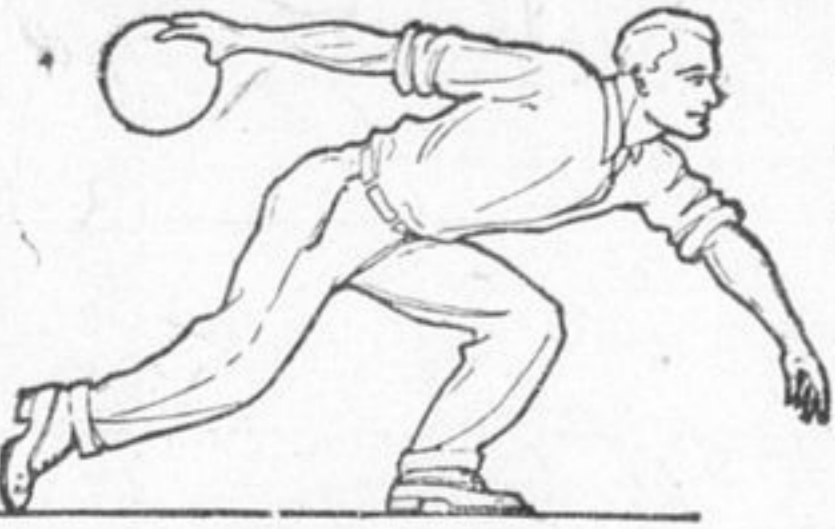

FIND PRICES HIGHER IN COBALT THAN PORCUPINE

Last week The Northern News of Cobalt had an article in regard to prices in Cobalt and Porcupine, based upon figures given in The Labour Gazette, the official publication of the Dominion Government Dept. of Labour. In regard to the question of rent referred to by The Northern News, it is probable that Timmins would make a favourable showing in regard to the average rental of houses. The low rents charged for Hollinger houses would have a material part in keeping the average down. The article in full as published by The Northern News is as follows:—

Comparison of quoted retail prices in Timmins and Cobalt, and relating to staple foods, groceries, fuel and lighting show a decided advantage in favor of the gold camp town over this camp. The figures are given in The Labor Gazette, the official publication of the Federal Government.

Of 57 items given for both places three dozen and one were lower in price in Timmins than they were here, according to these statistics, in 13 cases the lower rate prevailed here, and in the remaining four the values were similar. No figures were given for rent in the case of Timmins

but it is probable that Cobalt would score on this important point, and it is also likely that in the price of clothing, which the returns do not cover, the advantage would be to the silver camp.

The figures are taken from the last issue of The Labor Gazette, and this is the first occasion on which Timmins has been represented, a correspondent having been appointed but recently. It is possible that the system in vogue in the northern camp, where two of the larger mines operate stores, helps to keep down prices, but a number of retail grocery stores do business in Timmins in competition with the company shops.

Generally speaking, meat prices are higher here, the difference ranging from a fraction of a cent on a leg of pork to a nickel on a rib roast. Veal and mutton are both given as cheaper in Cobalt, the difference in our favor being respectively 3.3 and 4.3 cents. Canned goods may be purchased at a lower rate in the gold camp, as may also currants, raisins, coffee, tea and cocoa. In fuel the prices are practically the same for hard coal, ranging from \$20 to \$22, but in the north soft coal is quoted at \$12 as against \$13 here and wood in stove lengths also is cheaper in Timmins. Hardwood is \$13.50 against \$15 here, and soft wood is

given at \$10.50 to \$12 and \$15.

The four instances where prices are similar in the two camps are finnan haddie, raspberry jam, yellow sugar and matches. Halibut, whitefish, salt herrings, cooking apples and pepper are not quoted in Timmins and there is no price for dairy butter in Cobalt. Potatoes by the 90 pound bag are cheaper here by 34 cents, but in quantities to 15 pounds this camp is a cent and a half dearer. Bread is quoted at 7.4 cents here against 8.3 in Timmins and cheese is 30.5 cents against 32.2 in the north.

The articles which are given as cheaper in Timmins are:—Sirloin, and round steak, rib roast, stewing beef and leg of pork, salt mess pork, sliced and unsliced bacon, boiled ham, salt cod canned salmon, lard, cooking eggs, oleo, soda biscuits, flour, rolled oats, rice. Canned tomatoes, canned peas, canned corn, beans, potatoes (15 pound lots), evaporated apples, prunes, raisins, currants, canned peaches, marmalade, coffee, tea, cocoa, cream of tartar, laundry soap, soft coal, hardwood and soft wood.

Cobalt scores in shoulder roast, veal, mutton, fresh eggs, milk, creamery butter, tapioca, onions, potatoes in 90 pound bags, syrup, white sugar, vinegar, salt, starch, cheese and bread. While in the majority of cases the difference in price is not

great, there are exceptions, as in the case of canned salmon, which, quoted at 47.1c. here, can be bought north for 36 cents. Milk is five cents a quart dearer in Timmins, soda biscuits are 4.2 cents higher here, prunes show 4.4 cents in Timmins' favor, currants cost 7.4 cents per pound in Cobalt, canned peaches are five cents dearer here and marmalade is 14.2 cents higher, coffee is 57 cents up in Cobalt and cream of tartar 15 cents."

EXPECT TOWN OF 1,000 OR MORE AT LARDER STATION

The Larder Station on the branch railway from Swastika to Larder Lake will be constructed on the Crown Reserve property. The branch railway to Larder will be completed early next summer, according to announcements made. Skeleton steel will be laid to Argonaut Road before the end of the year. Those who have studied the situation believe that a town of at least 1,000 people will spring up at Larder on account of the activities of the Crown Reserve and Associated Goldfields properties.

STOVE-PIPE WITHOUT CHIMNEY CAUSES FIRE

Friday last an alarm was turned in from Box 52, corner of Preston and Commercial Ave. The brigade made their usual good response, and found the fire to be in the Auer Township at a small house owned by Mr. Guindon. The house is not yet completed, one of its requirements being a chimney. Pending the construction of the chimney, which was to be built this week, the stove-pipe was put through the side of the wall. This was the cause of the fire, the pipe becoming overheated and setting fire to the wall, the flames running quickly up the wall along the tarpaper lining. The blaze was in fair progress before the arrival of the brigade, but the firemen again justified the confidence felt in them. They quickly had a line of some 450 feet of hose laid from the hydrant on Preston street so as to reach the fire, and good work was done as usual in handling the blaze. There are two houses on the lot, the smaller house being the scene of the fire. The other house was saved from injury. The fire was eventually extinguished though not before some damage was done, chiefly to the upstairs portion of the house. The damage to the house will be about \$150.00 to \$200.00 and a similar loss is entailed by damage to the contents. The house, being outside the town, was not eligible for insurance, and so Mr. Guindon is a heavy loser. He has been working hard to complete his home, and there will be sincere regret that this accident should come along to give him a set-back at this time.

PULP AND PAPER EXPORT SHOWS LARGE INCREASE

Pulpwood to the value of \$1,078,000 was exported to the United States from Canada in October, according to a report prepared by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This is a decrease both in quantity and value over September figures, which show that \$1,172,000 worth of pulpwood was shipped to the States, but it shows a great increase over figures for October, 1922, when only \$992,000 was realized from this source.

In the report it is shown that the exportation of pulpwood has jumped tremendously in the twelve months which ended with October, as compared with the preceding, corresponding period. Figures for these periods are: 1,412,000 cords, valued at \$13,657,000 in the year which ended with October, as against 956,791 cords, and a total value of \$9,967,000 in the twelve months ending with October of 1922.

In October \$4,118,000 worth of wood pulp was exported from Canada, of which \$3,586,000 worth went to the United States, \$351,000 worth to the United Kingdom and \$179,000 worth to other countries. The total value of wood pulp exported during the year which closed with October was \$47,155,000 as against \$41,122,000 for the preceding corresponding period.

During the twelve-month period under review \$3,033,000 worth of paper board was exported from Canada, as compared with \$2,327,000 in the preceding twelve months. It is shown that the total value of all kinds of paper products exported from Canada during the month was \$8,171,000, as compared with \$6,468,000 in October of 1922. The total value for the twelve months is shown to be \$91,446,000, as against \$72,822,000 in the year which ended with October, 1922.
