort for the advantage of the community, and also those who are not well-known enough for any fair judgment to be made on their possible qualifications, the list is materially reduced. A line or two in regard to those with known qualifications and character may not be out of place.

Mr. E. L. Longmore is recognized as one of the most capable of the members of the present Council. He has given generously of his time and talent to the service of the town. He had five years' experience, and has proven a very valuable man, his ability in financial matters being of particular benefit to the town. His life in Timmins proves beyond doubt his disinterested public-spirit.

Mr. L. S. Newton is well-known for his generous public-spiritedness. He has given very freely of his time and

ability to every good public cause,—the Town Council, the Board of Trade, the Separate School Board, the Band,—anything for Timmins may always depend on Mr. Newton's assistance and co-operation. With five years' experience on the Council, he has the grip of affairs that gives added value.

Mr. J. H. Bacon is another valuable member of the present Council. Few, perhaps, realize the amount of time and effort he has given to the work of the Committee of which he is chairman—the Contingencies Committee. With unflinching good humor and untiring attention he has given the town splendid service in his own quiet way.

Mr. F. M. Wallingford has proved a good Councillor,—thoughtful, careful, courageous. He has given special attention to the needs of the newer parts of the Town and worked consistently for the progress of Timmins. As a member of the Board of Trade and other public bodies, he has also shown a fine spirit of public service.

The other member of the present Council in the contest is Mr. J. E. Morin, who has also given freely of his time and effort in the service of the town.

Mr. T. F. King is President of the Board of Trade this year. He served on the Town Council here and gave excellent service in that capacity. He has always shown an intelligent interest in public affairs and has always done his part with credit to himself and benefit to the community.

While Mr. J. Morrison has not had municipal experience, he has given good public service to the Town in several ways. As a member for many years of the Volunteer Fire Brigade, and as secretary of that organization, he is one of the good citizens helping to build up the "good luck" of Timmins in the matter of fires. In fraternal and other circles and in sport, he has shown himself a good fellow and a good citizen.

Mr. H. Charlebois for some years has been a valued member of the Separate School Board. He has also taken interest in the Board of Trade and other public organizations. He is a successful business man, sincere and public-spirited, and the Town would make no mistake in securing his services as Councillor.

Mr. Geo. Drew is one of the Council of the Board of Trade, secretary for two years of the Porcupine Dog Race and Carnival, and prominent in many other public enterprises. He can always be depended upon to give generously of his services for anything that is for the advantage of Timmins.

Mr. A. J. Downie has shown a pleasing readiness to assist in anything for the benefit of the community. In such community services as the Male Chorus, the Hollinger Recreation Club and in other lines, he has given efficient and helpful service.

Mr. T. Blackman has given helpful service to the town on many occasions, contributing his expert knowledge in electrical matters for the benefit of the people and showing interest and attention in the fire

and other town services.

Mr. David Laprairie has served the town as a Town Councillor and has always been an interested and attentive member of the Board of Trade and other local efforts for advance and betterment.

Mr. N. McEachern spent his time and effort freely as a member of the Mattagami Public School Board, and since the annexation of Mattagami to the Town has taken keen interest in public affairs here.

Mr. S. B. Rawlinson is one of the old-time residents of the district. As a member of the Public School Board he has served the community in a public capacity.

From the names mentioned above it would be practically impossible to select other than a safe, sane, capable and fair-minded Council. It is up to the people of Timmins.

REPORT OF SALE OF THE BLUE DIAMOND COAL MINE

According to despatches over the Arthur E. Moysey & Co. wire this morning, rumors are current that President Bickell, now returning from London, England, has closed a deal involving the sale outright of the Blue Diamond Coal Mines of Alberta. This report is given the appearance of foundation by the action of the Temiskaming and McIntyre market wherein for weeks past the stock has been offered at 32 cents a share. Temiskaming and McIntyre own the Blue Diamond Coal Mine jointly, and this rumor may also have connection with the strength of McIntyre on the market, this morning's figure being \$17.35. Should the rumored sale be officially announced upon Mr. Bickell's return on Friday, it is likely that both McIntyre and Temiskaming will go still higher on the market.
