DOMES OCT. NET PROFIT AT RATE OF \$6 PER SHARE PER YR.

Net profits of the Dome Mines for October totalled \$230,000, which is at the rate of \$6 per share per annum. It is likely that such high earning power will be fairly well maintained in future months.

Dome directors have declared a dividend of 50 cents per share on the capital stock, payable January 20 to shareholders of record December 31. As this dividend is on the new stock, and the old stock was split into two new for one of old, the dividend just declared is equal to the dollar per share dividend declared for the last quarter on the old stock.

Directors of the Dome who recently returned from an inspection of the property express themselves as highly pleased with developments. One director stated that the mine never looked better, and never had so much ore been in sight. Developments at lower levels were exceeding expectations. The directors all referred to Dome Extension property as one which will develop into a big mine. Although little attention had been given the property to date, obviously it carried extensions of the rich ore bodies on the Dome.

The tenth, eleventh and twelfth levels on the Dome are yielding ore beyond hopes of the directors. The tenth and eleventh levels have developed particularly well, and the twelfth level, on which comparatively little work has been done to date, is expected also to be a splendid level, with the ore some distance east of where it was found on the tenth and eleventh levels.

PORCUPINE POULTRY AND PET STOCK SHOW, JAN. 16-17

The premium list of the Porcupine Poultry and Pet Stock Association for the first annual show to be held in the New Empire Theatre basement on Wednesday and Thursday, January 16th and 17th, 1923, will show a remarkably long list of good cash and other prizes. The regular prize list includes 104 classes, covering all the principal lines in poultry, eggs, rabbits, pigeons, canaries, dogs, etc. First, second and third prize ribbons will be given all prize-winning entries. In addition there will be cash and merchandise, etc., as listed. The list of Association and other special prizes is a long and attractive one, including cash prizes, silver cups, etc., and prizes of merchandise, etc. Poultry and Pet Stock fanciers all through the North Land should make a special note of the date of the Porcupine Poultry and Pet Stock Show and should secure prize lists and other particulars of this coming event.

Here and There

Exports in Canada's inter-Empire trade last month exceeded imports by over \$12,000,000. Against imports from 23 countries belonging to the British Empire, amounting to \$15,713,000, Canada exported goods amounting to \$27,888,000.

Noel Victor Pearneough, aged seven weeks, son of a farmer of Morrin, Alberta, the youngest child on record to travel alone, left pool, England, in charge of officials of the Canadian Pacific Railway and Steamship Lines throughout the trip.

An experiment in shipping Canadian peaches to England has proven successful. The peaches were packed in small boxes and placed in cold storage, reaching London in fine condition. There is likelihood of an increased demand for Canadian peaches.

Representative of the best sheep and swine blood of Great Britain, 33 animals imported from the Old Country arrived in Regina, Saskatchewan, recently. There were 19 sheep and 16 hogs in the shipment. The animals were bought by the government for farmers in the province.

Canada's highest lookout station has been completed and will be ready for use next year. It is situated on Mount Cartier, near Revelstoke, British Columbia, and is 8,623 feet above sea-level. It will be used for the detection of forest fires and for meteorological and other observations.

The Canadian McIntosh red apple is the champion dessert apple in the British Empire, so judges at the Imperial Fruit Show, which opened in Manchester recently, adjudged. They also decided that Cox orange pippins, from British Columbia, on the whole, are the best of the sixteen exhibits from overseas, and winners, therefore, of the "Daily Mail's" fifty-guinea cup.

What is declared to be a world's record for the transportation of grain has just been achieved by the Canadian Pacific Railway. In one period of 24 hours there were moved from Winnipeg for the head of the lakes 1,776 loaded cars. The best previous record, also held by the Canadian Pacific Railway, was 579 cars, moved east on October 25th, 1921.

One thousand young buffalo will be taken from the Dominion park at Wainwright, Alberta, and turned loose in the north in the region in which wood buffalo are found, Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of the Interior, announces. This will prevent the slaughter of these animals made necessary by the increasing size of the Wainwright herd.

A dispatch from London says that the gold medal of the British Dairy Farmers' Association has been awarded to the Government of Ontario for its collection of dairy produce, including bacon, dead poultry and eggs, at the Dairy Show held there recently. First prize in the colonial farming section, namely the silver medal was won by the Ontario Beekeepers' Association of Guelph, and the bronze medal was awarded to H. Leclere, of Montmagny, Quebec.

Details have just been announced concerning the "Aorangi," the new motor ship that is being built by the Union Steamship Company of New Zealand. The motorship is under construction at the Clyde yards of the Fairfield Shipbuilding Company and when completed will be the largest motorship in the world, having a displacement of 20,000 tons. On the Pacific she will be exceeded in size only by the "Empress of Canada" and the "Empress of Australia," of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, which is her agent.

All grain shipment records for the prairie provinces have been shattered during the past two months. Since the commencement of the crop year, September 1st, loadings totalled 121,596 bushels, representing 169,053,085 bushels, against 158,795,320 bushels handled in the same period last year. Of this quantity the Canadian Pacific loaded 68,469 cars, representing 100,307,085 bushels, against 94,071,320 bushels during the 1922 period.
